Only Five Names to Appear on 2nd Primary Ballot

Only five names will appear on the Foard County run-off ballot slated for August 23, according to information released by the State Democratic Executive Committee this week.

Of the three races listed, only two are contested. For Associate Justice Supreme Court Place 1, Spurgeon Bell of Harris County is opposed by Frank P. Culver of Tarrant County. Joe S. Moss of Garza County and Ernest O. Northcutt of Potter County are engaged in the race for Associate Justice Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District.

Martin Dies of Angelina County appears on the ballot unopposed for Congressman-at-Large, since the runner-up, John Lee Smith of Lubbock County requested that his name be withdrawn from the ballot. However, the state executive board ruled that in case of a withdrawal in the run-off election the name of the remaining candidate should appear on the ballot.

Local High School Students Attending Summer Band Camp

Eleven local high school students were in attendance when the Fourth Annual Summer Music Recreation Camp convened in Wichita Falls Monday morning. This camp is conducted annually by Midwestern University for band students and cheerleaders of Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana. Some 185 youths were on hand for the first day of this affair. Exponents of music and cheerleading from some of the leading colleges and universities are directing these students from 36 towns of this section of the country.

Fall Term of Crowell High School to Begin on Monday, September 1st; Two Changes Made in Faculty

According to Superintendent Grady Graves, the Crowell School will begin the fall term on the first Monday in September as has been the custom for the past several years. The first Monday will fall on the first day of the month

this year. This is two days earlier than it was last fall. This early start will allow the spring term to be over about May 21, which generally is about the beginning of wheat harvest in this section.

Two Faculty Changes

There are only two changes in the faculty since last school term. James Welch has replaced J. W. Sollis as science teacher in high school, and Mrs. Grace Davis has replaced Mrs. Homer Streit, teacher in the third grade. Mr. Welch resigned from the Quanah School faculty to accept the Crowell position, and Mrs. Davis resigned from a position in the Gilliland School to come to Crowell. The position for Mrs. Davis was made possible when the Texas Education Agency approved Crowell's application for an additional teacher due to an epidemic here in January. The extra teacher for the overflow in the first and second grades that was held by Mrs. Pearl Young was lost this year due to a lower average daily attendance record for the Crowell Schools last year. Mrs. Young has accepted a position as teacher in the Gilliland Schools for the 1952-53 term.

High Temperature and Dry Weather Continue Here

Torrid temperatures continued to dominate Foard County and vicinity the past week as the mercury broke the one hundred mark every day and had degrees to spare several times. One day last week the thermometer showed a sizzling 114 degrees. This reading was probably the highest since August 6, 1946.

Funeral services for E. E. Roddy were held at the First Baptist Church in Crowell on Monday afternoon, August 11, at 3 o'clock with Minister Bob J. Cox of Dallas Christian College officiating, assisted by Bedford W. Smith, minister of the local First Christian Church. Mr. Roddy passed away in the Quanah Hospital on Friday, August 8, following an illness of several weeks.

Special music for the service was a duet composed of Bill Nichols and Mrs. Roy Steele with Mrs. Bedford W. Smith as accompanist.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with the Masonic Lodge performing graveside rites. Womack Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Edward Ennis Roddy was born on May 17, 1894, in Medicine Lodge, Kansas. His childhood was spent in Durant, Okla., and he entered the service during World War I. He served with the 616th Aero Squadron, receiving his honorable discharge in April, 1919. On Feb. 23, 1920, he married Elsie Muriel Dodson in Lincoln, Neb., and two sons were born to this union.

The family made their home in Harveyville, Kansas, where Mr. Roddy pioneered in the trucking business. He was one of the first truck owners to haul cattle by truck to the market in Kansas City. He was always progressive in his ideas and led the way for new improvements in the trucking business.

Following 10 years in the grocery business in Montgomery, Kansas, he came to Crowell in 1950 where he continued in the grocery business until his death.

