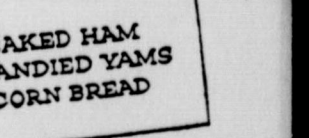

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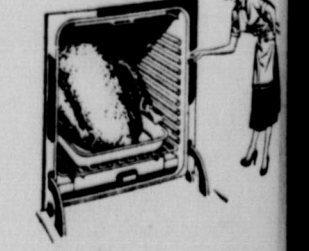

AD CURB

Four big manufacturers of laundry detergents—the makers of Fab, Tide and Cheer, Surf and Hum—have agreed to discontinue certain advertising claims as to the cleansing properties of their products, according to the Federal Trade Commission. The concerns agreed to stop claiming that their products will (a) wash clothes as clean without rinsing as with rinsing or (b) without rinsing, wash clothes cleaner than or as clean as soap with rinsing.

The Gay Highway

The Institute of Life Insurance revealed recently that life insurance beneficiaries had collected over \$53,000,000 as a result of automobile accidents during the first nine months of 1952. This total represents some 27,000 policies, through which beneficiaries have received the \$53,000,000.

The final figure for the nation in 1952 will be something like \$70,000,000 and about 36,000 policies. The scope of such tragic figures is not easily comprehended.

The Institute report, in an effort to show the magnitude of the carnage on the highway, pointed out that the highway death toll is equivalent to the toll of many diseases and the toll being exacted on the Korean battlefields during the same period.

"It is the equivalent, currently, of the combined death toll from influenza, ulcers, appendicitis, homicides, polio, children's contagious diseases and war deaths," the Institute report said. That is quite a record for our country and the saddest part of it is that little hope is held out for any improvement in the near future. On the contrary, the death toll has been rising steadily in recent years, with minor variations, and the trend has been obviously toward greater slaughter for some time. Death is taking no holiday on U. S. highways.

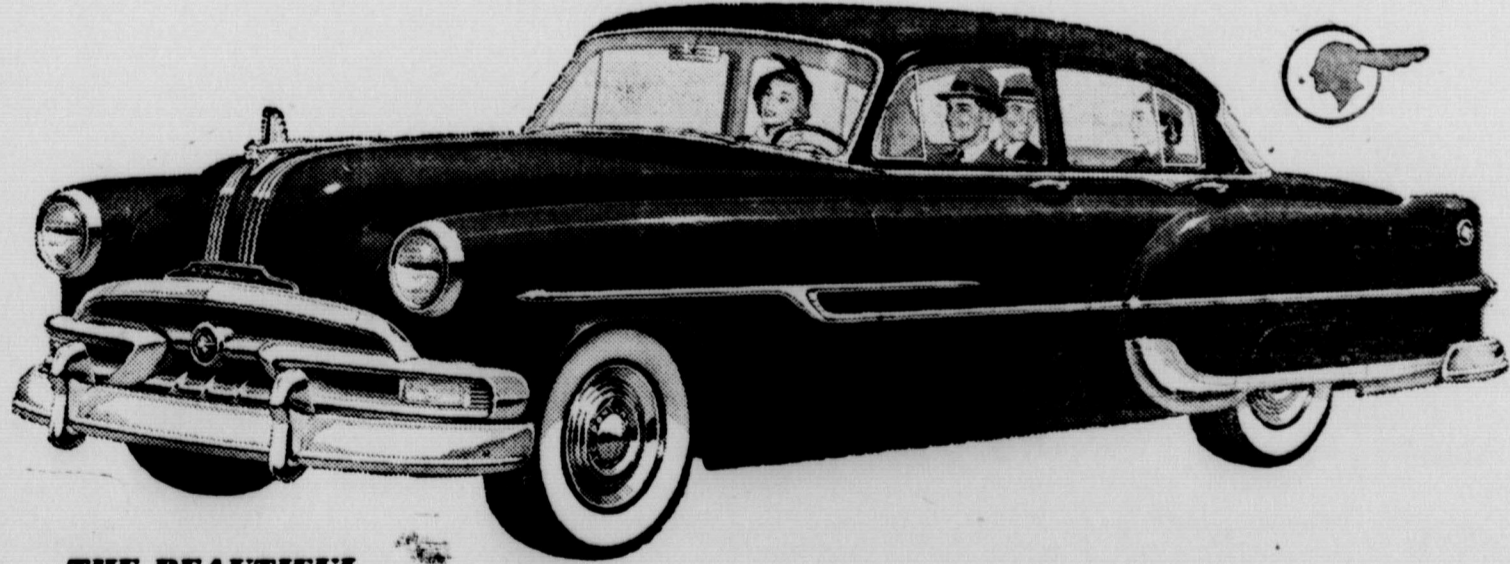

Austin Highlights

by Senator George Moffett

Austin, Texas, Jan. 13, 1953—

The Texas Legislature meets in regular session every two years on the second Tuesday in January. In some States, there is a regular session of the Legislature every year. The general belief of qualified observers seems to favor the Texas system. The Governor can call a thirty day special session at any time that an emergency demands it. Members receive pay only for the days the Legislature is in session. Some other states pay full time annual salaries. However, the Texas plan is thought to be better and also more economical.

There is a wide difference in the size of legislative bodies in the various states. Texas with nearly eight million people has only thirty-one State Senators, Oklahoma with about two and one-quarter million people has forty-four State Senators.

