Largest Hereford Show Expected at T-O Fair Oct. 2-7

Iowa Park, Texas, Aug. 23 (Spl.)—The largest Hereford show in its history is expected at the 22nd annual Texas-Oklahoma Fair and Southwest Oil Exposition which will be held in Iowa Park Oct. 2-7.

The show is attracting entries from Pueblo, Colo., to deep South Texas with a large number of leading Hereford ranches throughout this area vying for the \$5,000 purse divided among the 20 classes to show.

Entries in the Hereford show, which is open to all registered breeders, must be registered with the American Hereford Association.

Judging in the Hereford division will be held on Wednesday, Oct. 4.

The dairy show offers \$1,000 in premiums with breeds limited this year to two: Jersey (\$600) and Holsteins (\$400) plus a special herdsman award. A large number of entry blanks have already been requested in this section of Oklahoma and Texas.

HISTORY

Labor Day, September 4: The plan of setting aside one day in the year on which labor might be recognized originated in 1882 with Peter McGuire, president of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America. In May of that year he submitted a proposal to the Central Labor Union in New York that labor set aside a day and stage a parade and that the parade be followed by a picnic, the proceeds of which would be divided among the participating organizations. The first Monday in September was suggested as the day. The first celebration occurred with a parade in New York City. On October 9, 1884, the Federation of Organized Labor Unions of the United States and Canada meeting in Chicago voted to make the celebration national. On February 21, 1887, the legislature of Oregon set apart the first Monday in September as a state holiday in honor of labor. Within three months similar action had been taken by four other states. By 1894, the day had been made a legal holiday in thirty states and on June 28, Congress passed an act making it a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and in the territories. The day is now observed in every state. Labor Day has become to be one of the most generally observed holidays in the United States.

Organized Greed May Destroy Republic, Ed Gossett Says

The following statement made by Congressman Ed Gossett during the debate on 16-billion dollar supplemental appropriation bill for the Armed Services is taken from the Congressional Record of August 25, 1950:

"Mr. Chairman, about an hour ago the President issued an order taking over the railroads on tomorrow.

"The big railroad labor organizations' threat to call a strike at this time, their forcing the Government to take over the railroads, make them allies of Joe Stalin. In time of war or national emergency patriots or good citizens would offer to work 48 hours for 40 hours pay, rather than strike to get 48 hours' pay for 40 hours' work. Intelligent, honest Americans are now asking themselves, 'Have we become so morally bankrupt as to permit the economic strangulation and destruction of the Republic by organized greed or economic piracy?'"

"Industrial abuses, the hoarding of labor by industry, slowdowns, strikes, the 40-hour week, profiteering, featherbedding, and so forth, added unnecessarily \$100,000,000,000 to the cost of World War II. These same practices, to a lesser degree, have caused unreasonable inflation since World War II. Now the chiselers, the cheaters, the grafters, and the modern hijackers are getting ready to take advantage of the present emergency.

"Frankly, I am more afraid of the 'reds' and the 'pinks' within our borders than I am of the 'reds' and the 'pinks' in other lands. I am more afraid of Communist allies within this country than of Communist allies abroad. It seems preposterous that big labor bosses would sabotage this Nation, but apparently they are able and willing to do that very thing, all for selfish, shortsighted personal gain. Theirs is the philosophy of 'eat, drink, and be merry, for tomorrow ye may die.'"

"Mr. Chairman, we can recapture excess profits to a large degree, but we cannot recapture lost production or wasted manpower. We cannot regain freedom after we have become slaves.

"Strikes in major industries or strikes that cripple the country's war effort should not be tolerated."

What We Think (By Frank Dixon)

In the town in which I live a group of men meet every two weeks to discuss some question of the times. The subject for the next meeting is always announced at the close of the meeting that the members who care to can study up on the question and be better prepared to discuss it at the following meeting.

The idea was originated by the Superintendent of Schools who began by inviting eight or ten men to his home one evening. After the first meeting the group proceeded to meet at the homes of the various members of the group in turn.

In filling the membership of the group, care was taken by the members to propose for membership only those persons whom it was known would be interested in a study of this kind, since the success of the venture depended upon the sincere interest of every member of the group in studies of this kind.

The topic for consideration for the evening is presented by two members of the group who receive their assignment at the previous meeting. My town numbers about 3000 in population, yet it was not long until the group numbered around thirty and the discussion showed that without exception the men were sincere students of the questions of the day.

The project did a number of things. It got together a group of kindred spirits who enjoyed digging into matters of this kind and presenting their views to their fellows and defending their positions when they were opposed by other members of the group.


After joining the group, many of the men had previously merely skimmed the surface of even important matters of the news, began to dig into them. They turned to reading more widely, and reading different types of magazines, and literature. They took a keener interest in being informed and in

Members of the group found themselves studying present day questions to a greater degree than they ever had before. They found that by presenting their ideas in the meetings they developed their ability to express themselves fluently and acceptably before their fellows. Many towns the size of Crowell are without the cultural events that come to larger places, and as a result this desire on the part of men goes unsatisfied. I recommend the project as a desirable one for the thinking men of any community.





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U. S. CONSTITUTION

The U. S. Constitution sets up the unique system of separation of powers under which: 1. All executive power is vested in the President; 2. All legislative power is vested in the congress; 3. All judicial power is vested in the supreme court and such inferior courts as congress may from time to time establish.

Each of the three branches may "check" the power of the other two. Thus, the President may check the power of Congress through his veto power; but this may be overridden by a two-thirds vote; and he exercises a check on the courts through his power of appointment.




