## Youth Council Gives Rules for Operation of Youth Center

Rayne Borchardt, newly-elected president of the Youth Council, announced that the council has adopted the following rules for the Youth Center.

The Youth Center will be open every Saturday night at the community house while school is in session; every two weeks duration.

The Youth Center will open at 8 p. m. May 5, 1951, and will close at 11 p. m. These hours shall be effective for every meeting until further notice.

Membership will be composed of freshmen through seniors. Members must be at least 14 years of age and must be members of the church.

Every class, mid-term eighth graders through seniors, will be in rotation. Senior organizations will be in rotation.

There will be dues of fifty cents charged every six months; dues will be collected in March and September. Membership cards will be issued and payment of dues. Membership cards shall be checked at every meeting.

After a person has entered the Youth Center, he or she may leave the building and return unless by permission of the officers. There is to be no loitering on the outside of the building either standing around or in the building.

There will be no drinking in the Youth Center.

Members will be allowed to bring one guest. Guests will be subject to rules of the Youth Center.

Soft drinks will be on sale at the Youth Center for a nickel. These are not to be removed from the building.

Violation of rules should be reported to members of the Youth Center. They, in turn, will be responsible for determining and determining penalties. Penalties may range from temporary suspension as members of the Youth Center to expulsion.

There is some confusion as to what the class is to do as far as the Youth Council set on the following duties:

Members of the class who are absent and hosts should have a representation at the meeting.

Sponsors should check to see that Youth Center is clean before after meeting. Key may be returned—and must be returned to Mrs. J. W. Thompson who is due west of the Community house.

Sponsors shall be responsible for getting the soft drinks and that they are iced down. They shall be responsible for getting the money for the soft drinks.

Sponsors should plan the program. Whatever is included, be that equipment is available such as records, cards, games.

Sponsors should contact chaplains before meeting, and give general outline of the planned program.

## New Treatment for Screwworm Control Announced

A new treatment for the control of the destructive livestock insect pest, the screwworm, has been developed by the USDA's Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine at its Kerrville laboratory. The new treatment is known as EQ 335 screwworm remedy.

According to Joe Burkett, County Agent, the new remedy will replace the old reliable Smear 62 formula that has been used for the past ten years. The formula for EQ 335 contains by weight three per cent of the powerful new insecticide, Lindane, 35 per cent pine oil, 42 per cent white mineral oil, 10 per cent emulsifier and 10 per cent silica gel. Burkett says the new remedy is available now and there will be smears of different consistencies on the market depending upon the type of emulsifier used. He says any of the smears that contain the 3 per cent lindane and the 35 per cent pine oil will be effective even though the other items in the formula vary somewhat from the original.

Here are the advantages he lists for the new smear over 62. It will not deteriorate upon standing. An application usually lasts for seven days or about twice as long as an application of Smear 62. Treated wounds heal quickly and the lamp black and other coloring chemicals that stain clothing, wool or hair are not found in the new remedy.

The treatment kills maggots deep in the wounds, young maggots as they hatch from eggs and flies attracted to the wound to feed or lay eggs.

According to Burkett, the new remedy has been tried on thousands of animals during the past four years and none have been injured from the treatment. He points out, however, that young animals, especially calves, might become sick if the treatment is not applied properly. The smear should be applied with a small paint brush and only the wound and a narrow strip of an inch or less about the wound should be treated.

Burkett urges livestock producers to use good livestock management practices and to be on the alert for infestations of screwworms, because the use of the new remedy alone will not give screwworm control. Infested animals should be treated at once and operation or other livestock management practices that cause wounds should be avoided during the screwworm season.

The same formula can be diluted with water, one part of EQ 335 with nine parts of water, and can be used to treat sheep that are infested with wool maggots. The liquid should be applied to the infested portions of the sheep. Burkett says to check to the container label to be sure the product you purchase contains the 3 per cent lindane and the 35 per cent pine oil by weight for these are the items that give the smear its kick.

## First Meeting of Oil Industry Committee to Be Held in May

W. H. Wright, chairman of the Oil Industry Information Committee of the North Texas district, was in Crowell Friday visiting with George Self, who has been appointed a member of the Oil Industry Information Committee and the local chairman.

Mr. Wright said that the committee program was educational and that it was worthwhile for the citizens of Texas to know the important part the oil industry plays in our economy. He said that nearly 45 per cent of the nation's crude oil production comes from Texas. About 183,000 Texans with wages and salaries of \$700,000,000 annually are employed in the Texas petroleum industry. He adds that the state government receives about 57 per cent of all its business and property tax revenues from the oil and gas operators.

The first district meeting will be held the last week in May at which time plans for the year will be made. Mr. Self has been invited to attend the initial meeting of the committee.

