The atmosphere of the story is Gothic; the suspense is played out like a Florentine silk cord with the ending coming where most mysteries begin.

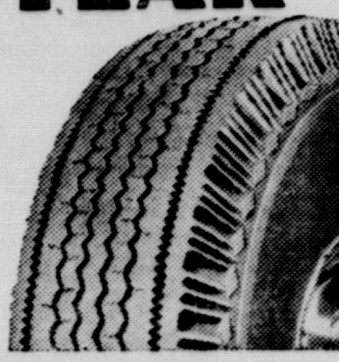

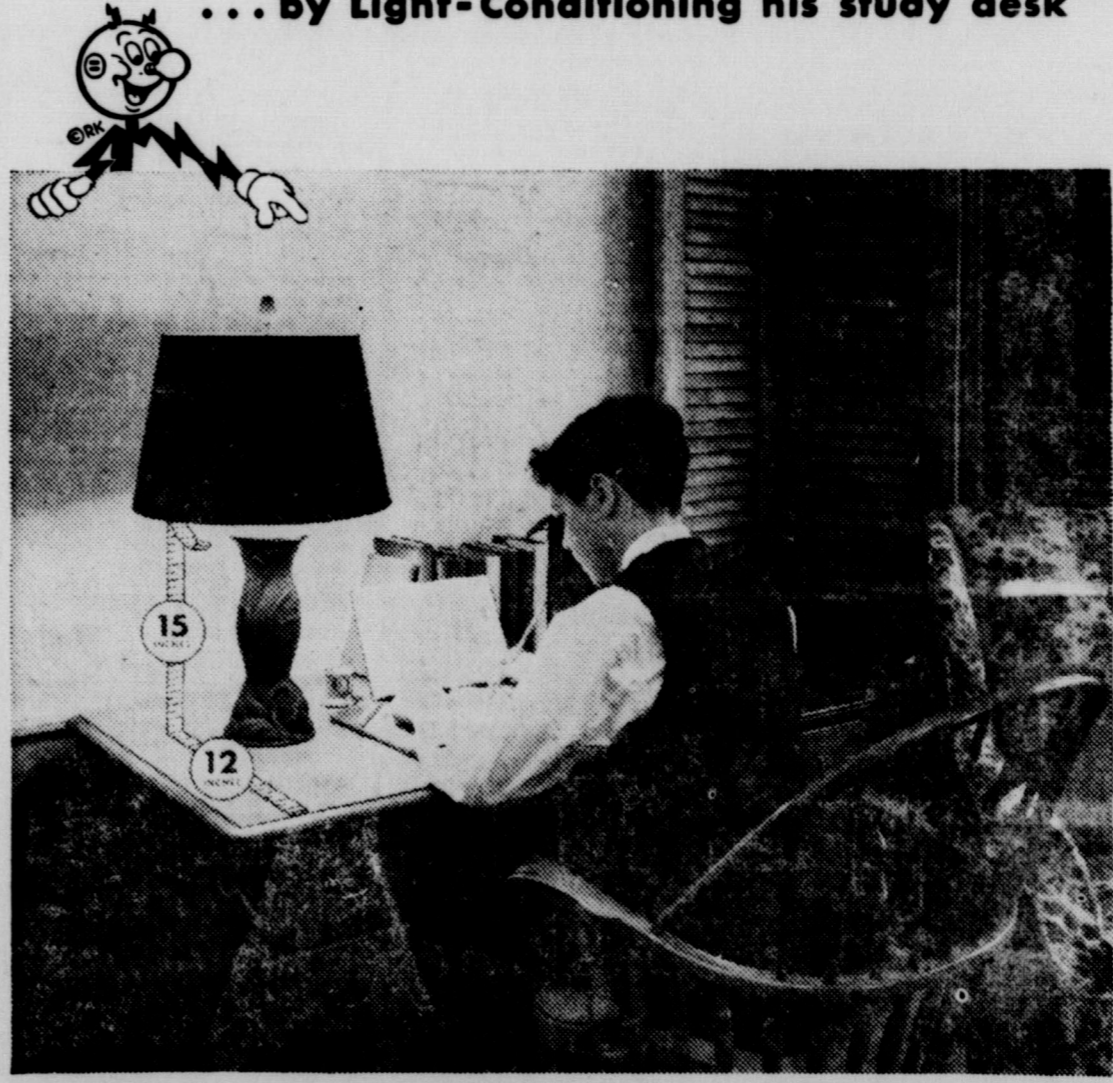

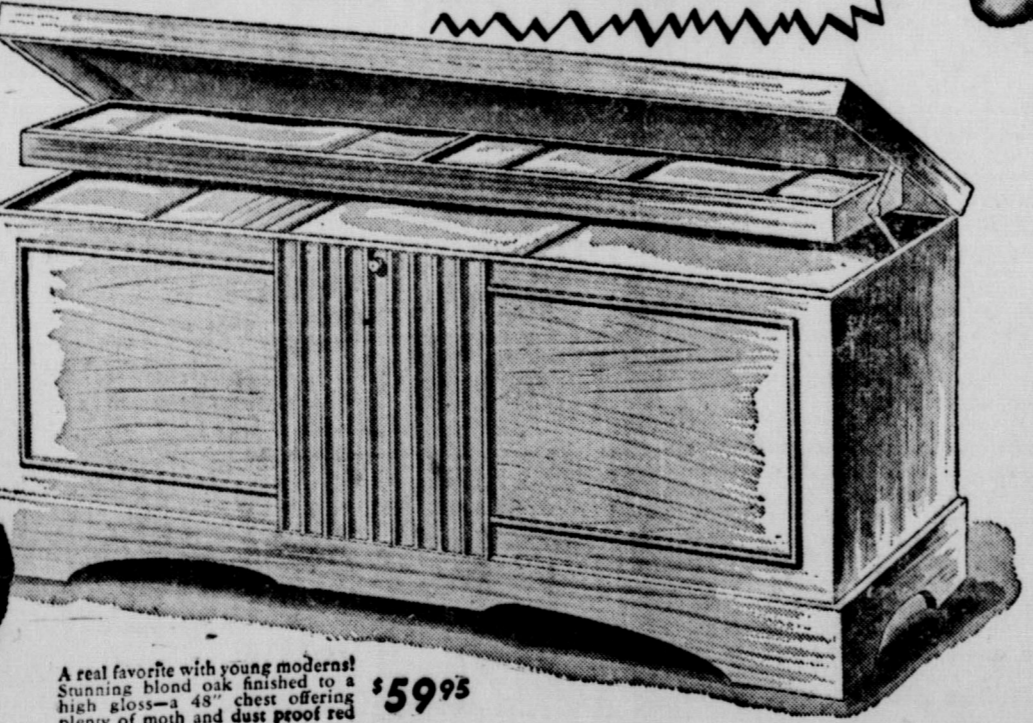
