He is Dave Shanks, Farm-Ranch Editor of the Austin American-Statesman. Writing in his daily column, "Reu-ben's Half Acre," Shanks said:

"Farmers expenses are high and necessary purchases are draining them of their ready cash. But in general farmers aren't as badly off financially as the city white collar workers. So there is no real excuse for farm families, particularly those who have children, not contributing a substantial amount to the polio drive." He pointed out that last year in Austin, seven of the twenty-seven patients treated in the polio ward maintained by the Travis NFIP chapter were from outside the city.

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
