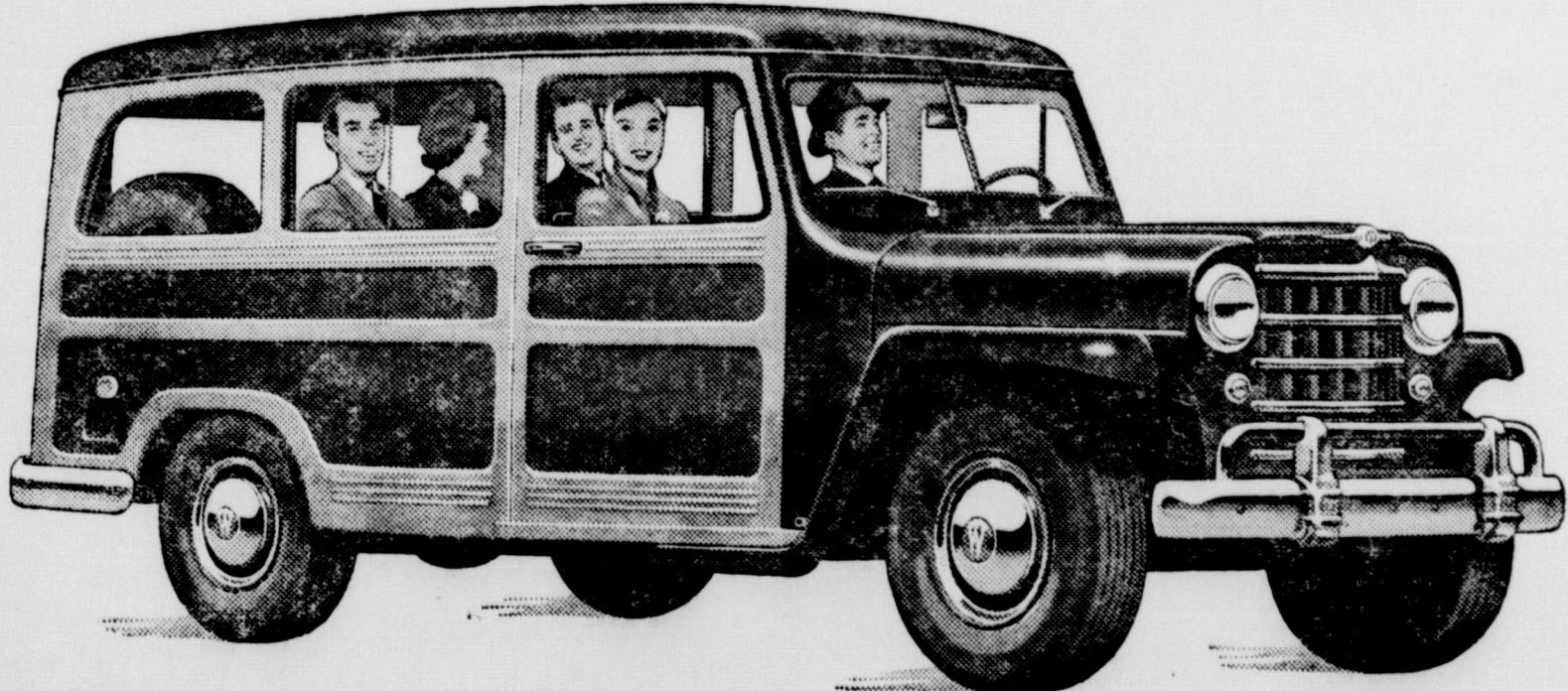

**Washington Newsletter**

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19, 1951—This is our first weekly newsletter for this session of Congress. Henceforth, these letters will be prepared on Friday of each week and mailed to all papers in our District.

In many speeches and letters for many months, I have stated that our country was in grave peril; that to survive, we must maintain, (1) economic stability, and (2) military invincibility. The Communist program is clear. The Communists, both domestic and foreign, expect us to destroy ourselves. They hope we will bleed our country white through extended supply lines and guerrilla warfare in various parts of the earth. If this does not work, they hope and expect our country to collapse from within.

All good Americans, of course, are determined that such will not be our fate. However, we can destroy our democracy in our efforts to preserve it.

A case in point is the proposed Universal Service and Training Act submitted to the Congress yesterday through the Secretary of Defense, Mr. George C. Marshall. This is not only a universal draft-universal training bill, but it goes much further. It proposes registration at 17, draft at 18. Then it proposes a gigantic rehabilitation program for all young men who may be rejected for physical or mental reasons, such physical and mental rehabilitation to be done, of course, at government expense. now spent on GI education would be but a drop in the bucket. It further proposes to draft and train in government schools annually, 75,000 doctors. This is socialized medicine in one package. Such complete regimentation of a country's manpower was never before proposed by anybody at any time within a democratic nation. Congress will not pass such a bill, the high brass notwithstanding.

