#### **VETERANS' OUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

Q. Is a widow of a World War I or a World War II veteran en-titled to a pension even though the husband had no service-con-

nected disability?

A. For World War I widows the answer is yes. Benefits are payable under Public Law 483, 78th Congress, if the veterans' service meets the requirements and the widow's income does not exceed limitations established by law. A World War II widow whose husband had no service connected disability is not eligible for pen-

### What We Think

(By Frank Dixon)

I listened with intense interest Winston Churchill's speech a few weeks ago before the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. It was a good speech delivered barger County in a group of nine counties in this area in the collecforceful style.

I have always enjoyed Mr. Churchill's speeches. I think that his speech made following Duncirk, when England was experiencing her darkest hour, remains s one of the most forceful and eloquent human utterances of all time. It was the thing that gave o the people of Britain the courage and the spirit and the faith continue the fight against the Hitler precision built war machine.

I like Churchill's speeches beause it seems to me that whether I agree with him or not they are the sincere words of a vital character that take on his rugged physique, his high courage, his hope, Russia naturally is critical of and his faith in the ultimate outcome of events for the best. 

The most promising compounds are listed as phenyl carbonate and x, x'dichlorodiphenyl ether.
