"April 24, 1946. "The members of the National Retail Dry Goods Association wish to restate the position we have onsistently maintained with reference to the Price Control Act. "1. We recognize the tempor-ary need for a short-term extenion of the Act.

"2. We believe the present adninistration of OPA has discouraged and stopped production of needed goods. It has forced scarce commodities into black markets. Production is the real ure for price inflation and we irge that every possible measure be taken to encourage production. standards for the removal of controls should be established by Congress and not left to admin-


"4. We believe that for the good of the country, Congress must clearly state its intentions and its policies for the guidance of the Price Administrator so that obstacles to full production may

"5. We urge that Congress so amend the law as to allow the productive capacity of American industry to supply the needs of American consumers to the same full measure that it supplied our war needs.

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


