

#### HELPED TO DRILL FIRST OIL WELL

"Sam" Smith Only Survivor of Titusville Adventure.

Titusville, Pa. - There's nothing startling about his name-it's plain "Sam" Smith-but quite the contrary is his distinction. He is the one man still living who had a part to drilling the world's first oil weil.

Back in 1859 Edwin L. Drake, an office clerk, sought a man to test his theory that petroleum could be obtained in large quantities by drilling into the earth, and William A. Smith, father of "Sam," of Tarentum, Pa.. a driller of salt wells, was selected to try the experiment.

"Sam" was a lad of sixteen years at the time. He was on the scene, near here, when the first oil bubbled forth.

Describing the historic achievement. Smith said the spot for locating the original well was selected because at that point a pool of surface petroleum had collected for years. The Indians had scooped oil from the puddle to mix paint for facial and bodily decorations. Later the white man had dipped it to lubricate the machinery in nearby sawmills.

"In sinking the first oil well, the magine, hauled overland by horses from a distant rallway station," Smith said. "After the drill had been going a week and had reached a depth of 69 feet. father found oil foaming up in the pipe and immediately stopped the drill The tools were removed and a common pitcher pump, such as used on any family well, took the place of the drill. The output at first was 14 barrels daily. At first the product brought

Instead of the old conventional names of Sergius, Peter, Ivan, Olga, Alexandra, Catherine and Elizabeth, children of communists nowadays are named after some great revolutionary leader, party, industry or political movement, or even after some town, river or song in soviet Russia.

For example many infants of bolshevik parents are "baptized" Communista, Proletaria, Industria, or Stalina, after Joseph Stalin, the big political boss of soviet Russia.

Others are given names based upon Russian nouns and adjectives gossessing a special significance in the present revolutionary movement. "Liberatta" (liberty), for instance, is a name commonly given to baby girls, and in similar fashion, baby boys are often named "Liberi" (free).

# FIGHT TO SAVE HISTORIC SPOT

#### New Orleans Is Facing Destruction of Its Famous French Market.

New Orleans, La.-Unless some thing intervenes to stay the hand of the "despoiler," New Orleans' famous French market is doomed. If the commission council adopts the Association of Commerce plan for a termnial market in another section of the city, one of the most colorful spots in America will be wiped out of existence. Railroads and politics are back of it, according to rumors in the French quarter; New Orleans is a big city now and has outgrown its past, say advocates of the new terminal market.

But the French market will not pass without a struggle on the part of those that love it for its rich and romantic past and the picturesque life and charm that still cling to it. The Vieux Carre association, composed of the most prominent business and professional men of the French quarter, is its chief defender. Notable men throughout the country and abroad also are associate members of the

Formed to Save Old Section.

This organization, which is incorporated under the laws of the state of Louisiana, was formed a little over year ago. Its purpose is to preserve the French quarter and promote the cultural and commercial interests of New Orleans' most picturesque and interesting section.

Canal street, next to Pennsylvania avenue in Washington, is one of the widest thoroughfares in any American city. It divides the New Orleans of oday, a city as modern as Cleveland or Toronto, with towering skyscrapers, from the New Orleans of yesterday. North of Canal street is the Vieux Carre, or "old square," comprising about 100 squares or blocks. The architecture is that of the Eighteenth

The French market is at the extreme east and of the Vieux Carre. near the Mississippi river. Down narrow streets, like those of old provincial cities, daily comes the small merchants, butchers, vegetable and fish men, restaurant keepers, housewives and persons of all shades and colors to the French market.

The Latin loves to haggle over prices, and in this old market it attains its greatest degree. Perhaps an Italian, a French or a Spanish Creole is buying a chicken from a Terrebone parish farmer. To the outsider, unamiliar with such transactions, nothing short of assault and perhaps worse will immediately follow. Voices are raised to a high pitch; arms are extended in frantic gestures, and shoulders shrugged until the onlooker expects each to fly at the other's throat. But the dealer and prospective buyer are merely trying to arrive at a price satisfactory to both. The sale made, they converse as amiably as two brothers, exchange the latest gossip and the patron passes on.

