Soil Conservation News of District

Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District, Lower Pease River District Board: W. C. Howard, Grady Halbert, S. Z. Bailey, I. H. Brannon, Claude Orr.

Plantings of Madrid sweet clover have been made on the following cooperators' farms: E. L. Ayers, Henry Borchardt, W. T. Dunn Estate, H. R. Zeibig, Charles Drabek and J. B. Fairchild. All plantings but one were in 40-inch rows. Madrid sweet clover is a biennial clover (makes seed crop on the second year) and is a good soil building crop and can be used either for hay or pasture. These fall plantings were made to determine whether or not it will stand the winter in a seedling stage. If these plantings die during the winter, they will be reseeded in February. The big advantage of fall plantings is that it will get earlier start in the spring and will furnish more grazing. Madrid clover can be grazed from June to six months the first year and about sixty days the second year if a seed crop is desired. Madrid clover also makes a good cash crop when allowed to produce seed.

C. O. Nichols has a fair stand of Hubam clover. This clover is annual and is also an excellent building crop.

The Madrid clover seed was given to the cooperators through the supervisors of the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District.

Crowell Football Players Placed on All-District Team

The Wichita Falls Record News announced the 9-A All-District football team Wednesday morning. Crowell High School had two boys, Dalton Biggerstaff, quarterback, and James Bice, right guard, on this team. Don Wilkins, District second team, the All-Crowell center, made the All-District second team. Two other Crowell boys, Fred Glover and Jimmy Rasberry, both tackles, received honorable mention.

These All-District selections were made by the coaches of the district, with each coach voting for only players on opponent's teams. The Holiday Eagles, district champions, and the Archer City Wildcats, each placed three boys on the first team.

Careless Handling of Wild Rabbits Causes "Rabbit Fever"

Austin, Texas—Tuleremia, or "rabbit fever," is transmitted to human beings through the careless handling of wild rabbits, and according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, every wild rabbit should be handled with extreme care from the time he is bagged, until he is placed on the table.

"If a rabbit is diseased, careless handling can cause tuleremia. This serious disease is transmitted from rabbits to human beings, usually through direct contact with the infected animal or with objects contaminated by the meat," Dr. Cox said. "Each year many persons contract tuleremia because they fail to use proper precautions in the handling of the rabbits which are killed for food."

Dr. Cox said that one of the first precautions recommended is to shoot only the healthy rabbits with enough energy to run away from the hunter as he approaches. A listless rabbit that falls to run is probably sick, and should not be taken by the hunter.

A second important safeguard is for the hunter or the housewife to use rubber gloves in cleaning and preparing the rabbit for cooking. The gloves should be sterilized after using, and the refuse and paper that has touched the rabbit should be burned. Hands should be washed thoroughly after the meat has been set to cook.

Adequate cooking is a final safeguard that should be observed at all times. To destroy any germs that may be present, the meat should be cooked at boiling temperature for at least twenty minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later.

By observing these safety rules, Texans may enjoy their rabbit hunts and rabbit dinners without fear of tuleremia.

S. S. Rodgers Issues Following Statement

W. S. S. Rodgers, chairman of the Board of the Texas Company today issued the following statement:

"The Thanksgiving holiday prevented my replying earlier to an erroneous statement issued under a Washington date line reporting that I would resign shortly, that our president, Harry T. Klein, would become chairman of the board, and that Secretary of Defense, James V. Forrestal, would resign and then become president of the Texas Company.

"There is not a word of truth in this rumor. The press services in my opinion have always tried to distribute accurate news, but apparently in this case someone with an ulterior motive is disseminating false information."

New Farm-Market Roads Designated for Foard County

In Foard County the following described roads are hereby designated as Farm-to-Market Roads subject to the concurrence of the Public Roads Administration and subject to the condition that Foard County will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the State, the State Highways Department has announced.

From U. S. 70, 2 miles west of Crowell, north to road intersection, a distance of approximately 2.6 miles.

From U. S. 70 at Thalia, south to road intersection, a distance of approximately 3.8 miles.

Upon fulfillment of the conditions of this order, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$55,800, and to assume the roads for maintenance upon completion of construction.

Veterans News There are a number of important deadline dates on GI Bill benefits which World War II veterans should keep in mind, Veterans Administration officials point out. GI education and training benefits have two deadlines, one to enter training and another to complete training. Education or training must be started within four years after discharge or by July 25, 1951, whichever is later.

As a general rule, education or training must be completed not later than July 25, 1956. The exceptions from the general rule are veterans who enlisted or re-enlisted before October 6, 1946. These men figure deadlines on GI Bill benefits from the date of their discharges and may start and complete their training later than other veterans.

Veterans may apply for guaranteed or insured GI loans for the use of buying or building homes, farms or business up until July 25, 1957.

Veterans who are discharged on or before July 25, 1947, can apply for readjustment allowances until two years after their date of discharge. However, no readjustment allowances are payable after July 25, 1952.

