## Football Season Gets Underway Today with 30 Prospects Reporting Workouts; Eight Lettermen Back

Crowell Wildcat football had its initial workout for the season last Tuesday morning under the guidance of Coach Ammonett and Gordon E. Sanders. Eight lettermen will have eight lettermen back for the season. However, only five of them, Jim Paul Norman, Harold Ribble and Harold Ribble from the 1949 season. Sanders was a starter in the games last season and he is one of Crowell's letter carriers this year. Jimmy and Hack Norman were the best tackles in District last season, but Coach Ammonett is using these two on the backfield part of the team. Harold Ribble was

Crowell's regular center last year and should be able to fill that position again even though he weighs only 130 pounds. Jim Paul Norman, Charles Pittillo and Joe Williams were Crowell's ends last year. One of these boys might be shifted to the guard position. Crowell lost all of its guards last season and Coach Ammonett thinks the team will go about the way the guards play. Buster Laquey should be a starter in the backfield this season as he played some good ball on the B team last year. The following boys are squads from the 1949 team and some of them will play lots of ball this fall: Don Gobin, Gene Pogue, Gordon Wood Bell, Ginger Johnson, Jimmy Tom Cates, Lee Roy Bice, Billy Johnson, Leon Pechacek, Robert Brock and Jimmie Franklin. Ayers, John Thomas Diggs, Henry Teague and Billy Abston. Workouts will be held twice daily, 8:00 in the morning and 7:30 in the evening, until school starts. The workouts will be held on the local field. The field has been plowed and re-sodded and will be in good shape for the home games this fall.

### J. W. Rutherford Buried at Truscott Sunday Afternoon

Funeral services for J. W. Rutherford of Knox City, who died Saturday, August 12 in a Knox City hospital, were held at the Truscott Baptist Church last Sunday afternoon, August 13, at 3:30 o'clock. Ralph E. Branum, pastor of the Truscott Baptist Church, was in charge of the services. The East All-Stars were coached by Ki Aldrich, former T. C. U. star and teammate of Todd's on the Washington Redskins team for several years. The two teams played on about even terms with only one first down difference. However, Bobby Price, star from Haskell, kicked both extra points to give the West the one-point margin. The East boasted more backfield stars in the lineup,

but the West, led by Charles Radford of Quanah, had a better line. Ray McKown of Dumas, former Crowell boy and brother of Paul and Marvin McKown, former Wildcat stars, stood out in the West backfield. He was ably assisted by Kenneth Buckley of Childress. Danny Powell of Archer City and Billy Bookout of Wichita Falls, and two Oklahoma boys, Cleon Failes of Mangum and Gerald Smith of Elk City, were the East boys that figured in the scoring. ## Foard County Man Charged as Sex Offender

A 50-year-old ranch laborer is in jail here after charges of rape and incest had been filed before Justice of the Peace Ben Greening. The man charged was Melvin Arthur Gepner. Bond was set at \$5,000 on each charge, after Gepner had signed written statement in connection with sex relations with his two teen-age daughters.

The arrest was made Saturday by Sheriff J. L. Gobin at Gepner's home 12 miles south of Crowell, where he lived with his wife, the two daughters and a son. A member of the family signed the complaint against Gepner. Gepner made his statement to Leon Douglas of Vernon, District Attorney-elect. He waived preliminary hearing upon arraignment before Justice of the Peace Greening and was held in jail in default of bond. He was brought before Greening by Wilbarger County Attorney Tom Davis, who was substituting for Foard Co. Attorney Foster Davis, and Texas Ranger Jim Geer of Vernon.

It is becoming more and more evident that safety slogans and appeals to drive more carefully are not going to solve the highway accident problem. The toll of dead and injured continues to mount. It is going to take something else more powerful than sensible appeal and more persuasive.