According to Louis B. Reuter, president of the Vieux Carre association and himself a large business man, the building of a terminal market, which means the passing of the French market, would ruin hundreds of bust-

However, they have proposed an alterna-They would build a new market adjoining the site of the French market, the structure to be four blocks long with a 24-foot concourse, and containing 272 stalls. The cost, about \$350,000, would be borne by private interests, the city not being asked to expend a dollar unless it wished to finance the project. If a terminal market is erected two

phant" on the city by the erection of a terminal market, residents of the Vieux Carre look upon the destruction of their beloved French market as a calemity. Erected first in 1791 by the Spaniards, the French market always has been one of the city's distinctive ettractions.

Housewives, with their husbands and children, still meet at the French market on Sunday where they buy their roasts, fish, fruit, and vegetables for dinner. Up and down Decafur, Dumaine. Ursuline, St. Ann, and the other narrow streets they parade on the Sabbath. They look upon the removal of their beloved market as noth ing short of sacrilege.

The only way this can be called a way of making the world Christian is by leading the individuals to a personal knowledge and experience of Jesus Christ and entering therefore into the power of the new life. Having shown in chapters 3 and 4 of this epistle that the believer is free from the law as a means of justification, Paul makes practical application of this doctrine. The divine way of making the community Christian is to secure the regeneration of the individual. The way to destroy the work of the devil is through the sonship of believers.

1. Christian Freedom (vv. 13-15). It is not an occasion to the

# DIVORCE SUIT BAFFLES JUDGE

#### Portland's Chinatown Is Stirred Up Over Case Involving Aged Leader.

Portland. Ore .- Old Moy Back Hin, unofficial ruler of Portland's Chinatown, taps his gold-headed cane nervously as he goes about his accustomed haunts and silently calls forth maledictions upon his enemies. For evil days have fallen upon Moy in his old age. After years of ease, years in which his word has been law among Portland orientals, years in which his western fortune has brought him all the delicacies and luxuries of the Far East. Moy finds himself in trouble and his riches threatened.

It all comes of a divorce suit that has been filed against Moy, who is Chinese consul in Portland, tong leader and business man and whose wealth is said to exceed \$1,000,000. It is just such a case as might be expected to come out of the mysteries of Chinatown and is as near a sensation as the impurturbable Chinese alow themselves.

Moy has an unusual defense, but a omplete one in case its truth is established; he says that Leong Ho, who brings the divorce suit, is not his wife. On this contention he rests, although Leong Ho has passed as his wife many years and says she was narried to him in far-away Canton in 1897. Ng Shee, says Moy, is his real wife and Leong Ho is only his house-

#### Has Judge Baffled.

Oriental complexities make the case great puzzle to the white man's ourt in which it has been filed. John H. Stevenson, Circuit judge, who listened to the preliminary evidence, admitted that he was completely baffled. He did not grant Leong Ho's petition for suit money and attorneys' fees, because it might be proved that she was not Moy's legal wife. Neither did he deny her petition, but postponed action until the prominent lawyers who have been retained by both sides make an effort to unravel the tangle. Leong Ho says that Moy is a millionaire and has an income of \$5,000 a month. She is asking for \$25,000 attorneys' fees, \$10,000 suit money and \$500 a month as temporary alimony.

Around the household of Moy, which holds a place of pre-eminence in Chinatown, is the shadow of mystery. Leong Ho in her divorce suit says she has borne Moy three children, only one of whom, Pearl, is now living. Moy has other children, these, she says, are by a former wife. Moy, in turn, contends that Leong Ho is not the mother of any of his children, but that Ng Shee, who, like Leong Ho, has lived in the Moy household, is not only the mother of Pearl and the two other children claimed by Leong Ho, but of two others hesides. Ng Shee, Moy says, bound her feet for so many years that it is difficult for her to walk, so he engaged housekeeper. The housekeeper, he adds, is Leong Ho

#### Moy Says Little.

Beyond the representations made by his attorneys, the venerable Moy, who is over seventy years old, has little to say. He has been a familiar figure in Chinatown for many years. Formerly he was a contractor and carried through big undertakings. His fortune grew and among other properties he is joint owner of a large down-town hotel. As Chinese consul he has watched over the welfare of his fellow countrymen and has gone bail for hundreds of them when they have got into trouble. But Leong Ho does not picture him as the benevolent despot that the public has considered him. Wife-heating and cruelty are attributed to him in the divorce complaint.

Meanwhile there is an unusual air of expectancy in Chinatown, The Orientals are waiting to see what the white man's court will make of it all. and they are waiting to see what effect the present suit will have upon the house of Moy Back Hin, which has held its position of leadership among them so proudly.
