# DON'T BE UPSET BY WORRY, PSYCHOLOGIST

Don't fret about being worried, because if you didn't worry you'd about! That's the advice of a Northwestern University psycholo-

Said Associate Prof. Irwin A. Berg: "We think of worry and how unhappy we are, but have you ever thought that if we lack ed such concern, houses probably would burn down because we failed to extinguish the gas or a smouldering cigarette butt, bills probably wouldn't be paid, and we wouldn't even ask for a raise in pay because we weren't wor-ried about the cost of living? Many things that should get done would not be accomplished without con-

structive worry."
The core of Professor Berg's analysis of worry is that, while it hinders us, when carried to extremes, it also helps us physically, mentally and socially. Sincere worry, not just fretting and stewing, assists a person in achieving purposeful activity, he believes.

"A better name for constructive ill give a free demonstra- worry is 'concern'," explained Prof his "Guaranteed Rupture" fessor Berk. "It serves as a safe-ty valve. It is a sort of protection, an insurance policy that certain an insurance policy that certain

Emphasizing that worry is a normal reaction which requires learning and experience to control, ers in the middlewest and the psychologist said: "We learn during the past many to worry about some things and not about others. It's as bad for a person not to worry at all, that is, to insulate himself from problems, neglected, rupture may as it is to worry so much that spains, backache, weak-that's all he does."

### AID TO RECOVERY

Fire insurance is a mainstay of the economy. In thousands upon thousands of cases, it has meant the difference between solvency

and ruin. A recent issue of Forbes Magazine tells a typical story of how fire insurance serves the nation. Two years ago a New Jersey furniture company had a \$1,000,000 fire which almost totally destroyed the plant. For a time there was doubt if the 100-year old company could survive the blow. However, some time before the firm had been sold a Use and Occupancy insurance policy. This coverage guaranteed that a high percentage of the profits normally earned by the company would keep coming in, and, in addition, it

paid the salaries of key personnel. With this income to count on, the company moved to temporary quarters and started to rebuild It sent its salesmen out, and used newspaper and radio ads to let people know it was still in business and was going to stay there. This year, a concern which appeared to be doomed in 1947, will gross \$3,000,000, and give employment

to a small army of people. It is literally true that there is no risk too great or too small for fire insurance to cover. It will take care of a loss of a few dollars. And, at the other extreme, it will handle in stride a great disaster, such as the Texas City explosion. A fire insurance policy isn't exciting reading-but it represents an essential protection which has done much to make the development of the nation possible.—Industrial News Review.

### Facts of Upstream Water Development Being Discussed

Abilene—A further examination of the facts of upstream water development in the light of domestic water may change conclusions of the Department of Interior, D. A. Bandeen, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has written Secretary J. A.

The statement follows the 38page letter written by Secretary Krug, in transmitting a Texas water study to Senator Lyndon Johnson. In this letter Krug said, "It is doubtful that the repayment ability of the water users of many of the upstream develop-ments in Texas will ever be found to be sufficient to equal the re-imbursable costs."

This statement was challenged

It called upon Secretary Krug to apply the formula of economic loss to lack of water as well as flood damage to criteria upon which multi-purpose dams may be built by the federal government.

"A further examination of this conclusion, we believe, will produce a wholly contrary result,"

the letter said.

"You will note in our report several new approaches to and facts on this water resource de-

velopment problem, which I am sure will intrigue you."
They were listed:
First, that West Texas has whol-

ly insufficient water for domestic and industrial needs, which can only be overcome by upstream development.

development.

Second, a new approach to the water problem in computing the economic loss from lack of water as well as from flood damages.

Third, is the possibility of the government obtaining more reimbursable revenue from the sale of domestic and industrial water from small dams on the upper tributaries than under the present

tributaries than under the present multi-purpose dam policies. Bandeen also urged Secretary Krug to lend support to the Hoover commission recommendation that domestic water be given pri-ority of use in multi-purpose res-
