## Wayland College A Cappella Choir Here Friday Night

When the Wayland College International A Cappella Choir, under the direction of Dr. Shelby Collier, appears at 7:30 o'clock Friday night at the First Baptist Church, those in attendance will have the opportunity of seeing costumes valued at \$5,000 and hearing a program in twelve languages.  
 The Wayland Choir, coming as it does from a Christian college, always opens the program with outstanding sacred musical numbers. This year the opening number is "Almighty God of our Fathers"—James. Another group of songs that always finds popular favor is that of Negro spirituals. Following the intermission, the choir returns wearing costumes from the many nations from which Wayland College faculty and students have come. Many costumes are irreplaceable. The singers enter to the Roll Call of Nations by Dr. Collier. This year they will come in pairs wearing costumes typical of the countries they represent.  
 Music for this concluding part of the program is mostly folk music from Mexico and Brazil, where Wayland choirs have personally sung; Chile, Latvia, Sweden, White Russia, Japan, Hawaii, China, Korea and American Indian.

## Funeral Services for Luther Tamplen Held Wednesday

**Foard Co. Farmer Succumbs in Crowell Hospital Monday**  
 Funeral services for Luther Tamplen, prominent Foard County farmer, were held at the Crowell Methodist Church Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock conducted by Rev. W. J. Knop, pastor of the Margaret Methodist Church, assisted by Rev. G. C. Laney, pastor of the Margaret Baptist Church, and Rev. Russell McAnally, Crowell Methodist pastor. Mr. Tamplen passed away in the Foard County Hospital early Monday morning following a short illness. He became ill Sunday afternoon. J. C. Jones, Jack McGinnis, Roy Ayers, Abb Dunn, Ray Hysinger, Grady Graves, T. S. Haney and John Rasor served as pall bearers.  
 Flower bearers included members of Mrs. Tamplen's Sunday School class of the Margaret church and other close friends.  
 Luther Tamplen was born near Whitesboro, Texas, March 4, 1900. He was married to Miss Eura Mae Miller in Whitesboro Sept. 30, 1923. Five children were born to this couple, two sons and three daughters.  
 Mr. Tamplen moved to Foard County with his family in 1925 and lived on a farm in the Margaret community until 1942 when they moved to their present home five miles east of Crowell. He was a member of the Margaret Methodist Church, a member of the official board, charge lay leader, and served as Sunday School superintendent for many years. He also taught the men's Bible class, and was highly respected and loved by all who knew him. Serving as a school trustee for many years, he was closely connected and interested in civic developments in his community. He had assisted in assessing taxes for the Crowell Independent School District.  
 Mr. Tamplen was a member of the Thalia Masonic Lodge and also a member of the Woodmen of the World Lodge in Whitesboro.  
 Masonic graveside services were conducted at the cemetery. Survivors include the wife; three daughters, Mrs. Maurice Ruple of Dallas and Misses Mildred and Virginia Tamplen of Crowell; two sons, Ray Tamplen of Lubbock and Thomas Lee Tamplen of the U. S. Navy. All of the children were here for the funeral except the latter who will not arrive here until Monday. Three grandchildren also survive.

