## News About Our Men in Service

With the Third Division in Korea (Delayed)—SFC Thomas E. Smith, 25, of Truscott played an important part in the evacuation of X Corps troops from Hungnam, North Korea, last UN stronghold above the 38th parallel.

As a section leader in the Third Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battalion, Sergeant Smith's M-19, a tank equipped with twin 40 mm. guns, was in the "foxhole line" to engage any enemy line of sight that presented itself.

The absence of enemy aircraft activity has caused this versatile AAA group to be employed in ground action on more than one occasion. The unit was part of a Task Force that was sent to the Chosin Reservoir to relieve encircled UN troops in that area.

Sergeant Smith's wife and son, Tommy, live in Truscott.

Arnold L. Cox, FP3, age 21, joined the Navy Nov. 6, 1948, and took his boot training in San Diego, Calif., following which he was assigned to the USS Orleck, DD886, for two years and was sent overseas for six months to China, Japan and Little America. He then returned to Pearl Harbor for several months and then to San Francisco and finally back to San Diego, Calif., where he spent a year before going back to Japan and Hong Kong, China, for nine months after which he was returned to San Diego and transferred to the USS Epping Forest LSD-4, c-o buyer Fleet P. O., San Francisco, Calif. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Cox, former residents of Foard County who are now living in Cottle County.

## Tax Collectors Make Good Report on 1950 Taxes

Collectors of 1950 taxes for the City of Crowell, County and State and the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District, made good reports on collections at the close of business on Jan. 31, 1951. The highest percentage on collections was made by the Crowell Independent School District which was 94.5 per cent. It was followed by the County and State with 93 per cent and the City of Crowell with 85.8 per cent.

In the Crowell Independent School District, the 1950 valuation was \$5,449,322 with a tax rate of \$1.25 per \$100 valuation. The tax levy was \$68,116.53 and the collections amounted to \$64,368.82, according to figures released by L. A. Andrews, collector.

The total tax roll charge for the County and State was \$106,317.97 and \$98,866.71 were collected, figures released by R. E. Magee, deputy collector, revealed. Delinquent on the County and State tax rolls on Feb. 1, 1951, were \$7,451.26. Poll taxes paid at the collector's office were 798.

Mrs. Ella Rucker, city secretary, reported that the total valuations for the City of Crowell for the year 1951 were \$1,134,360.00 and the amount assessed on these valuations was \$20,015.40. The amount collected was \$17,174.27.

## Soil Conservation News of District Grass of the Month

**Canada Wild-Rye**

Canada wild-rye is a vigorous, widely distributed, perennial bunchgrass. The seed heads grow to about three feet high. The leaf blades are broad, flat and rough. They are 6 to 13 inches long.

Wild-rye begins growth in the late winter and early spring, depending on moisture conditions. If moisture is available it will start greening up in January and by February will be furnishing lots of grazing. It furnishes a high protein feed and makes good grazing during the spring, especially around the time that wheat pasture is finished and can be grazed for another three or four weeks. As the grass approaches maturity, it becomes less desirable for grazing, becoming stony and tough.

In this area, Canada wild-rye is found in the lower areas and along creeks and small streams or branches.

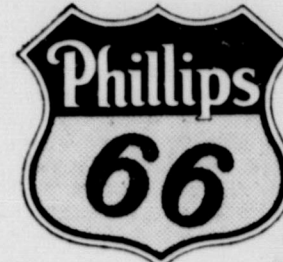

Washington Newsletter

Washington, D. C., Feb. 2, 1951—Tuesday noon, of this week, I attended a meeting at the White House at which President Truman presented a gavel to Speaker Sam Rayburn. The gavel was made of wood taken from the White House at the time during Monroe's administration, and the British had burned the White House the previous year. The President was honoring Speaker Rayburn because on that day Mr. Rayburn set the all-time record of longevity as Speaker of the House of Representatives. January 30 made 3057 days for Mr. Rayburn as Speaker. The former record was held by Henry Clay, of Kentucky. Henry Clay, incidentally, was elected Speaker of the House on the first day of his service as a Member of Congress. On the night of January 30, Speaker Rayburn gave a big dinner at the Carlton Hotel for the Texas Delegation and their wives. In addition to Texas Members, the Speaker included as special guests, President and Mrs. Truman, Vice President and Mrs. Barkley, Chief Justice and Mrs. Vinson, and Associate Justice and Mrs. Clark. Also included among the guests were former Texas members of Congress, Fritz Lanham and wife, Luther Johnson and wife, Eugene Worley and wife, and Judge Marvin Jones.