He became a member of the Christian Church in December, 1947, and was also a member of the Masonic Lodge for 27 years. He is survived by his wife, Elsie; two sons, Edward Franklin of Crowell and Woodson Roger of the United States Army, Ft. Ord, Calif.; one granddaughter, Carroll Elaine of Wichita, Kansas; three brothers, Harry of Tarzana, Calif., Stewart of Allen and Wallace of Crowell; three sisters, Mrs. Fred J. 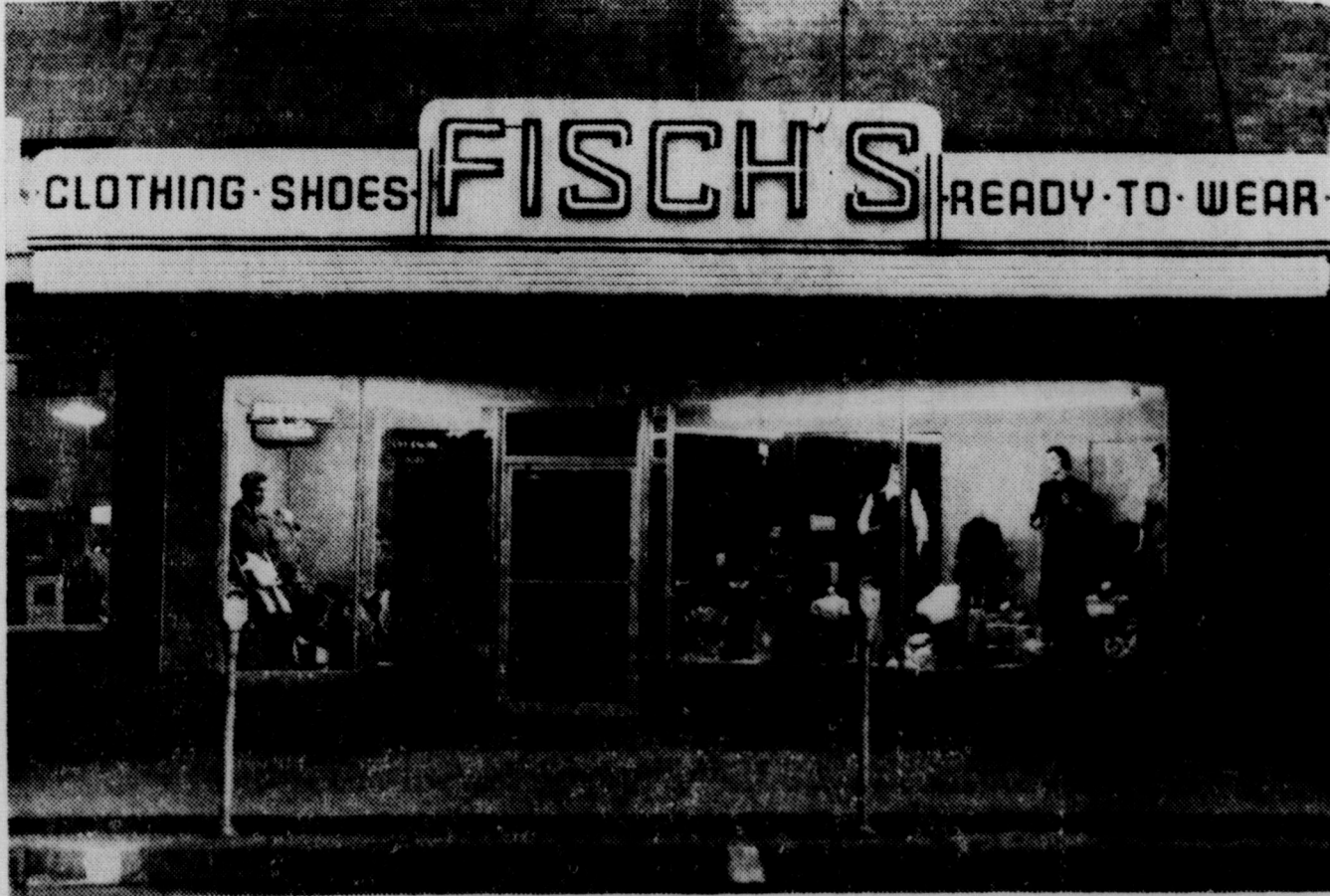

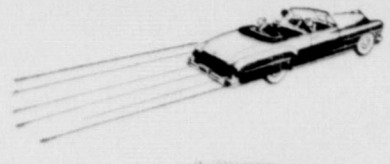
Mr. Fisch has not been in business in Crowell since Dec. 27, 1951, when his store on the west side of the square was destroyed by fire.