## Crowell High School Basketball Team Wins Second Place in Regional Tourney Held in Denton Last Week End

The Crowell High School basketball team defeated Quitman 61 to 40 and lost to New Boston 72 to 62 to take second place in the Regional tournament held at Denton last week. The Wildcats had previously defeated Springtown, District 1A-10 champions, to advance to the semifinals in the Regional meet. Quitman, District 1A-16 champions, had defeated White Oak, District 1A-15 champions and last year's State champions. The victory over Quitman made the Crowell team champion of four districts for the second time in three years. Coaches Thayne Amonett and Gordon Erwin deserve much credit for bringing a team along that was picked to finish third in its own district, to rank with the eight best teams in the State. The Wildcats won 14 out of 15 conference games, and nine out of 13 non-conference games.  
 Crowell was leading in the Quitman game by one point at the end of the first quarter; by five points at halftime; and had built up a seven point lead by the end of the third quarter. The final score was 61 to 40.  
 The Wildcats fell behind in the first quarter of the New Boston game by nine points and were never able to overcome the margin. However, they did pull up within four points at one stage of the game late in the last quarter. The 62 points that the Cats made indicate that it was not so much Crowell's lack of scoring that lost their first conference game of the season, but the accurate shooting of the New Boston forwards. Gerry Smith scored 27 points for the Lions and missed only two field goal shots all evening. Ted Looney, six feet and 7 inches tall and center for New Boston, also contributed a great deal to their victory. The retrial of the ball off the backboard by Jimmy Harper, and the ball handling of Gaylon Whitley and Gerry Knox enabled the Crowell forwards, Gordon Graves and DuWayne Elliott, to score 18 points each in the Quitman game, and 20 and 18 points, respectively, in the New Boston contest. New Boston had defeated Burleson, champions of District 1A-13 and 1A-14, to advance to the finals.  
 Other Crowell boys making this trip were Lindell McBeath, Mike Whision, Billy John Rader, Robert Graves, Billy Hopkins, Ronny Fox and Edward Howard.

Most of the labor on these courts was done by the vocational agricultural classes under the supervision of Marvin Myers and the regular employees of the school.

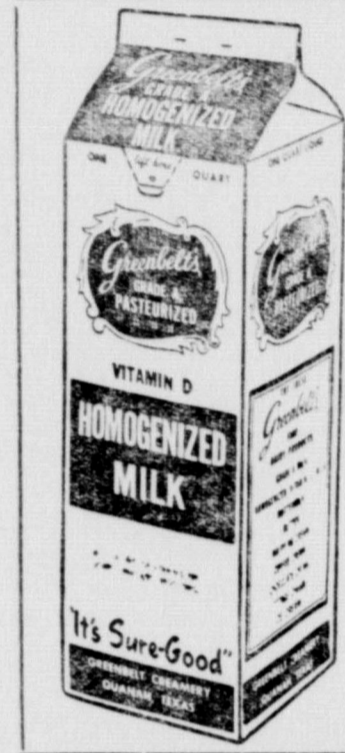

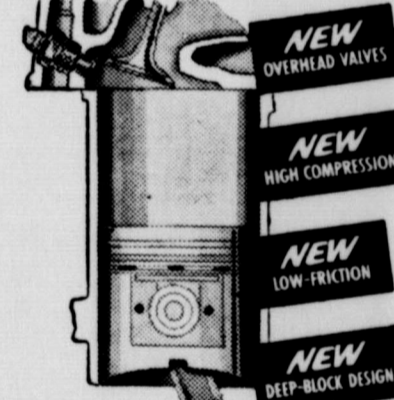

**State Pushes Fishing Improvement Projects**

State Game and Fish crews are working on eight major projects designed to improve fresh water fishing in Texas, according to Marion Toole, Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission.

The overall cost of the combined undertakings approximates one quarter million dollars. That is the amount that has been earmarked for expenditure on the program this year. Some of the jobs, which cannot be completed this year, will be authorized further funds, reported the biologist.

He said the money is provided under the Dingell-Johnson Act levying a tax on sports fishing equipment to create special funds for Federal Fish and Wildlife allotment back to the states on the basis of area and fishing license sales in those states. The state projects are financed at the rate of 75 per cent from the Federal fund and 25 per cent from the regular state game and fish money.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist said approximately fifty men are working on the special projects, most of them full time. He said projects range from research to controlling vegetation in streams and lakes and elimination of undesirable species of fish.

Included in the project are Lake Kemp, Possum Kingdom Lake Diversion, Lake Kickapoo, and Lake Texoma.

**Good Start**

The proposed 1955 budget, whatever faults Congress may find in it, marks a step in the right direction. It involves expenditures of \$65,600,000,000, and estimates a deficit of under \$3,000,000,000. By contrast the 1954 budget submitted by the outgoing administration called for \$78,000,000,000 of spending, and a deficit of close to \$10,000,000,000.

Now is the time for all—business, labor, agriculture and the rest—to solidly back up the first real efforts to bring fiscal sanity back to government that we have not known in 20 years. We must never forget that wasteful government can ruin a country as surely as war.