As this is being written, another railroad strike threatens to tie up the Nation's transportation. Obviously we have grown so accustomed to these outrages that we accept them and do little about them. Strikes in time of war or national emergency, or strikes that imperil the Nation's welfare should not be tolerated. We are compelled to again ask ourselves the question: are we to permit selfishness and greed and abuse of power to destroy this country from within? Apparently the Administration is to continue to kowtow to the big labor bosses. The recent price-wage freeze was manipulated so as not to interfere with numerous wage increase agreements, notably a \$1.60 per day increase to coal miners effective on February 1. Now, we learn that coal prices are increased almost \$1.00 per ton, being an increase of more than 300

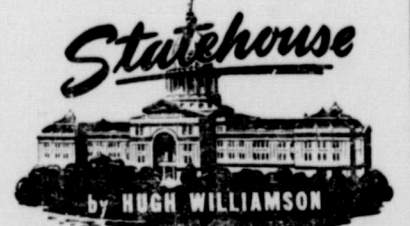

Austin, Texas, Feb. 6.—The Legislature seems to be economy-minded, but at the same time it may look with favor on an investment that is intended to help the veterans and to pay some return to the state.

You will be reading about the veterans' land program, which started off with a capital of \$25,000,000.

All of this money is now working. It has been used to buy land for veterans. The state finances purchase of this land up to \$7,125. The veteran pays five per cent of the purchase price down. He has 40 years to pay off the debt. The interest rate is three per cent.

At this session, the land board is asking for a constitutional amendment to authorize sale of \$75,000,000 more in state bonds for further financing of land buying by veterans.

The proposal passed its first hurdle last week when the House of Representatives committee on constitutional amendments approved the measure unanimously.

Land Commissioner Bascom Giles originated the program. He reported to the House committee that more than 4,000 veterans had purchased tracts at an average cost of \$6,000—or about \$54 an acre including improvements—and that the veterans had saved money in costs accompanying these transactions.

He explained that ordinarily, in an individual real estate transaction, the purchaser pays about \$150 in closing costs—examination of title, filing of papers, and so on.

In the veterans program, the purchaser sent in \$50, and that was the only cost of the transaction to him.

million dollars a year to consumers. Big industrialists no longer object to raising wages so long as they can pass the increased costs of production on to consumers.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is about to allow another substantial boost in freight rates. The excuse will be to cover increased wage demands from railroad employees, as well as the purchase of new equipment. Freight rates were increased in 1946, again in '47, again in '48, and again in '49. In 1945, the Southwest and other zones outside the Northeast won a substantial victory before the Interstate Commerce Commission in the so-called Southern Governors case. In this case, the ICC held that discrimination existed in the freight rate structure of the country. The ICC ordered the removal of this discrimination. The railroads have been very slow in complying with this order. Further hearings have been held from time to time in an effort to compel the removal of this discrimination. The last such hearing before the ICC was on last December 30. It is hoped that the government will not delay much longer in compelling the complete removal of discriminations which have long existed against the people in our section of the country. Among those who have served long and well on the ICC is Hon. W. M. W. Splawn, of Wise County. Dr. Splawn was President of the University of Texas while I was a student there.

Today's papers carry a report of our latest atomic bomb experiment. Reports say that Las Vegas, 100 miles from the exploding bomb, was rocked as if by an earthquake. I hope when the next one of these is dropped, our military will have Mr. Malik and Mr. Vishinsky there as observers. One cannot conceive of even the Russians deliberately provoking a war when they know that such a catastrophic and destructive weapon will certainly fall upon their heads. Because we have such weapons, the Russians will, of course, use every other device to bring about our destruction before resorting to open and aggressive warfare.

## The Good Old Days

"It was very comfortable," relates Dr. Hill, speaking of a half-dugout that his family lived in when they came to this country.