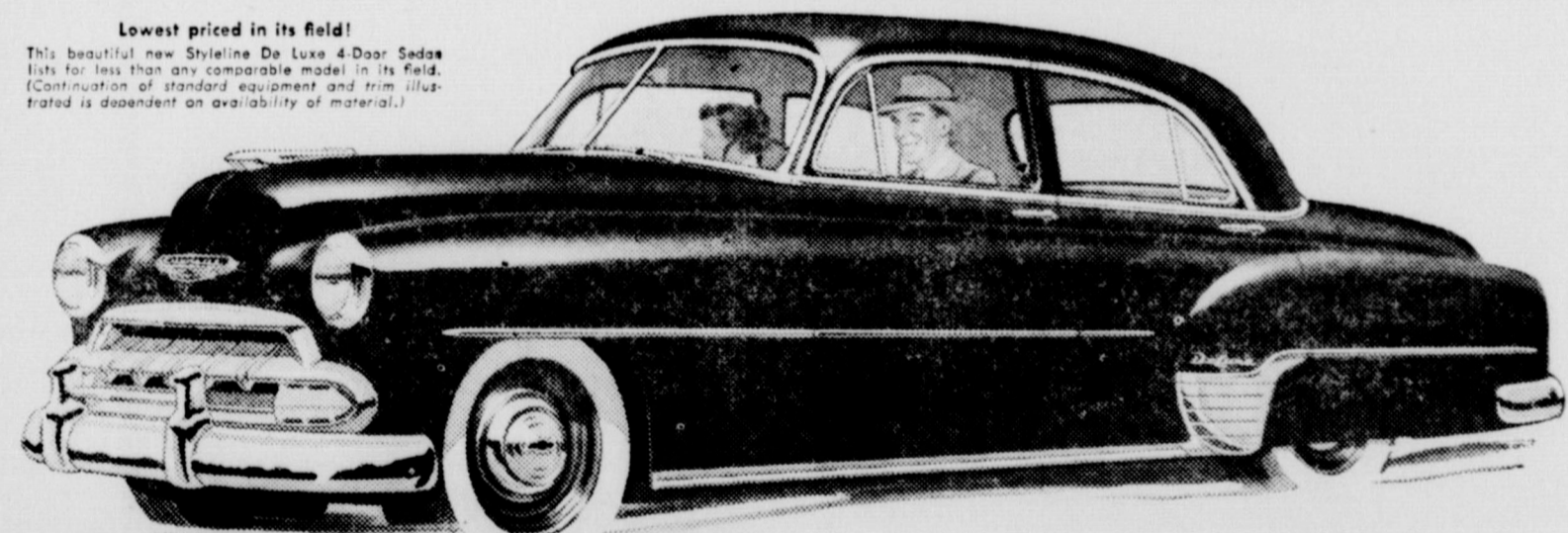

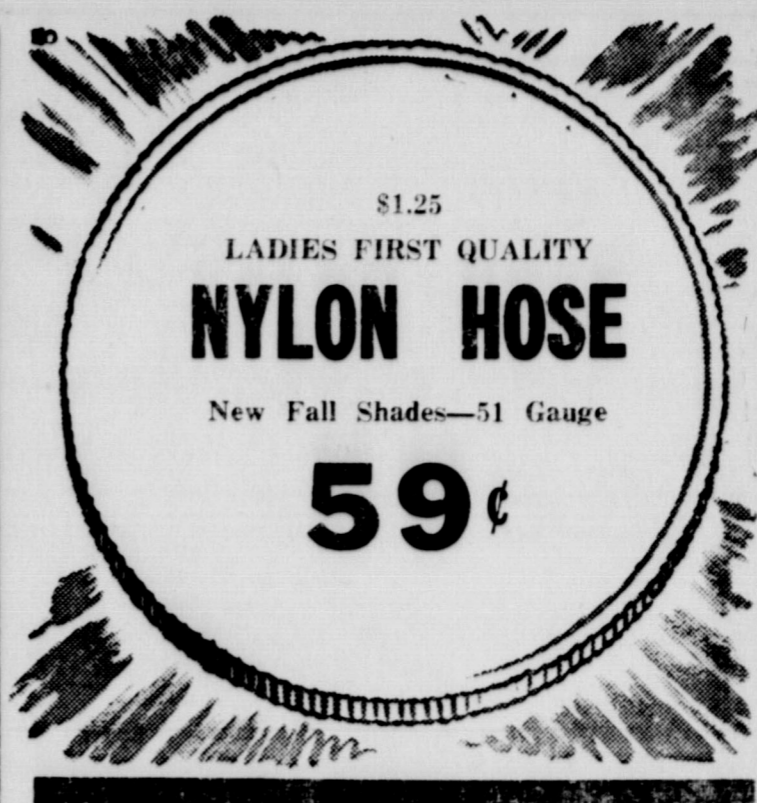

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding new section hereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorates; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns, and villages"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns, and villages."

Each voter shall mark one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. 2-4tc

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be made by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. 2-4tc