**BUSINESS BRIEFS**

Interest payments on the national debt (274.5 billion) will cost taxpayers \$6.5 billion during the current fiscal year, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. The \$6.5 billion is the third largest item in the federal budget, exceeded only by national defense and foreign aid.

**1954 Texas Highway Travel Map Ready for Free Distribution**

Publication of the Official Highway Travel Map for 1954 was announced in Austin this week by D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, and it is now available for free distribution.

Incorporating many changes and new features, it is believed that this is one of the best travel maps the Highway Department has published, Greer stated. For the first time this year, type has been used for all names and symbols appearing on the map, instead of the hand lettering previously used. This greatly improves legibility of all names.

A different size and type face was selected for the various categories of names that appear on the map; counties appear in one type, cities of similar population density will have the same size type; mountains will have their own lettering style, while rivers will appear in still another size and type face, Greer stated. In all, thirty-three different styles and sizes of type were ordered for the new map.

Over 1300 villages, towns, and cities are to be shown on the new guide. Thirteen insets of Texas largest towns showing highway routes through these towns are continued in the margins of the map again this year.

For the past two years the Department has been attempting to develop a relief base for the travel map that would succeed in showing the contours of the land to better advantage without adding to the expense of printing, Greer said. This year a method has finally been developed to show a true relief which can be reproduced in brown, conforming to all standard cartographic relief practices.

He went on to say that Texas is so large that any attempt to map it at a scale that will accommodate all information of interest to tourists would not be practical. The size of road maps has been fairly well standardized all over the United States, and any attempt to squeeze Texas onto the same size sheet of paper required by the average state must necessarily prohibit the use of much interesting information.

All items that render service to the traveling public are clearly designated including roadside parks, historical points of interest, state and national parks, and tourist information bureaus. A mileage index, which shows the distance between principal cities of Texas, is also compiled for the users' assistance.

The Department usually receives about one-half million requests each year for a copy of the travel map. Copies may be obtained free of charge from any of the district highway offices in the states, the travel information bureaus, or by writing direct to the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas.

**YOUR Senator Reports**

**Not Enough:** Department of Agriculture economists predict farm income will be about the same this year as it was last year—unless, that is, "abnormal developments" occur in either the weather or the national economy. Not cash farm income in 1953 was over four billion dollars below net cash farm income in 1947. Texas farm income was 17 per cent less last year than in 1952. The farmers' share of the national income was not enough last year. We need to do better this year.

**Purchasing Power:** Farm purchases were down last year along with farm income.

Retail sales of farm equipment and machinery ran about 17 per cent below 1952 sales. Gross investment in farm buildings, motor vehicles and other machinery and equipment dropped by \$600,000,000—a decline of 11 per cent. We must not adopt a farm program which would further reduce the purchasing power of the farmers.

**Great Texan:** General Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, was in Washington to receive from the Venezuelan Ambassador the Order of the Liberator, bestowed upon him for his many years of service in the cause of oil and natural gas conservation.

Texans do not need to be told that this honor and the many others won by General Thompson are well deserved. He is a great Texan, a great American and, I am proud to say, my good friend. The General was accompanied by his lovely and charming bride.

**Wool Trading:** Senate voted last week to put trading in wool futures under supervision of the Agriculture Department's Commodity Exchange Authority, the purpose being to prevent manipulation of prices. Twenty other commodities are under CEA regulation. The bill still must pass the house.

Austin, Texas—Plenty of political friction is coming up between now and election time despite the "harmony" convention of young democrats at Mineral Wells. Any harmony at that meeting resulted from the fact that one faction, the liberals, stayed away.

National and state party leaders called the gathering for the purpose of trying to reorganize the Young Democrats and bring both factions together.

Representatives of both camps were placed on the reorganizing committee. Despite these efforts, however, dissension flared up as a prelude to the Mineral Wells conclave.

Liberal Young Democrats announced that they would boycott the meeting, charging that it will be dominated by conservative friends of Governor Allan Shivers.

Shunning the "harmony" convention, the liberal Young Democrats insisted that their get-together in San Antonio last year was legal.

A feature of the confab was a panel discussion Friday afternoon, billed as an "open and frank discussion of party politics."

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd was moderator and State Senator Searcy Bracewell of Houston discussion leader.

