Kewanee Oil Company has also staked an offset test to the No. 1 Sandifer. It is the No. 1 Campbell Unit, 610 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of southwest quarter of section 350, block A, H&TC survey, five miles southwest of the Thalia pool, 1,000 feet southeast of Kewanee's No. 1 Sandifer, an indicated discovery, and 3 1/2 miles east of Crowell.