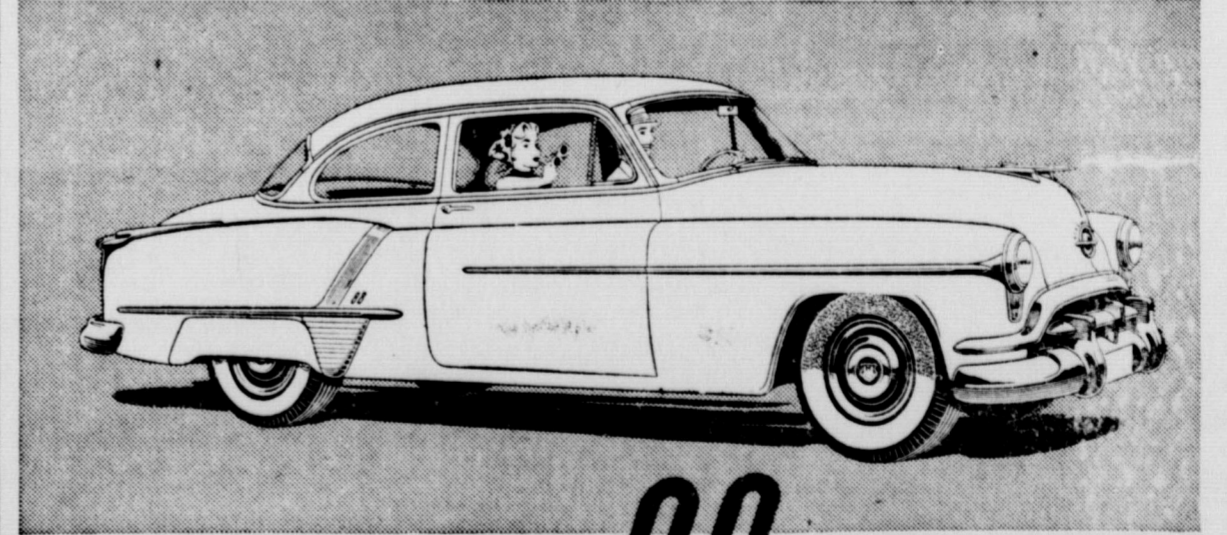

Teachers Back Wildlife Study

The Director of Conservation Education and Departmental Publications for the Texas Game & Fish Commission reports that the conservation movement in Texas has received greater emphasis this summer.

He said teachers from all sections of Texas, and from all grade levels, attended conservation workshops and training courses in many senior colleges and universities.

These teacher training centers included the University of Texas, Southern Methodist University, North Texas State, Texas State College for Women, East Texas State, Texas Arts & Industries, Sam Houston, Sul Ross, McMurry, Hardin Simmons, Abilene Christian, Prairie View and A&M.

Many other educational institutions were actively engaged in training teachers to teach Texas youngsters how to conserve the natural resources.

The Director said many government agencies provided one or more conservation education consultants to assist in these teacher training programs. They included: State Soil Conservation Districts, the United States Soil Conservation Service, the Texas Forest Service, the Texas Health Department and the Department of Public Safety.

The Director said that, as a result of these training courses, hundreds more Texas teachers will be actually teaching boys and girls this fall the basic facts about our natural resource. They will emphasize, he explained, their present status, their value and proper use.

Agent Tells How to Keep Linoleum Bright

The linoleum on the kitchen floor is more likely to get too much cleaning than too little. This information comes from Mrs. Mary D. Brown, Acting County Home Demonstration Agent.

To keep linoleum bright and shiny, Mrs. Brown points out that a mop or soft brush is better than a broom. Oil mops should never be used because they leave an oily coating that catches dirt. Too, oil discolors linoleum. Alkaline soap and abrasive cleaning compounds tend to soften, scratch and roughen the surface of linoleum.

It is a good idea to remove surface spots immediately, especially grease. The agent suggests to clean linoleum use a damp mop with a solution of warm water and mild soap. This removes dirt, grease and old wax. Then use clear water for rinsing.

After the linoleum is thoroughly dry, several thin coats of self-polishing, water-emulsion wax should be used. Paste wax is less satisfactory because it is difficult to get an even coat on the linoleum and once on it is more difficult to remove when time comes to re wax.

Manufacturers warn that plastic finishes, lacquers and varnishes will dim or yellow the colors in linoleum. To insure the best care, Mrs. Brown says ask the dealer for printed instructions that manufacturers prepare for the care of their products.

Doves Nest in Oil Tank Pilings

A colony of mourning doves, nesting in some old pilings near Beaumont, is doing its bit for research by being readily available for banding.

Game Wardens Jack Woodford and Clyde Renfro have banded about three dozens of the birds. The concentration came in mighty handy because they had found few birds in more common nesting areas.

The pilings are all that remain of earthen oil tanks used before the liquid was piped into metal containers. Holes have been eaten into the ends and side of braces by the elements. There the doves found substantial and comparatively safe nesting facilities especially since the pilings stand in water.

Wildlife Wisdom

Fishermen frequently move in on a lake or river, with shrinking shore line, to make a killing. When they fail, they cannot understand why having the fish in a smaller area is not conducive to better luck. The answer is that the big fish which usually feed on the smaller fish, are not hungry because they are better able to corral their prey. Thus, the eligible fish, and not the fishermen, benefit from the reduced area.