Others on the program included Governors Shivers, Johnston Murray of Oklahoma and Frank Clement of Tennessee; Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson, National Committeewoman Hilda Weinert of Seguin and State Democratic Chairman Wallace Savage of Dallas.

Interested parties, while they waited on a court decision in the George Parr case, went back to Duval County.

Parr had asked for an injunction against Rangers Alfred Allee and Joe Bridge. The Duke of Duval said he feared the Rangers would harm him.

Arthur Garfield Hays, renowned New York attorney representing Parr, told the three federal judges trying the case at Houston that they should "do something constructive to prevent bloodshed in Duval County."

Hays said the Rangers are "men of zeal who think they are doing good." A man like Captain Allee, the attorney declared, can be both honest and dangerous when he takes civil law in his own hands, and "we have to kill this idea of Rangers being above the law."

Frank Knapp, Houston attorney representing the Rangers, summed up their case by saying: "It is crystal clear that there is no law of Duval County as free men would have it as long as the Rangers are not there."

"Lurking in the background and shadows of this case are thousands of Duval County citizens who have been oppressed by ruthless and unconscionable actions of which only the faintest outlines are visible in this courtroom."

As the attorneys checked the case to the federal judges, the Rangers and Parr headed back to Duval County.

So did Attorney General Shepperd, who said he will continue his investigation of alleged irregularities in the Benavides and San Diego school districts and in Duval County public offices.

### News from the Congress

by Congressman Frank Icard

We hear a lot of talk about the size of the national debt. The other day I saw an analysis of this debt that pointed up its size better than any other figures I had seen. That is, these figures compared the national debt with our national net worth. A conservative estimate of our net worth or the value of the assets of all the families in America has been very conservatively placed at about \$641,000,000,000. In other words, this estimated net worth figures out at between \$4,000 and \$5,000 per individual in the United States. Now, against this we must charge the total public debt which is in excess of \$310,000,000,000, which figures, in round numbers, about \$2,000 per individual of which approximately \$1,802 is federal debt and \$190 to \$200 represents state and local debts. By deducting what we owe from what we have, it is readily apparent that our true net worth is far less than we like to think. About 90 per cent of this total public debt is owed by the Federal government. The remaining 10 per cent represents the obligations of the states, cities, school districts, counties, and other local governmental organizations. As far as our federal public debt is concerned, Texas' share is roughly \$12,000,000,000, or about \$147.00 per every individual that lives in the state. The debt owed by the state of Texas and its subdivisions is approximately \$94,000,000 or \$11.75 for each Texan. We hear it frequently argued that this tremendous public debt makes no difference because we simply owe it to ourselves. Assuming this were true, it would certainly follow that the size of the taxes that we have to impose to pay off the debts really doesn't matter because we simply pay the taxes to ourselves. Personally, I don't believe in either one of these concepts and feel that it is imperative that we immediately take firm steps for the orderly reduction of our public debt.

We have not always known a great deal about how the Army managed to control all of the goods that it has in its inventories. One of the committees that I am on has been, during the last year, studying the way that the Army controls and manages its inventories. I was surprised to find out that the Army never actually knows the dollar value of its inventories and that it only estimates the value of the goods it has in its warehouses by estimating the dollar value by the ton. This, of course, is not a very satisfactory way to keep track of their assets, and I doubt if any business in the country could long survive by using this method. It is estimated, however, that the present value of the Army's inventory is somewhere around \$30,000,000,000 and that it has another \$6,000,000,000 of goods on order. This is probably the largest inventory that has ever been accumulated under one unit of management. Our recipe this week is for **Apple Crumble**

1/2 cup sifted flour, 3/4 cup nonfat dry milk solids, 1/4-1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 cup butter, 3 cups sliced apples.

Mix flour, nonfat dry milk solids, sugar, nutmeg, salt and cinnamon. Cut in butter with pastry blender until mixture is crumbly. Arrange apples in a shallow well greased covered baking dish. Sprinkle apples with dry mixture. Bake at 350 degrees F. for about 30 minutes or until apples are tender. Remove cover and bake for a few more minutes until crumbs are brown. Serve with cream or whipped topping. Six servings.