There are several good arguments against scare buying or hoarding of food and other items. At the present time there is an abundance of everything for everyone. Scare buying, could, if generally joined in, create a scarcity in any item. The immediate result would be a sharp advance in price. Let the price advance on a few items and it will automatically advance upon all items as buyers turn to the cheaper items. If we have sharp price advances within the next few months they are going to be brought on by scare buyers and the hoarders. Right here it might be said that a hoarder is one who buys more than he normally buys. The family that habitually buys a hundred pounds of sugar at a time or a case of one hundred bars of laundry soap is not hoarding when it makes a like purchase, but the family that habitually buys five pounds of sugar and five or six bars of laundry soap at one time, is hoarding when it buys a hundred pounds of sugar and a case of laundry soap. The best system is to buy just what you need even though you have the money to buy offener. In this way you let the other fellow who may not have the money or the desire to overbuy, have a chance and an equal opportunity. Don't let a little money be reason we are fighting this war—because some people in this world are unmindful of others and need to be reminded that their neighbors have rights also. Scare buying or hoarding may make it necessary to invoke rationing again. We all remember what an inconvenience that proved to be. Rationing was necessary in the time of scarcity that the man with small means might have an equal share of the limited supply with his neighbor who was fortunate enough to have more resource. If rationing and higher prices come they will come as a result of scare buyers and hoarders.

Congressmen and Senators are hearing from American women who are indignant over the fact that untrained boys and young men are being sent into Korea inadequately armed, and sent against superior Russian tanks. The women are not questioning the necessity of repelling the invaders. They are resentful over the fact that in view of a powder keg situation such as exists in Korea and other countries due to unwise settlements following World War II, that training was not kept up to fit men for an emergency that it has been known all along faced this country sooner or later. The women are asking why, since it has been known ever since the end of World War II that Russia was preparing for another war and that eventually we would have to oppose her, that we have failed to make any preparation either in the training of men or in the manufacture of modern equipment.

Only Men Registered in 1948 S. S. Act Need Report Status Change

Austin, Texas, August 10 — Some men registered under the World War II draft act, now past 40 and 50 years of age, are attempting to advise old local boards of changes of address and status, although these draft boards have been out of existence for years. As a result, these cards and letters are flooding present local boards and Selective Service headquarters here. Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, advised today that "these men no longer have to advise of any change of address or status, as the law under which they registered was terminated by Congress in 1947."

The only men who are obligated to keep local boards advised are those registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948, which became law on June 24, 1948, the state director pointed out. "Any man who has registered with Selective Service in 1948, 1949 or 1950, is obligated to advise his local board of address and status changes," General Wakefield said. "Any man who registered with any local board prior to those years is not required by law to do so."

The state director said that every man should ask himself the question: "Should I be registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948?"

The answer, says General Wakefield, is simple. If the man was born on August 30, 1922, or after, he is required to be registered, provided he is not under 18. If he was born prior to August 30, 1922, he is not required by law to be registered under the Selective Act of 1948. Males are required to register on their 18th birthdays or within five days thereafter.

