

AGRICULTURE in County

(Joe E. Burkett, County Agent)

20% SUPER PHCSPHATE ON ALFALFA

Herman Schwarz of the Rayland community in Foard County states that on 7 acres of alfalfa in 1945 he got a yield of approximately 1,000 bales. Then he applied 400 pounds of 20% supphosphate per acre and in 1946 he produced seven cuttings and a yield of approximately 1,500 bales. Mr. Schwarz says he is thoroughly convinced that it pays to

use super phosphate on alfalfa. There are a good many farmers in the alfalfa producing area of Foard County who plan to apply 20% super phosphate to their alfalfa this fall and spring.

These farmers are applying anywhere from 200 to 400 pound per acre. In some instances the farmers get greater increases in yield the second year after the phosphate was applied than they did the first.

4-H EXPERIENCE BENEFICIAL

VETERANS'

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q...Is a veteran eligible for readjustment allowance benefit if he settles in Canada or Hawaii? A. Residence in the United States, its territories or possessions is a definite eligibility requirement for readjustment allowances. Veterans living in Canada are not eligible. Veterans living in Hawaii are eligible if they meet all other eligibility requirements.

Q. I obtained a G. I. loan on which the Government guarantee was \$2,500. Recently I lost my job and would I ike to know if I'm eligible for unemployment compensation provided in the G. I.

The fact that you obtained a G. I. loan does not affect your eligibility for reodjustment allowances. You may receive them if you meet the requirements specified by law.

Q. My son has been pursuing course of training under the G. Bill, but finds that he can't afford to continue and support him-self and family. Can be termi-nate his course at any time without notifying Veterans Administration?

A. A veteran should not quit his course of education or training without notifying or obtaining the approval of the Veterans Administration regional office handling his claim. This is necessary so that he will be qualified for further training.






