

Five principal changes in the liberalized G. I. Insurance Bill, signed August 2nd by President Truman, were outlined today by Hugh Mckinney, Veterans Administration Contact Representative, from the Vernon Contact Office. The new measure, which materially extends benefits, will pro-

(1) Lump sum payments to beneficiaries if desired. (2) Total disability protection-upon payment of a slight addition-(3) Endowment type policies.

(4) Removal of restrictions in the naming of beneficiaries.

Previously, the only settlement provided for death claims was monthly payments or annuity benefits. These are still available, however, under the new bill, the for-mer serviceman may have his insurance paid in a lump sum to the beneficiaries of his choice. 