oil which would not gum could also be obtained. A company of men in Hartford, Connecticut, was formed for the purpose of developing the production of petroleum in 1858. This company sent Colonel Drake into northwestern Pennsylvania to prospect for oil. Colonel Drake located his first well near Titusville, Pa. He hired the village blacksmith and his two sons to help him. The project was thoroughly ridiculed by the people of that area. Oil was encountered on August 27, 1859, at a depth of 69 feet. 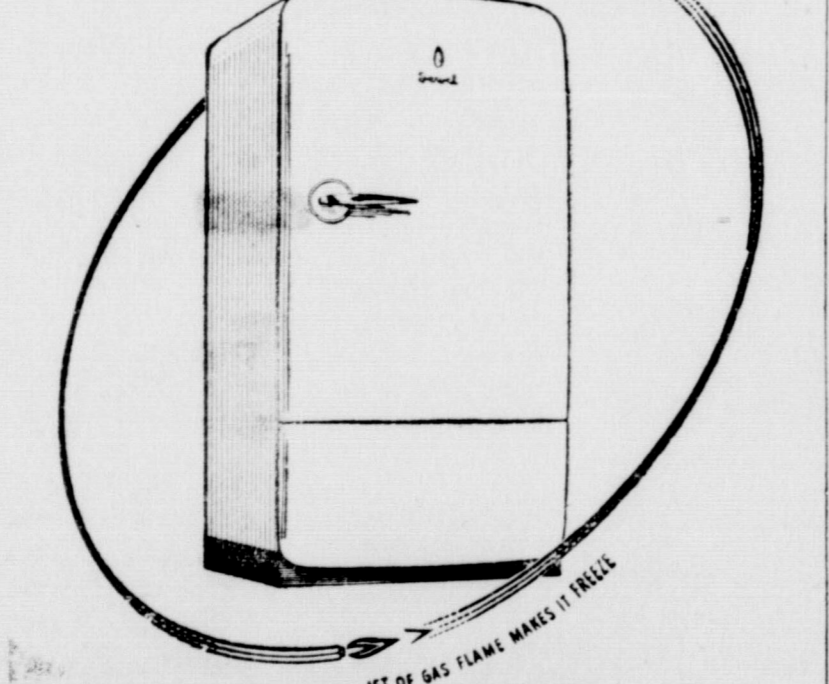

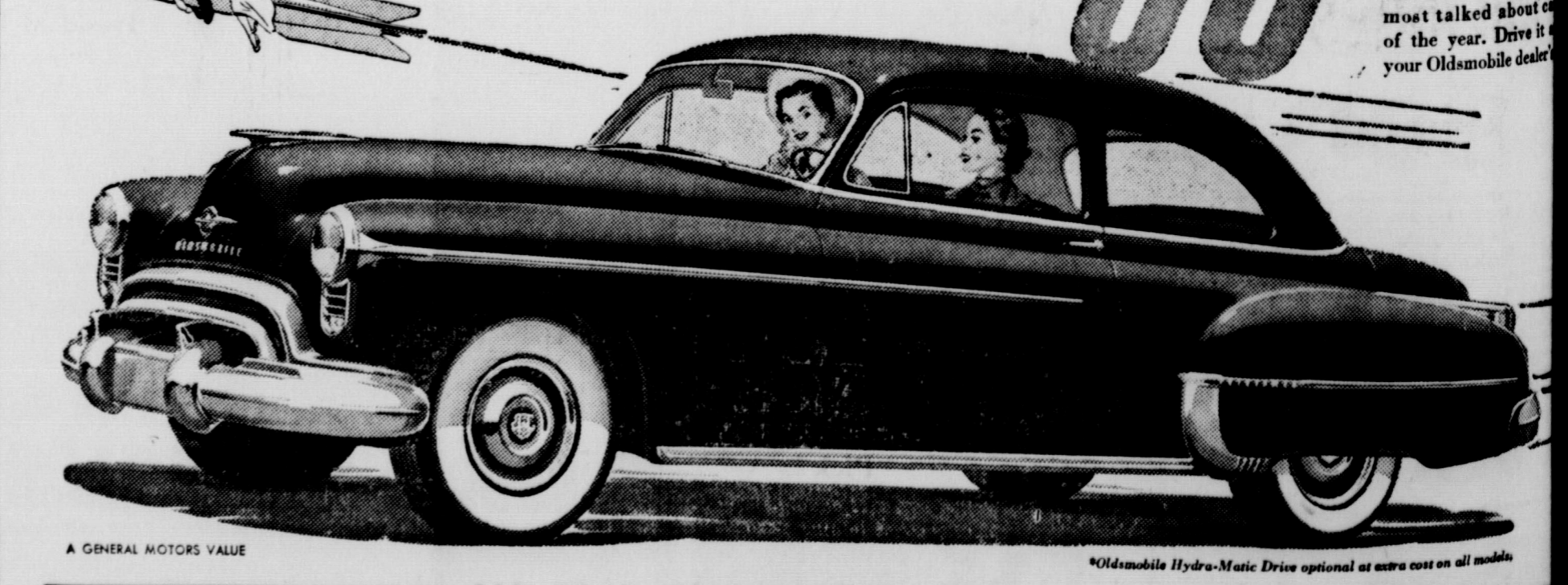

## New Strides Made in Saving Animal Lives

Miami Beach, Fla., Aug. 24—Newest advances in the medical care of livestock and pets were described here this week at the American Veterinary Medical Association's national convention.