## Growers' Support Prices on Grain Sorghums Increased

The Agriculture Department has announced it will support grower prices of 1951 crop grain sorghums at a national average of \$2.17 for 100 pounds on the basis of No. 2 grade or better, according to information furnished the News.

This is a boost of 29c over support rate announced in February and 30c over the rate for the 1950 crop. The support rate was increased to encourage plantings of this crop to winter wheat acreage in the Great Plains section already abandoned because of dry weather, it was stated.

## High School and College Students to Get 30-Day Extension

According to a new interpretation of regulations pertaining to high school and college registrants' postponement of induction, the following clearance was received by Local Board No. 131, Vernon, Texas, on May 14, 1951:

"The clear meaning of this paragraph is that all students postponed under the provisions of 1632.4 of the regulations are given by the national director an automatic extension of their student postponement for an additional period of thirty days after the end of their academic year, regardless of whether or not they are graduating. Such thirty day additional postponement or extension requires no application by the student, but merely sets back the date on which he must report for induction by thirty days. If, during this period, he desires to enlist, he must request his board in writing for cancellation of his order to report for induction and name branch of service in which he desires to enlist.

"If a student makes no such request he is liable for induction after the thirty-day period. When any student requests this cancellation during the thirty day period the board should immediately write him a 'to whom it may concern' letter certifying that his order to report for induction has been cancelled in order to permit him to enlist in the named branch of service. If he does make such request and the board has complied therewith but he has not entered upon active duty by the thirty-first day, the board should issue him a new order to report for induction, unless, in either case, the board has become convinced that he is eligible for Class II-A in accordance with the regulations, in which event they may re-open his case and reclassify him."

To date the local board of Selective Service has not received a June induction call.

## F-80 Jet Crash Lands Near Here Monday Afternoon

The pilot of an F-80 Jet Shooting Star escaped injury when he belly landed his plane in a wheat field on the Lester Patton farm three and one-half miles northeast of here shortly after 3 p. m. Monday afternoon.

The pilot, Second Lieutenant Eddie H. Maas of Phoenix, Ariz., said he was forced to land when fuel failed to feed from wing tip tanks. He dropped the wing tip tanks 25 or 30 miles west of Crowell.

The plane was one of six P-80's being ferried from Williams Air Force Base in Phoenix, Ariz., to Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls.

J. L. Gobin, Foard County sheriff, and Ed Luttrell Jr., Wilbarger County sheriff, rushed to the scene to guard the plane until air national guards from Sheppard AFB arrived.

The plane landed within fifty feet of Mr. Patton who was working in the field.

Air Force wrecker crews dismantled the plane and moved it back to Sheppard AFB Tuesday.

## Wheat Harvest Expected to Begin Last of This Week

Local grain elevator men believe that the harvesting of the 1951 wheat crop will begin the latter part of this week or the first of next week, provided the sun shines and weather conditions otherwise are favorable.

The 1951 crop is spotted and will be considerably less than the average yield for the county. However, there are many fields that are expected to produce a fairly good yield per acre and many that will make very poor yields. It would be difficult at this time to estimate the total number of bushels that will be harvested from the 1951 crop, but one evaluator man ventures an estimate of 600,000 bushels. Perhaps a conservative estimate would be from 500,000 to 600,000 bushels.

Many out-of-the-county combines are already here and waiting for the harvest to begin and all elevators in the county are ready to receive the new crop when harvesting begins.

**Washington Newsletter**

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

Washington, D. C., May 11, 1951 — Most every person of character and intelligence in the city of Washington has, at one time or another, been libeled by columnist Drew Pearson. He fills his columns with half truths or whole falsehoods as suits his convenience and purposes. Among those who know and understand this columnist, an attack by him is considered a high compliment. He has never put anything in his column concerning me that remotely approached the truth. His latest attack on me appears in this morning's Washington Post. Mr. Pearson has the following to say: "Republican Congressmen have been chiefly identified with the real estate lobby in the past. However, House Democrats helped knife their own President in virtually killing the Taft low-cost public housing program last week. It was Democrat Ed Gossett of Texas, long the spokesman for Eastern business, who sponsored and led the fight to slash the program to 5000 low-cost, public housing units a year, 70,000 units less than President Truman says is our minimum need. Gossett and GOP Representative Jesse Woolcott of Michigan, another real estate lobby wheelhorse, cleverly forced a vote late Friday after members of the famous in-Tuesday-out-Thursday absentee club had made their usual mass exodus to New York and elsewhere. As an result, the Gossett amendment won by default, 181 to 113."

My last week's newsletter gave adequate justification for the so-called Gossett amendment. Anyone who pours any water on the raging fires of inflation or helps to sustain American economy is being of real public service.