Chief witness for the Department of Defense on this monstrous bill has been the foreign-born, controversial Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, Assistant Secretary of Defense in charge of manpower.

On November 10, when the nomination of Mrs. Rosenberg was announced, I made the following statement:

"The appointment of a foreign-born female social worker to be an assistant secretary of Defense is preposterous. Politics, especially in a time of national peril, should be secondary, not primary.

It is hoped that the Senate will exercise good judgment and refuse to confirm Mrs. Rosenberg. She doubtless is a very fine woman but we have at least 100,000 native-born American men better equipped for this job than she is."

While I do not know that Mrs. Rosenberg is the architect of this so-called Universal Service and Training Act, it reads like the work of some visionary, impractical social worker, to say the least.

Congressman Olin Teague of Texas heads up a Subcommittee of the Veterans' Affairs Committee, investigating fraud in the GI Educational Training Program.

When Congressman Teague's report is published, it will shock and startle the country. Even some of our leading educational institutions have been guilty of swindling the Veterans' Administration of many thousands of dollars.

The House today passed a Resolution calling on the United Nations to brand Red China as an aggressor nation. We should go much further than this. We should stop all trade with Red China and should compel some of our allies to stop their trade with Red China until she makes atonement for her unlawful and outrageous Korean campaign. Furthermore, if and when the issue of seating Red China as a member of the United Nations comes to a vote in the Security Council, America should certainly exercise her veto power. This would be our first veto. It's hard to imagine a more appropri-

## TANK CARS HAVE LONG HISTORY

The modern railroad tank car is a descendant of the flat car loaded with barrels of oil and used in the early 1860's. In 1865, wooden tanks, holding 40 to 50 barrels each, were placed upright on a flat car. Soon these were replaced by iron tanks holding 90 barrels each. By the late 60's, the horizontal tank car came into use. Since that time, although the design has not changed greatly, safety devices and insulation improvements have been added.

The typical railroad tank car today has a capacity of about 8,000 gallons, although some may carry up to 12,000 gallons. At the beginning of 1950, nearly 100,000 tank cars supplemented the movement of oil by pipe lines, tankers and barges.

## Now Is the Time to Plant Roses, H. D. Agent Announces

"Now is the time for us to plant roses," says Mary D. Brown, Acting County Home Demonstration Agent. "The first thing we need to do is select a place where the sun is at least half of the day. However, the roses should not be planted under trees or next to hedges for best growth."

"To prepare the bed, clear out weeds and grass and dig a trench 12 to 15 inches deep and two feet wide for each row. Place 3-5 inches of well rooted fertilizer in the bottom and 2-5 inches of soil on top or enough so the lowest branches and the crown will be just above the soil level when planting is completed.

"Choose good quality roses that have healthy branches and 12-inch roots. It is good to buy roses that are already used to this climate, to do this buy roses which were grown somewhere near here.

"When the roses arrive unpack them and soak the roots in water for about an hour. If bushes cannot be planted immediately, dig a trench and bury roots—down in soil except for top inch or two of the canes. Pack the soil and

cover by tamping and wet down if the soil is dry. Plant bushes as soon as possible.

To set out the bushes, soak the roots in water for about an hour, as mentioned above. Trim roots so they are not more than twelve inches long and prune the tops back to 6-8 inches from the union. The bushes may be placed as close as 18 inches apart. Then place a mound of soil under the base of each bush so the roots slant downward into the trench. Cover the roots with soil and pack slightly by tamping or tramping. Water if the soil is dry. Then mound the soil over the union and around the branches for the winter. This mound must be raked away, however, before new growth starts."

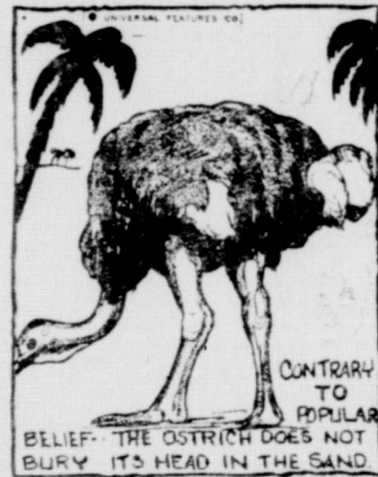