Some students of government maintain that a law-making body with a large membership more nearly represents the will of the people. Others say that a smaller membership can transact business more efficiently with less argument and long-winded debate.

Members of either house of the Legislature can introduce as many bills as they choose. Usually about 1,500 bills are introduced at each regular session. Considerably less than half of them ever reach the Governor's desk. In order to become a law, a bill must pass through both houses by a majority vote. A bill may be, and often is, amended several times in each branch. Amendments also require a majority vote. A bill may pass one house and fail to reach a vote or be voted down in the other branch.

Amendments to the State Constitution must receive a two-thirds favorable majority in each house of the Legislature before being submitted to a statewide election for adoption or rejection by the people.

The Governor is inaugurated on the third Tuesday of January, which in 1953 is on January 20. (By chance this happens to be the same day on which the President of the United States is inaugurated this year.)

Weather permitting a very large crowd will probably be present for the inaugural ceremonies and the reception which follows. It will be a pleasure for me to secure invitations to these events for those desiring same, if notified in time.

This session of the Legislature faces many serious problems which will be discussed in the weeks to come.

Production of engineering alloy steels, used for component parts of machinery and equipment, was some 20 per cent greater in the United States last year. Health Letter

Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas, Geo. W. Cox, M. D., State Health Officer.

If you have not had an audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done, is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to grown-ups in Texas. It is quite as important to check up on your physical resources as it is to look into the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's directions, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid an accumulation of destructive liabilities.

Everyone starts with a certain amount of physical capital and as a personal business proposition it is worthwhile to preserve. In infancy and childhood our physical resources, as a rule, are safeguards for us. As we grow older, the responsibility for doing so rests upon the individual. The critical period for many comes in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being.

The records of health departments and of insurance companies show that from 10 to 15 years have been added to the average length of life. But the same records show that a majority of the deaths are due to the degenerative diseases of middle age.

Nearly all of these diseases have slow beginnings and their onset discovered through physical examinations before they have gained serious headway. Early detection, adjustment of physical expenditures and better budgeting of activities under a physician's direction will help shift the balance from the unfavorable to the favorable side of the ledger.

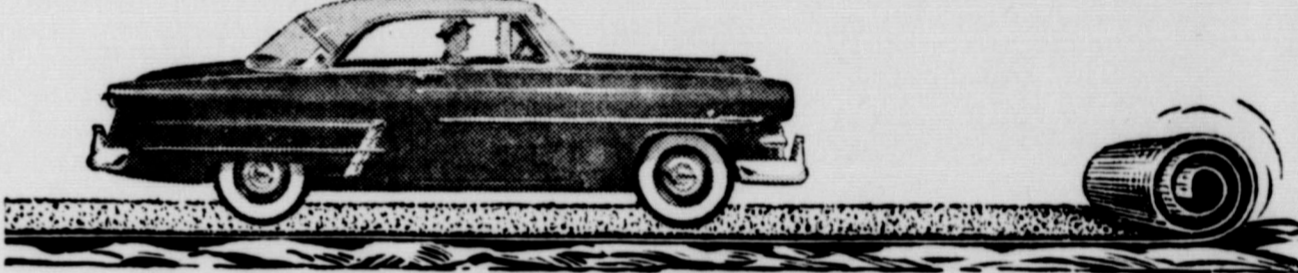

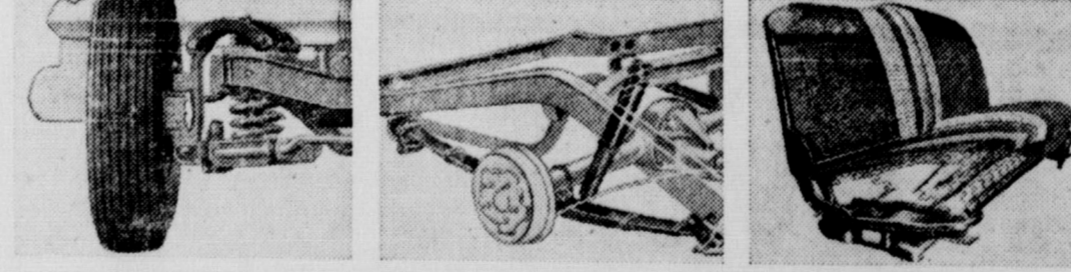

Home Demonstration Notes

MRS. MARY D. BROWN

Last week I visited Mrs. Clarence Ross who lives north of Margaret. We discussed landscaping her front yard. Many of us should begin to think of setting out shrubs to replace the ones we lost in the recent drought. Are you, like Mrs. Ross, interested in evergreen shrubs which require little care? Remember now is the time to begin plans for shrubs which you will want to set out early this spring and you can get this bulletin now from my office to help with your planning.

This is also the time to do some necessary pruning in your yard. Pyracantha and nandinas all over the county need pruning now. Wait to prune japonica, forsythia, bridal wreath and other early blooming shrubs until after they have bloomed.

Council will meet this Saturday at 2:30 p. m. in my office. Let's try to start the new year off right by having 100 per cent attendance. This first meeting is one of the most important of the year.

I will appreciate it if all club presidents will send me the place of their second club meeting for January. I still do not know where some of these meetings will be.
