A meeting of the Baird FFA Chapter was held Tuesday night in the School Cafeteria, with Highway Patrolman Bob Favor as guest speaker.

President Franklyn Alexander presided over the business meeting.

Butch Smith and Franklyn Alexander were elected a chapter delegates to attend the District banquet to be held in Abilene. Elaine Henry will represent the Chapter at the District meet as Chapter Sweetheart.

Patrolman Favor spoke on the changes of state laws becoming effective Jan. 1, 1968.

The laws involving the students and what will be required of them: Special color for driver's licenses to be issued; special licenses for motor scooters, motor bikes and motorcycles; safety helmets; penalties for driving without a license; vehicle inspection stickers, changes made in the last State Legislature.

One of the subjects Patrolman Favor stressed was the safety of the seat belts. A requirement that must be installed in each auto from 1962 to the 1968 models.

A question and answer period was held between the chapter members and Patrolman Favor, in which the members seemed quite interested in what the new law require of them, and also of some laws they did not understand.

The speaker said that more people were killed in 1966 than any other year in history. However fewer people were killed in a certain period in 1967 than in the same period in 1966. In almost every accident, someone has violated one law or another. If you fail to abide by the laws set out by our state, and have contempt for people that enforce these laws, you are not hurting them, only yourself.

Closing statement by the patrolman was, "Remember the life you save may be your own."

President Alexander closed the meeting and asked guests to join the members in the Pledge to the Flag.

Refreshments were served by Jackie White and Jimmy Smith.

AUSTIN — It's election week once more all over Texas.

Voters in 154 counties will decide Saturday (Nov. 11) whether they want six more amendments to the State's Constitution. According to Secretary of State John Hill, voters in five areas of Texas will choose legislators to fill vacancies created by death or resignation. There are six vacant seats in the House of Representatives and one in the Senate.

A light to moderate vote is predicted November 11 is opening day of the deer and turkey hunting season in most counties. This means a lot of hunters will be in the field instead of the voting booth.

However election day is also Veterans Day, and backes of the proposed amendment to revive the veterans land program are staging an active get out the vote campaign. So are supporters of the two other amendments — the one authorizing the state to issue bonds to finance expansion of the Texas parks system and that permitting state officials to employ to hold more than one office.

Seventy candidates, including 14 Republicans, are running for legislative places. Republicans hope to improve their position. Presently they have only three representatives in the 150-member House and one senator in the 31-member Senate.

There are two representatives in Harris County; another in Cameron County; one in Matagorda and Wharton Counties; one in Travis County; and another in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties. Twenty Dallas candidates are running for the Senate seat of the late George Parkhouse.

Six constitutional amendments are on the ballot in the following order:

No. 1. To authorize counties to place all their tax revenues in a single general fund, rather than separate, special-purpose funds.

No. 2. To let local political subdivisions which have hospital districts spend tax money for mental health and mental retardation services.

No. 3. To revive the veterans land program through an additional \$200,000,000 bond issue, permitting war veterans, including those of the Vietnam conflict, to purchase land on low interest, 40 year payback loans.

No. 4. To permit counties to pay medical benefits for their law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

No. 5. To authorize a \$75,000,000 state bond issue (supported by an admission fee at selected parks) for park land buying and development.

No. 6. To permit non-elective state officials and employees to serve on state and federal boards and commissions if there is no conflict of duties.

This is the first general election in Texas since the "scratch out" method of voting was eliminated. Now an "X" indicates your choice.

TAX PICTURE BRIGHTENING — Top legislative budget planner took a new, slightly brighter reading on the tax outlook last week. But taxpayers still won't be exactly overjoyed.

Legislative Budget Board staff members trimmed their unofficial estimate of revenue needs in 1968 from \$192,000,000 to \$149,000,000. However, the latter calls for rigid budget economies which lawmakers will find hard to effect in the face of rising costs, growing population and increasing demands for better services.

