Have you cleaned your silver recently? Here is a quick and simple method that I have used with excellent results. In the botom of a large enamelware pan, place a large piece of aluminum foil. Add enough water to cover silver to be cleaned, plus 1 tablespoon of baking soda for each quart of water. Bring to a boil, a champagne suit with brown and Robert and Fran, assisted with the minutes, remove silver immediately, rinse thoroughly, then dry with a soft cloth. This method is so effective that it should not be used on silver with an oxidized pattern or gray finish. Also never let your silver set in this solution for any length of time. Remember, too, not to put in too much silver at one time.
