votes were cast, Daniel polled
1,231,881 votes, the largest num-
ber ever given a candidate in a
Democratic primary in Texas.

Run-Off Democratic Primary Will Be Held in Foard County Next Saturday, August 26; Fourteen Names on Ballot

The second Democratic primary
will be held in Foard County on
next Saturday, August 26th. Thir-
teen hundred and seven-
ty-six votes were cast in the first
primary on July 22. County Dem-
ocratic Chairman N. J. Roberts
says that Precinct No. 12, Good
Creek, has been consolidated with
Precinct No. 3 in Crowell, which
leaves only nine voting places in
the county.

Voters in the nine voting boxes
will mark ballots containing four-
teen names. The polls will open
at 8 a. m. and will close at 7 p. m.
Voters of Precincts Nos. 1, 2, 3,
and 4, will mark their ballots in
the court house in Crowell as in
previous elections. Precinct No. 1
voters will mark their ballots in
the county clerk's office; No. 2 in

the county judge's office; No. 3
in the southwest corner of the base-
ment, and No. 4 in the county at-
torney's office. Bob Abston will
be presiding officer of Precinct
No. 1, L. A. Andrews of Precinct
No. 2, R. C. Johnson of Precinct
No. 3. A presiding officer for
Precinct No. 4 has not been ap-
pointed.

Presiding officers and the loca-
tion of other polling places in the
county have been announced as

Fourteen names appear on the
ballot with only two local con-
testants, one for Commissioner of
Precinct No. 2 with Bax Middle-
brook and W. F. Stater as candi-
dates. The other is for Precinct
Chairman, Precinct No. 8, Grady
Halbert and Jack Welch.

County and John C. White of
Wichita County.

Voters are urged to cast their
ballots early, in the morning if
possible, so that the votes can be
counted at an early hour. Election
returns in the different vot-
ing boxes of the county should
be phoned to the county chair-
man, N. J. Roberts, or brought to
Crowell as soon as the counting
has been completed. The Texas
Election Bureau in Dallas is anx-
ious to get early returns on the
campaigns for state offices.

team.

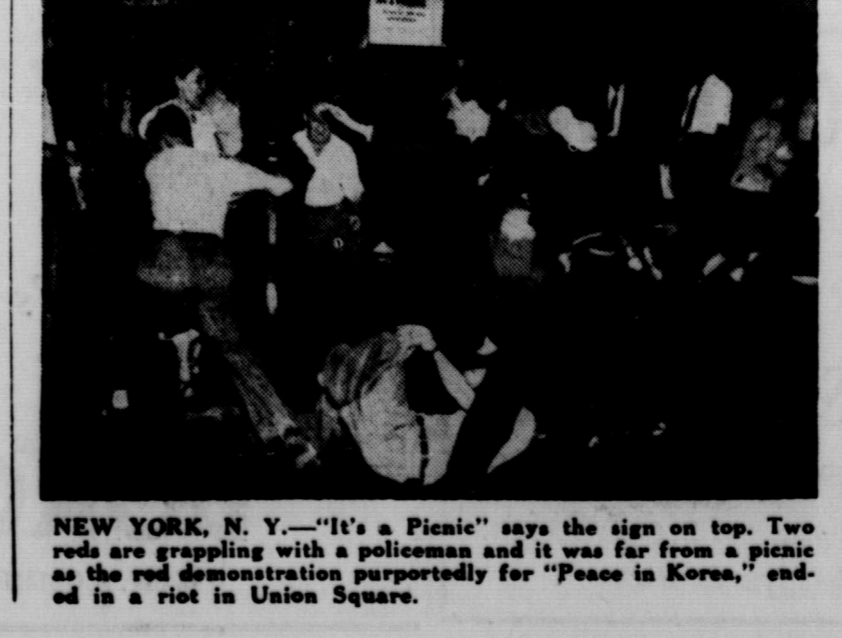

the bird was shot.
Thousands of mourning doves
have been banded this year in an
effort to gain information as to
migration of the birds as well as
to determine the percentage of
kill in various areas along the
flight ways of the birds, Mr. Boy-
nton said.

2.23 Inches of Rain Falls Here This Month

Up to and including the rain
here Monday night which measur-
ed .56 of an inch by the Government
gauge at the Crowell State Bank,
2.23 inches of rain had been re-
corded in Crowell during the
month of August, although much
heavier rains had been received
in other parts of the county.

Monday night over two inches
of rain fell in the Foard City com-
munity, about two inches in the
Thalia community and a two-
or three-inch rain fell at the Johnny
Marr place in the Vivian com-
munity. It was not learned how much
rain fell in other parts of the
county, but it is presumed that
every portion of the county re-
ceived some moisture.

Moisture received in the months
of June, July and August has been
unusually favorable. According to
the gauge at the bank, 3.09 inches
fell here in June, 3.95 in July and
2.23 so far in August.

Means of Helping Cut Flowers to Stay Fresh Longer

All of us like flowers in the house, but most of us do not realize that they can be made to last longer with a little special care, according to Mrs. Mary D. Brown, Acting Foard County Home Demonstration Agent.

Here are a few simple rules that Mrs. Brown recommends:
1. Cut off the stem ends at a decided slant so that no stalk rests flat on the bottom of the container.
2. Plunge the entire stem into

cool water for several hours before arranging the flowers. This allows them to absorb as much water as possible and crisp up to withstand the warm dry rooms. To prevent the warm dry rooms, strip off extra foliage below the water line as it rots quickly and causes bacterial action.

Salt or aspirin in the water will delay this and charcoal will keep the water sweet.

4. Keep the container clean, do not allow the green scum to cling to its inside curves. Changing the water daily helps also.

5. Since water circulation is essential make a new standing cut on the stem each day, as the old cut tends to heal or harden.

6. Plants with milky or juicy stalks such as poppies, dahlias, etc., should be sealed to prolong life. This may be done over a gas flame or by scalding in boiling water.

7. Sprays of shrubbery have had surfaced stalks and should have small cross slits cut on the slanting edge so they can absorb more water.

8. Some stems are smooth and waxy and support large flower heads for such slender stalk. Snapdragons, mums and stock are examples of this. They will absorb more water and last longer if the end of the stem is crushed.

If you follow these rules, says Mrs. Brown, your cut flowers will last much longer.