LBB staffers estimated 1969 general fund spending at \$455,800,000. This is just \$3,000,000 above the top 1968 level. Figure does not include \$258,500,000 in automatic foundation school fund transfers and \$1,500,000 in water development fund allocations.

Governor's budget office,

pointing to an error in general revenue income estimates by the comptroller's office, said it appears that the 1968 tax bill, which legislators must pass in their special session, probably will be in the \$130,000,000 to \$150,000,000 range. Executive office earlier insisted that \$100,000 to \$130,000,000 would be adequate.

COURT SPEAKS — Third Court of Civil Appeals held an "arbitrary and capricious" the state agency's denial of an application to open a Fort Worth branch office of Oak Cliff Savings and Loan Association. Former State Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst denied the application in January of 1966.

Same court upheld at \$75,000 condemnation award for the purchase of downtown San Marcos land by the city's Urban Renewal Agency. Agency appealed the jury award of the Hays County court for 8,445 square feet of property as excessive.

UNEMPLOYMENT TAX CUT — Forty per cent of Texas employers will pay lower unemployment compensation payroll taxes next year — and save about \$15,000,000.

Reduction was made possible because the program trust fund exceeded \$300,000,000 on October 1. Under the law, tax is one-tenth of one per cent for each \$5,000,000 or portion thereof by which the fund passes \$300,000,000. Balance now is \$319,000,000. Cut is four per cent for employers affected.

Fifty-four per cent of the employers already have earned a minimum statutory rate of 1 per cent. Another six per cent are "excess cost employers" with earned experience rates of 3.1 per cent or more. Neither of these groups will be affected by reduction.

PARKS WORK SPEEDED — Sixty one existing state parks will reach the ultimate in usage and development by 1971, according to Deputy Director Robert G. Mauermann of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Twenty large scale construction projects now underway and four other contemplated are expected to be completed by then. Plans call for spending of \$3,400,000 on repairs and improvements in 17 other parks.

Major construction projects slated for this biennium include Bents/Rio Grande, Lake Brownwood, Caddo Lake, Palmetto, Goliad, Cleburne and Goose Island. Developed from scratch, during the past five years were the following: Falcon, Whitney and Martin Dies Jr. Bastrop, Davis Mountains, Old Fort Parker and Kerrville parks received major improvements.

Mauermann estimated \$12,500,000 will be spent in improving state parks in three years. He said construction projects totaling \$5,700,000 already have been completed and \$2,200,000 worth are in progress.

HAULERS HEARING — Nine truck lines, which currently carry motion picture film and several other specific commodities, seek authority from the Texas Railroad Commission to include any shipments up to 100 pounds.

Applications were opposed by bus lines and other trucking companies which felt the additional service was not necessary. Hearing required 17 weeks for witnesses.

Commission is studying a 250-page summary of testimonials.

Hunting Season Opens Nov. 11

Deer, turkey and quail season will open November 11 in Callahan County, and many other

counties in Texas. There are some counties with different opening dates, and to be sure, check with the local Game Warden or License Deputy and pick up a Texas hunting Guide.

In Callahan County, deer and turkey season is November 11 through January 1, both days inclusive. Quail season will open November 11 and run through January 31, both days inclusive.

Bag limit on deer is two legal bucks in Callahan County. A legal buck is defined as a deer having a hardened antler protruding through the skin on the head.

There are no antlerless or doe deer permits issued for Callahan County, therefore no antlerless deer can be killed. Bag limit on turkey is one gobbler or one bearded hen per season. Bag limit on quail is 12 per day, possession limit 36.

Duck season opens November 18 and runs through January 6. Daily bag limit is 4, not to include more than one Wood Duck, one Canvasback and two Mallards. Possession limit is 8, not to include more than two Wood Ducks, one Canvasback and four Mallards.

Geese and Brandt season is October 24 through January 6, bag and possession limit is 5 and not more than 1 Ross' gosse and in the alternative, 1 Canada goose or 1 white fronted goose.

If there is any question about any of these regulations, contact your local State Game Warden.