There is no deadline on the time a veteran has to apply for medical care or hospitalization. He may do this any time during his life. The same holds true for fil-

ing a claim for disability compensation or pension. Private dentist handled 90 per cent of the treatments completed during the past fiscal year ending June 30, 1948, under the federal program to treat eligible veterans for service-connected dental conditions, VA reports. More than 600,000 cases were treated by private dentists under the "home town" dental program and about 53,000 in VA clinics. Private dentists examined 420,000 veterans and VA staff dentists 280,000.

Customs peculiar to the time have been observed since ancient times. In Rome the practice sprang up of giving gifts to the emperor on New Year's Day. The custom came to be abused. Those who sought favors from the Emperor made costly gifts. Because the practice came to be a racket Emperor Claudius imposed a limit on the gifts that might be given. This practice was introduced into England as early as the time of Henry III. It is recorded that Queen Elizabeth supplied herself with jewels and wardrobe almost entirely from such gifts. Under the Tudors and Stuarts it was the habit of all classes to give gifts to friends with the wish that the new year might be happy. New Year's Day is ushered in by New Year's Eve. Since early times this has been quite an occasion in the larger cities. Every restaurant and night spot is the scene of a riotous party. In the rural sections of the country New Year's Eve observances take on the form of neighborhood parties and watch parties. The ringing of the church bells at midnight ushers in the





VETERANS'

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. My brother, a World War II veteran, made valid application for an automobile under Public Law 663, 79th Congress, but he died before delivery of the car could be made. May it now be paid by the VA and delivered to his estate?

A. No. Payment for the car by VA is contingent upon its delivery to the veteran.

Q. I received a leg injury in an automobile accident recently which requires outpatient treat-

ment. Will VA furnish the required treatment?

A. Outpatient treatment available only for service-connected disabilities.

Q. I assigned my armed forces leave bond to pay premium advance on my National Service Life Insurance, but I need it at this time. May I withdraw or part of it?

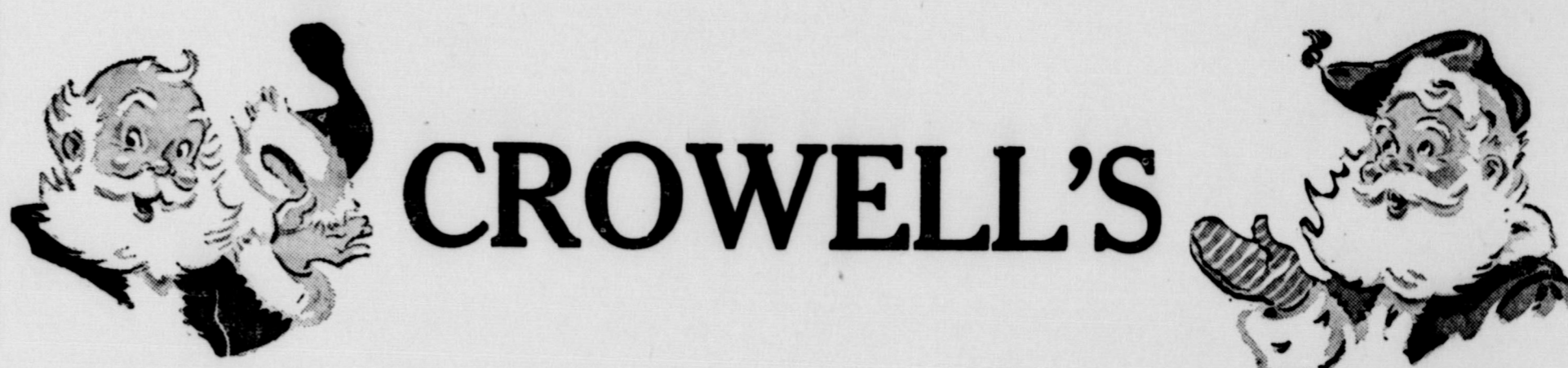
A. Yes. Upon written request of the insured, all or part of unearned premium may be refunded.

Q. I wrecked my automobile which was furnished by VA under provisions of Public Law 663, 79th Congress. Will you give me another car to replace it?

A. No. There is no provision under the law to provide more than one automobile to an eligible veteran.

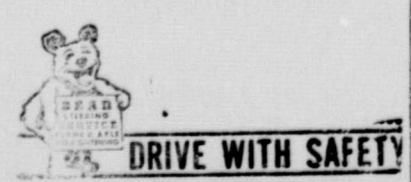

HISTORY
 Louisiana Purchase, Dec. 20—The purchase of what was known as the Louisiana Territory, from France on Dec. 20, 1803, is rated as the biggest real estate deal in the history of this nation. The territory involved, the whole Mississippi Valley, was over one million miles in extent. The price paid France was around twenty dollars a square mile. At the time of the purchase the area had a population estimated at ninety thousand. The transaction was completed during the administration of Thomas Jefferson. The territory involved in the purchase had been transferred to France by Spain some three years before. Jefferson, fearful of the consequence, sent James Monroe to Paris to work with Robert R. Livingston, the U. S. Minister to France, in bringing about the transfer. It so happened that France and England were engaged in war and France, fearful that the English might seize the territory, were willing and ready to sell. An agreement was reached on April 30, 1803, and the United States took possession in December of the same year.
