





His plan in brief: Apply the outside as well as inside the house. The long-time exponent of clean environment said the Texas De-partment of Health would, on request, send a team of sanitation experts to survey any Texas town for health hazards.

"An untrained person might fail water holes where flies and mosquitoes can breed. Our people, by training and experience, know how to locate and correct hazards to community health," the health of-





### H. D. Agent Tells How to Buy Needles

That "needle in the haystack" might as well stay where it is if it is not the right size or type for

nome sewing. Mrs. Mary D. Brown, Acting County Home Demonstration Agent, says that needles should be bought by the size rather than the set. Packages of assorted needles often include many coarse ones rarely used in home sewing, she explains and as a result the sewing basket becomes laden down with "idlers."

Emergency mending jobs come up often, the agent continues. To be prepared, keep a supply of number 7 needles on hand for general use. Sizes 9 and 10 are best for dress materials and for sew-ing that requires delicate stitches. Basting and sewing on heavy fabrics are done with more ease if

"Sharps," "between," and "crewel or long-eye" are the three types of needles available to seamstresses. Sharps are medium length, round-eyed, and are used most commonly in home sewing. Be-tween needles are shorter, gen-erally used for very fine sewing. They are too short to hold comfortably for very long, however. Crewel or long-eye needles are used in embroidering or darning. Mrs. Brown suggests that those having difficulty in seeing to thread needles should try small sizes of the crewel type for ordi-
