## A VISIT TO THE NEWS OFFICE

On September 7, four English III students, Elba Caddell, Camille Todd, Jimmy Franklin and Jimmy Woods, made a visit to the Foard County News office to get information on how our newspapers are published each week.

After explaining to the editor, Mr. Klepper, the purpose of the visit, he instantly took them to the machine called the Linotype, meaning line of type. He explained that in this machine words are typed out and are molded on slabs of hot metal. Words are put in sentences after they are typed out

and made on the Linotype. When all the lines are ready, it goes to the printing press, where the paper is printed.

On the printing press, ink, looking very much like tar, is poured in bars over the rows of linotype. White paper is put in place and rolled over the type sheets. The paper is then trimmed and folded by the printing press.

Now it is ready for the subscribers kept in galleys, which have their names and addresses. After ink is put on the names and the paper is pressed on it, the papers are ready to be sent out.

If pictures go in the paper, the pictures are sent to Dallas, where impressions of the pictures are made on mats. The mats are put in a machine having melted metal poured over them. An impression goes on the metal and is placed on the printing press among the lines of type. If the metal is too high in places, it is chiseled out

with a router. The committee of students thoroughly enjoyed the visit. They plan to go back next Wednesday in order to see the Linotype machine and presses in operation.
