

### NOTICE OF ELECTION

On July 7, 1949, in compliance with the provisions of the Gilmer-Aiken school law (Senate Bill No. 116) passed by the 51st Legislature, the County School Board consolidated a number of rural school districts with the Crowell Independent School District.

This necessitates an election for assumption of outstanding bonds by the new district and for setting up a uniform maintenance tax rate.




