**IOWA PARK SLIPS BY CROWELL IN DUAL MEET**  
The Iowa Park track team slipped past the Crowell Wildcats in a dual track meet at Iowa Park last Friday winning by 2 points, 64 1/2 to 62 1/2.

The inexperienced Wildcats battled the Hawks to a standstill until the high jump event. The Hawks all but swept this event, allowing Crowell only 1/2 point. This one-half point was Jon Sander's tie for fourth.

In the first race, the 100 yard dash, Crowell won first, second, and fourth, with Rouse Todd winning it in 10.5 seconds. In the next contest, the Hawks just about evened it up winning 1, 2 and 4 in the discus throw. Jimmy Rasberry won third place for Crowell, Iowa Park then went ahead by winning 1 and 3 in the 440 yard dash. Then in swift succession, Crowell won the 220 yard dash, and the 880 yard dash to again regain the lead.

In the 220 yard dash, Jimmy Rasberry and Rouse Todd won first and second, respectively, for the Wildcats. After about 400 yards the 880 yard dash evened close with Ginger Johnson leading. Robert Brock finished fourth.

With four men from each school entered in the mile run, F. L. Ballard and an Iowa Park miler ended in a dead heat for first place. Going in to the high jump event Crowell was leading by 2 points, but as already mentioned the Hawks all but swept this event to go 9-up on Crowell. However, in the final event, the shot put, the Wildcats managed to take 2, 3 and 4 places. Crowell's weight men—Hack Norman, Jimmy Rasberry and Gordon Bell—looked exceptionally well in this field with only the more experienced Johnny Worrell of Iowa Park besting their heaves.

So far this year Crowell is the only team in the district to give the Hawks a battle in track meets. Jimmy Rasberry and Rouse Todd were high point men of the meet with 15 and 14 points each.

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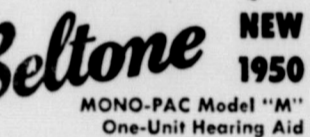

## Health Letter

Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas, Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer

Austin, Texas — Deaths from cancer in Texas reached a total of 7271 during the past year, indicating that a warning against cancer quacks and so-called cancer cures is justified by the State Health Department. Early diagnosis and competent treatment could have prevented many of these deaths, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"There are but two ways of treating cancer. First, by surgery and second, by the use of radium or x-ray. Treatment must be started early and in the hands of a competent surgeon. Surgery is relied upon to remove cancerous tumors and is used in nearly two-thirds of the cases. X-ray or radium is used to advantage for the remaining group. Frequently, the two methods are combined. Self-medication, serums, colored lights, pastes, sales, and diets are valueless.

"The great protection against cancer is early diagnosis. Every case is an emergency and it is unfortunate that a majority of those with cancer do not seek medical advice early in the first stages of the disease. No hope should be placed in fake cancer cures or treatments. Rather, the annual physical examination and an immediate reporting to your physician of any symptoms which are suspected to be the beginning of cancer should be relied upon. These symptoms are: any unusual bleeding from any body opening, any lump in the breast or other part of the body, any persistent sore, particularly on the face or mouth, and chronic indigestion. These conditions may not be cancer, but sometimes they are forerunners of the more common types of this disease. Where cancer is suspected, do not delay, but consult your physician at once."

## GRANDDAUGHTER HONORED

Wilda Ingram, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Ingram of Clovis, N. M., and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Hunter of Crowell, received two distinct honors on the same day last month. She received the DAR award as the "Good Citizen" of the state and also was chosen as the "AAUW Girl of the Month" for March.

An "A" student at Clovis High School where she is a senior, Wilda competed with 43 other girls in the state of New Mexico for the coveted DAR award, given on the basis of dependability, service, leadership and patriotism. On April 8 she will be given the latter honor by the American Association of University Women at a luncheon in Clovis.

# COMMON SENSE

We learn in grade school physiology that the body is made up of a bony framework, enclosing organs, and controlled by the energy from the brain through the nervous system.

Peculiarly, many forget this fundamental fact, and as time goes on, and when sickness is present in our bodies, we may think of the affected area as a loose structure in the body, rather than connected with the nervous system.

For example, in a case of heart trouble, the heart fails to function normally; consequently, symptoms of pain, shortness of breath, dizziness, et cetera, result. It is only common sense to locate the CAUSE rather than to try to care for the heart as a separate part of the body.

When one stops to think that the heart has a hookup or nerve connection in two ways—one set of nerves act as an accelerator to speed up function, and the other as an inhibitor to slow down function, it becomes clear why the "machinery" must all be in order to receive perfect results. How much better it is to restore the mental impulse supply for normal function.

It should be remembered that when any organ fails to receive its normal mental impulse supply from the brain through the nervous system, it will cease to function normally.

This, then, is the basis for sickness or disease.