Dr. J. M. Hill began life April 13, 1877, in Calhoun, Georgia. His father died of typhoid fever when he was only three months old. His mother later married George Thomas Crowell, and the family moved to Dallas County in 1885. His father came out west prospecting and bought the town section of Crowell for six hundred dollars. Dr. Hill said, "We had a team called Charlie and Pete, and we made the trip to Hardeman County in seven days."

They selected the Margaret community where they made their home in a half dugout. "Old Tausser slept on top of the house every night. Sometimes when the coyotes chased him, we had to put him in the house. Old Tausser, a large Newfoundland dog, followed our wagon all the way from Calhoun, Georgia. The first year of life was very difficult. We worked hard, and my father bought twenty head of cattle. That winter all the cattle died but one. The windows of our dugout were even with the ground. One day when my mother and brother were in bed, a rattlesnake fell on the bed, but the snake did not bite either one of them," continued Dr. Hill.

They lived at Margaret a few years and then moved southeast of what is now Crowell.

"I went to school in an old sand rock building. There were nineteen or twenty students the first year. The only thing I was 'smart' in was physiology. Every time something got sick, I 'doctored' it. When hogs or chickens were killed, I dissected their livers and other discarded parts," drawled Dr. Hill in his soft voice.

At the age of sixteen he decided to become a doctor. Attending college at Nashville, Tennessee, he studied under Dr. Grace, who later practiced medicine in Crowell. From Nashville he went

to Emory Medical College at Atlanta, Georgia, later taking post-graduate work in New York, Chicago and San Francisco.

Financing his way through college was hard. As his mother paid his bills by raising turkeys, he lived on the bare necessities. "In Atlanta board and room was ten dollars a month," Dr. Hill said. "One winter my mother sent me a pair of good trousers and they were the only ones I had all winter. I came in after school, washed them and put them between the ironing board and the mattress to press them."

The day Dr. Hill graduated from college and prepared to come home, he gave the porter a five dollar gold piece for a quarter. He said, "I was so excited about graduating and coming home that I didn't pay any attention to what I was doing. When I went to eat on the train I found out what I had done and I had only some small change left. I came from Dallas to Quanah on ten cents. On arriving in Quanah, he got a man to carry him home in a cart, but didn't tell him that he was broke because he was afraid the man would not take him. He got home and borrowed ten dollars from his step-father."

Since that time Dr. Hill has practiced medicine for fifty years. He said, "I have gone on calls on horseback, in buggies, trains, hand cars, automobiles and airplanes, but I have never gone by boat." He recalls that his first car was an Overland, and added, "It nearly broke me."

Dr. Hill quotes some of the prices in those days: fifty cents for an office call, one dollar for a house call and twelve dollars for a confinement case or an operation.

Dr. Hill married Miss Edna Thacker in 1904. They reared three children who are all married. Mrs. A. V. McCombs of Las Cruces, N. M., and Mrs. Haskell Norman and J. M. Hill Jr. of this city.

Dr. Hill has not only enjoyed practicing medicine, but has also had as a sideline farming and cattle raising. He has been very successful at this and has a fine herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle. About his younger days, Dr. Hill says with a chuckle, "Those were the good old days."



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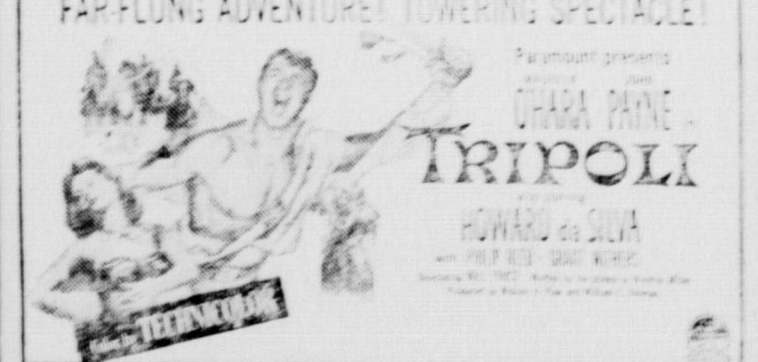
