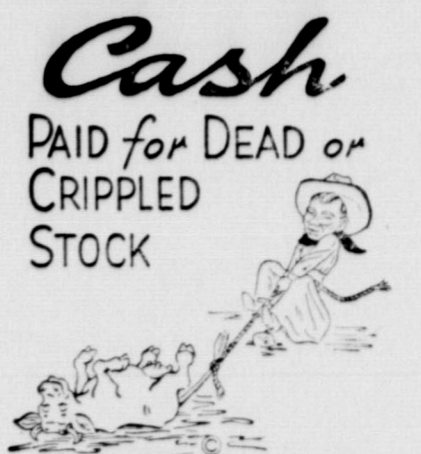

Two Minute Sermon

(By Thomas Hastwell)

Good Soil Produces Good Crops: I visited a farmer near the town in which I live. While I was there we walked over the farm looking at the livestock and the crops. When we had come to one field of corn I noticed that the corn growing in one part of it was much better than that in the rest of the field. The stalks were large and the ears larger and its colors were much better. "How does that happen," I asked, "that this part of the field is so much better than the other. Is it a different variety of corn?" "No," my friend said. "It is the same corn planted at the same time, and tended just as this other was tended. The difference is that the soil in the part of the field is better than in the other part of the field where the corn is not so good." I thought as he talked, how like the human family. The youngsters who grow up in the right atmosphere at home are better equipped for life than those who grow up in homes where the atmosphere and the surroundings are not so conducive to the best upbringing of children. The children, like the farmer's corn, reflect the homes in which they are raised.

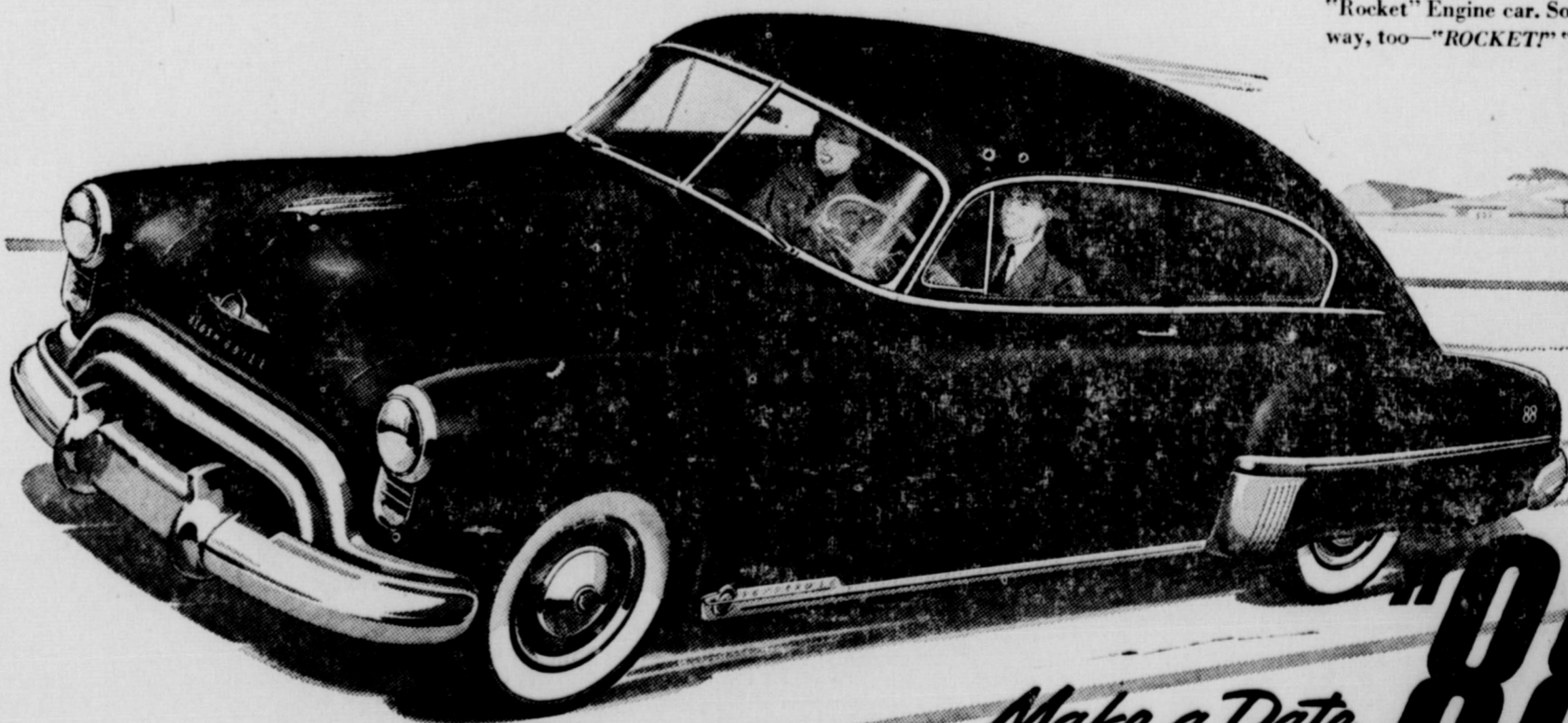