Yesterday the Senate adopted an amendment to withhold American economic aid from any nation that permits shipments of arms or other military material to Russia or any of its communist allies. This should have been done long ago. Too often in the past, we have aided our enemies through economic means. Often, in the past we might have used economic pressure to have saved military forces. Economic sanctions in many instances can be as potent as military pressures. To fight communism with one hand while aiding communism with the other is a form of national suicide.

On February 19, Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin, told Congress that General MacArthur had cast the lone dissenting vote against a guilty verdict in the court martial against Colonel Billy Mitchell. Senator Wiley quotes MacArthur as saying, in speaking of Colonel Mitchell: "It was fully known to him, and he never ceased to express his gratitude for my attitude. . . . I understand that this is a violation of one's oath to disclose how he voted as a member of a court martial. Furthermore, a few weeks ago, while flying back from Texas, I sat next to a distinguished old gentleman who has been one of our aviation experts for 30 odd years. This gentleman told me that he was a great friend of Colonel Billy Mitchell and was called to his bedside a few days before the Colonel died. At that time Colonel Billy Mitchell stated to my old friend that he often wondered how General MacArthur had voted on his court martial and that MacArthur had never told him how he voted. Strange how the records can be distorted with the passage of time."

An Iowa Congressman has just mailed me the results on a long questionnaire he mailed into his district. Question number 17 is: "Do you favor development of the St. Lawrence Waterway? Answers,

yes 1689, no 1100. Question number 18: "Do you favor cutting down federal expenses?" Yes 3278, no 73. This illustrates how inconsistent we can become. The St. Lawrence Waterway project, if authorized, will cost this government a billion dollars at least. Apparently most people are strong for economy so long as it does not come out of their pet projects.

**Washington Newsletter**

By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., May 5, 1951 —The House has just completed action on one of its numerous appropriations bills. This bill is entitled, "A Bill Making appropriations for the Executive Office and sundry independent executive bureaus, boards, commissions, corporations, agencies and offices, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, and for other purposes." Congressman Albert Thomas of Houston, Texas, is Chairman of the Subcommittee that brought in this bill and handled it on the floor. The bill, as reported by the Committee on Appropriations, provided for \$6,171,777,440. Even this large figure was \$665,900,925 below the amount requested by the Administration. The economy bloc, of which I count myself an enthusiastic member, made further and numerous cuts in this bill. I offered an amendment reducing authorized public housing units for the fiscal year of 1952, from 50,000 down to 5,000, a reduction of 45,000 public housing units. This Gossett amendment will save, temporarily at least, \$57,300,000. This public housing program was authorized by Congress in 1949. The bill passed the House by only 4 votes. It provides for the building of approximately 1 million publicly owned housing units to be furnished so-called low income families. It is admitted by everyone that during the life of the program each family unit will cost the tax payers not less than \$12,000. In other words, the tax payers subsidize families that live in such units to the tune of \$12,000. The government pays \$12,000 of the rent of a family living in a public housing unit. Do not confuse this with FHA and other housing programs through which the government simply lends the money for repayment, or guarantees its repayment. It has always been my contention that this government owned housing is unsound, both economically and socially.

If our government was to have done a good job of restraining inflation, we should have had an across-the-board freeze on wages and prices as of the date of the outbreak of the Korean war, or shortly thereafter. Last year, Congress passed a bill giving the

President authority to impose such ceilings. Various offices have been established to combat inflation, such as the Office of Defense Mobilization, Defense Production Administration, an Economic Stabilization Agency, and Office of Price Stabilization. A few days ago, the Office of Price Stabilization, headed by Michael DiSalle, issued ceiling price regulation No. 23 on live cattle. This order purports to roll back the price on live cattle as of May 20, between 10 and 18 per cent. It provides for a second roll-back on August 1 of 4 1/2 per cent and a third roll-back on October 1 of 4 1/2 per cent. If the government was seeking to roll back the costs of meat to the American consumer, it has gone about the same in the worst possible way. It would have been much better to have rolled back the price of meat in the stores to a certain level and to have frozen it there immediately. The current order on live cattle will roll back, as of May 20, the price on 90 per cent of Texas cattle by 18 per cent. The order does not affect veal and calves; hence, it will result in calves and veal being sent to market prematurely, thus resulting in the loss of millions of pounds of meat to the consumer. By setting these roll-back dates at different times in the future, the order will also result in the premature marketing of millions of head of cattle. It is estimated that by May 20, when the first roll-back goes into effect, the order will have resulted in the premature marketing of at least a million head of cattle and a loss of 300 pounds of meat per head, thus losing to the consuming public at least 300 million pounds of beef even before the effective date of the order.