Leading veterinarians of the United States, Canada and Latin-American countries told of these strides:

BAL (British Anti-Lewisite), developed in wartime as an antidote for poison gas, has proved effective in saving the lives of animals poisoned by arsenic.

Radium and x-ray treatments have been used successfully in treating cancer of the eye and various kinds of tumors in valuable farm animals.

A fresh clue to the cause and prevention of milk fever in cows has been uncovered through studies on "free fatty acids" in the blood of cattle.

New research has shown that brucellosis, a serious disease of animals and human beings alike, can be transmitted to cows through artificial insemination.

The campaign to eradicate foot-and-mouth disease from Mexico has been aided by the development of a test that permits quick distinction between foot-and-mouth disease and a closely similar virus infection called vesicular stomatitis.

## Hog Production More Profitable with Home-grown Grain

The present condition of rising prices makes hog production more profitable for farmers who have home-grown grain on hand, and the pork producer who feeds a ration that will put the most economical gains on his hogs receives the widest margin of profit.

Farmers should not allow their attention to be diverted from the advantages of feeding a balanced ration to hogs by the present rising hog prices and favorable feeding prices, according to Joe Burkett, County Agent.

Neglecting to include the necessary amount of protein supplement reduces the digestibility of the ration, raising the feed required per pound of gain and reducing the margin of profit. Burkett says that a farmer who has home-grown grain can get economical gains by including a good protein supplement and providing a good pasture to insure that the nutritional deficiencies of the corn or other grain are met.

He points out that corn or sorghum grain alone produces slow and costly gains, but when the grain is supplemented with the correct protein and mineral supplements, the rate of gain is speeded up and the cost of the gain is reduced.

## National Guard Draft Registrants to Have Induction Postponed

Austin, Texas, Aug. 9—State Selective Service headquarters received official notification by mail this morning from National Headquarters that draft registrants enlisted in an organized unit of the reserves or National Guard will have orders to report for physical examination or induction postponed.

Such postponements will be for an indefinite time "until terminated by the Director of Selective Service" in Washington. This means that such registrants can join organized units either before or after being placed in I-A, before or after receiving an order to report for physical examination, or before or after receiving an order to report for induction.

Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, said that draft registrants who have joined or join such organized units of the reserve or National Guard "swap one liability for another."

General Wakefield pointed out that all reservists have a liability for call to active duty.

"All reservists," he said, "regardless of their Selective Service status, are subject as reservists to call to active duty by their respective services. Calls to active duty as reservists and delays granted certain reservists because of their civilian occupations are responsibilities of the services concerned, carried out under policies established by the Department of Defense. They are not functions of the Selective Service System."

Under the terms of the new directive Selective Service registrants who are commissioned officers or warrant officers in the reserves or National Guard can get similar postponements.

## Salvation Army in Texas Alerted to Needs of War Emergency

Dallas, August 13—The Salvation Army in Texas is alerted to the needs of the war emergency, and is organizing in every Texas city and town where it operates to provide its familiar Red Shield services for the men and women of the armed forces. Lt. Col. John A. Morrison, Texas divisional commander, announced today.

The Salvation Army already is financing and operating a number of Red Shield clubs throughout the country which formerly were under the direction of United Service Organizations (USO).

"These centers will be increased as the need of the military personnel demands," The Salvation Army Commander announced.

Colonel Morrison said that some thought has already been given by the Salvation Army to a national campaign to raise money for the servicemen's clubs, either

through Community Chests, or as an independent campaign. "This will not be necessary," he said, "if USO is reactivated." He pointed out that USO is still a legal corporation and can be reactivated by the President, if and when the need arises. In that event, the Salvation Army would transfer the interim services which it is now mapping into the USO of which it is an integral part.

## Santa Fe Reduces Freight Damage

Santa Fe's intensified program to reduce damage to freight shipments is showing outstanding results, according to a statement made recently by George H. Minchin, the road's operating vice president.

"The yardstick used to determine performance is the ratio of payments for damaged or lost shipments to total freight revenue, and in the first five months of 1950 this ratio declined 41 per cent under the similar period in 1947 when the present intensified campaign was inaugurated," Minchin said. "The shippers are benefitting directly from the program which has been instituted," Minchin added.

Santa Fe's improvement has resulted from a combination of increased personal contacts with shippers to assist them in their methods of packaging and loading freight, regular meetings between officers and employes along Santa Fe's lines emphasizing the need for improving service to patrons, together with new and improved equipment.

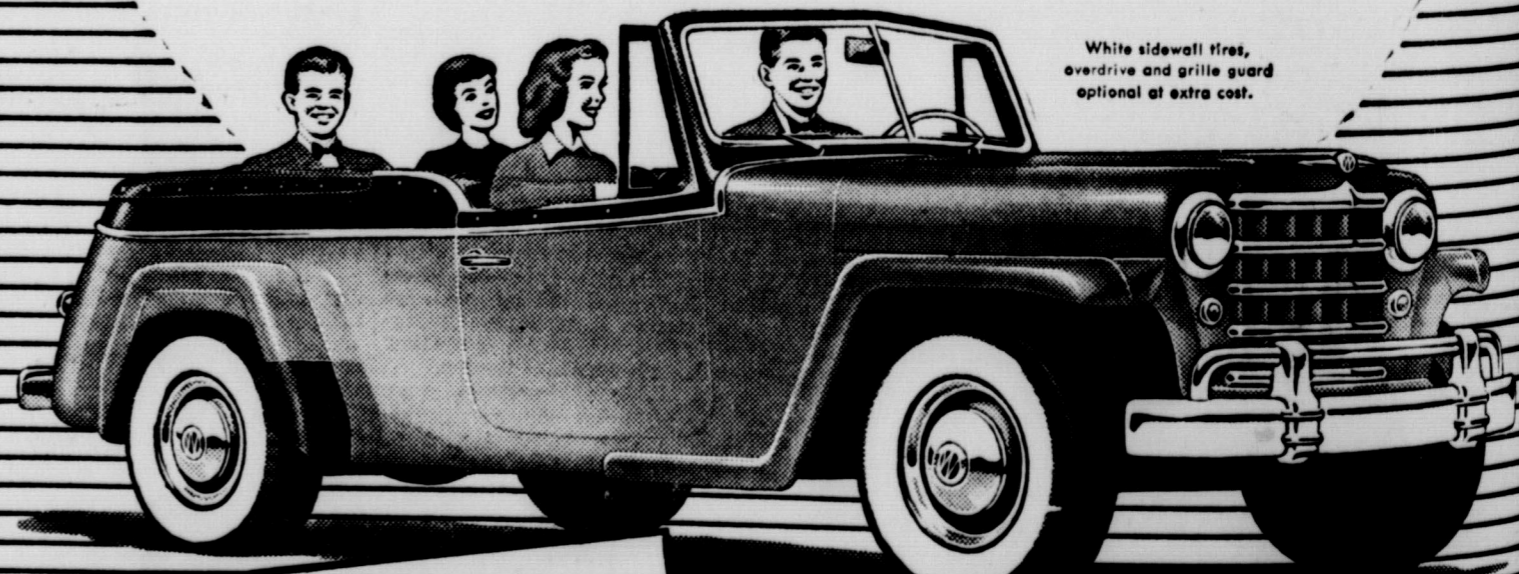