Abundant, or even excessive supplies for the consumer is a sure way to help hold down the price of such a commodity. Under the existing order the meat supply of this country will within a year be reduced by billions of pounds. Beef probably will then be in tremendously short supply. This will mean that millions of people may not be able to get beef at all, while other millions will buy it in the black market at excessive prices.

Apparently, we never learn. Mr. DiSalle's Office of Price Stabilization should go back and study our OPA experience during World War II. They have not rolled back the prices on the feed cattle eat, they have not rolled back the price of meat in the butcher shops; hence their order will simply result in a rapid reduction of the number of cattle in the country. The big packers will not get hurt but the small cattleman will.

**Health Letter**

Texas State Department of Health,  
 Austin, Texas, Geo. W. Cox, M.  
 D., State Health Officer.

Austin, Texas—Socialization has no place in either public health or the private practice of medicine, State Health Officer George Cox has said in a statement aligning himself with the medical profession against socialized medicine.

Public health is a separate, distinct field from private medicine, Dr. Cox said. Both professions have their separate objectives, and distinctive methods of accomplishing them.

He declared public health's objectives to be:

1. Public education as to how to avoid disease by such means as vaccination against smallpox and typhoid fever and immunization against diphtheria.
2. Investigation of disease outbreaks.
3. Quarantine and isolation of communicable disease cases, thus preventing its spread.
4. Inspection of water supplies, and control over the safe production and sale of milk, drugs, and food products.

"But," the health officer added, "people get sick and accidents happen, and the job of curing and patching up is the business of the

private practitioner of medicine—the family doctor and the specialist."

Doctors in private practice advocate public health principles when they urge mothers to have children protected against diphtheria and smallpox, and public health officials "need their help in the vital work of maintaining a high level of well being for all Texans," Dr. Cox asserted.

"We aren't in competition with doctors in private practice. Public health people deplore the idea of socialized medicine as unworkable, cumbersome, and totally inefficient."

"There is no place on earth that has a better system of medical administration than the United

States. Private doctors deserve credit."

"And there is no place on earth with a higher standard of public health. Public health people serve credit for that," the doctor concluded emphatically.

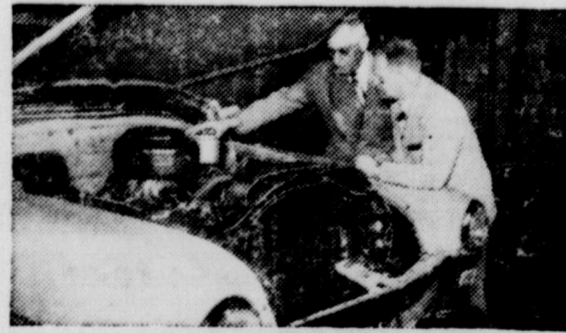

**EARS STOPPED UP WITH PORK**

Memories are short, and facts and figures are easily forgotten. The chances are that most Americans have only a hazy idea of just how much the cost of their government has risen in the past ten years. So some figures compiled by the National Small Business Association should come as a high-voltage shock.

In 1940, it cost a little more than \$75,000,000 to run the Department of Commerce—in 1950, the bill was \$863,000,000.

In 1940, the Department of the Interior lived on a budget of about \$1,385,000. Last year's bill was close to \$568,500,000.

In 1940, the State Department worried along on less than \$21,000,000. In 1950 it managed to

get rid of more than \$361,000,000. In 1940, the taxpayers supported the Department of Labor to the tune of some \$18,500,000. Last year the assessment was \$257,000,000.

In 1940, it must be remembered, the late President Roosevelt had been in office for two terms, and the government had been greatly expanded. Yet now the cost of running the major departments make the 1940 budget look like peanuts!

The Evening Outlook, of Santa Monica, California, hit the nail on the head when, after listing these figures, it said: "If the American people have any political intelligence or any sense of their own self-interest, they will demand an end to the colossal extravagance of the Federal government that is threatening to bankrupt this country. . . . The demand must grow in volume and insistence until it will finally be heard by those legislators and bureaucrats who hitherto have had their ears stopped up with pork."

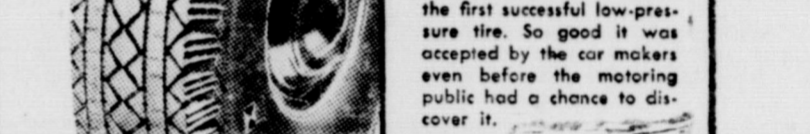

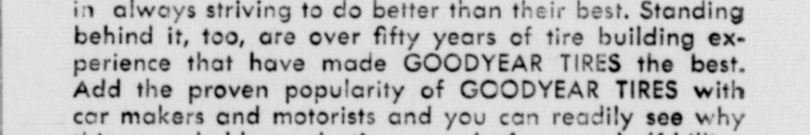
