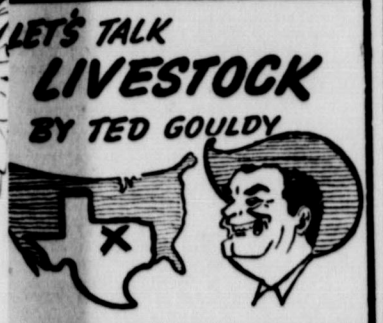
## Work of Removing Pipe Line from Texas Co. Field to Quanah Almost Completed; Pipe Being Cleaned Here

Approximately 32 miles of pipe extending to more than \$175,000 value has been removed from the ground and is currently undergoing a process of reconditioning at the Texas Co. plant near Quanah. The Texas Company began removing the pipe four weeks ago.

According to Glen Elkins, representative of the Texas Company of Fort Worth, the mammoth operation of reconditioning this supply of pipe will be finished within a very short time. Mr. Elkins also stated that the pipe will remain property of the Texas Co. and will be transported to some other location in the near future.

The McCormick Construction Company has been in charge of the pipe removal and the Gulf Coast Pipe Coating Company of Houston has contracted the pipe reconditioning job.

About fourteen local men have been employed by the respective companies in an effort to expedite the process of removing and cleaning the pipe.



**LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY**

After a couple of weeks of better supplies of cattle around a major market circle, followed by strengthening prices, the gates were open again this week and over 111,000 cattle were reported at 12 markets on Monday. Prices sagged from 50 cents to 50 per hundred at Northern markets.

At Fort Worth, despite the fact that a big percentage of the run of fed yearlings and steers, the market was not as strong. Prices of fed steers and yearlings ended steady, and closed 25 to 25 cents lower. Other kinds of cattle were fully steady, with cows and bulls in good demand. Fat calves drew firm prices, and stock-cattle and calves moved at firm prices, some high quality calves drawing stronger.

Fat and feeder lambs were steady to 50 cents higher. Sheep and yearlings were steady. Butcher hogs were 25 to 25 cents higher, topping at \$20.75 to \$21 on Monday. Sows drew 6 to \$19, or 50 cents higher.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$19 to \$23.50. In and medium kinds \$13 to \$19. Stocker steer yearlings sold \$22.50 down. Fat cows sold from \$14 to \$16.50, with canners of cutters from \$10 to \$14. Fed cattle came from a wide area to Fort Worth Monday. E. H. Stator, Igan, Arkansas, had 102 steers, 102 lbs., at \$20 and from the full length of Texas at \$20 (El Paso County) the Hixon Farms shipped 31 heifers 842 lbs. at \$22.50, and 22 heifers at 898 lbs. at \$22.

From South Texas, Bentsen Co., Mission, had 74 yearlings 434 lbs. at \$20.50 and Simmons & Perry, Corpus Christi, had 40 steers at 1,135 lbs. at \$23. Other South Texas shippers were Annally-Hicks Cattle Co., Floresville, two loads of \$22 calves. Wesshoe Cattle Co., of North Texas (Wilbarger Co.) had a load of 571-lb. yearlings at \$22. Market in the Texas Plains was presented by Halsell Cattle Co., with a load of heavy 940-lb. heifers at \$20.

Good and choice fat calves \$19 to \$20; cull, common and medium \$15 to \$18.00. Stocker yearlings \$24 down. Stocker calves \$12.00-18.00. Bulls \$12 to \$15.

Woolled fat lambs \$18-21.50, with No. 2 and No. 3 pelts \$15 and choice drew \$18.00. Stocker and feeder lambs drew \$14.00-19.50. Fat yearlings and two's, shorn, drew \$16.00-20.00. Slaughter ewes sold for \$4-9.50.

## F.F.A. AND 4-H PROJECT SHOW HERE LAST WEEK END DRAWS BIG CROWDS

Steers, swine, poultry, rabbits, pigeons, doves, guinea pigs, and bakery products were judged Saturday afternoon at the 16th annual Foard County FFA and 4-H Project Show, held in the Self Motor Company's building at Crowell and sponsored by the Crowell Rotary Club.

A large crowd was present for the day's activities which included a youth parade, free John Deere show and the exhibition and judging of the projects.

**Fat Steer Entries**

The grand champion of the show was owned by Gordon Fish and weighed 840 pounds. This calf was bred by Egbert Fish and was bought by the Farmers Co-op Elevator at 32½ cents per pound.

## Texas Natural Gas Co. to Be Given Increase in Rates

The City Council of the City of Crowell, upon a request made recently by the Texas Natural Gas Co., passed an ordinance on January 20 providing for a small increase in the local gas rates. This augmentation is currently in effect, beginning February 13 with the cards sent out on April 1 bearing the new rates. Old rates will prevail on the statements mailed for March 1.

New rates include the following measures and prices: domestic rate, 1700 cubic feet or less used per month will cost \$1.30; premiums for usage of gas over 28,000 cubic feet will show a 5c increase making the total 70c per thousand; a 5c increase will exist on gas exceeding 30,000 cubic feet making a total of 45c per thousand on this type figure. Industrial rates will be 5 cents higher, also with the 30c per thousand charge instead of 25c.

A comparison was made recently comparing the increased rates for Crowell with that of surrounding towns and the proposed rate increase for Crowell indicated that the hike was very conservative. The Texas Natural Gas Co., owned by the Culbertson Brothers of Fort Worth, requested the increase to meet the high cost of materials in maintaining gas services for this community.

### Health Letter

**Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas, Geo. W. Cox, M. D., State Health Officer.**

Spot checks of meat markets by the State Health Department meat inspectors insure Texas housewives that when they buy a pound of hamburger they're getting a product whose contents have been carefully defined by state law, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

In revealing that more than 1,000 meat samples were collected last year for laboratory analysis from all sections of the state, Dr. Cox says that the food and drug inspectors have been ordered to increase the frequency of their inspections of community butcher shops in an effort to curb the sale of horsemeat as hamburger.

By state law, hamburger is defined as "chopped or ground fresh beef, with or without the addition of beef fat as such, and with or without seasoning, and shall contain not more than 30 per cent fat."

That definition, health officials say, makes it unlawful to add chemical preservatives or fillers such as cereals or skim milk.

It prevents unsuspecting housewives from paying ground beef prices for a high-fat content product, or one which has been doctored with inexpensive cereals. It protects the consuming public against a spoiled or adulterated product which could be hazardous to health.

More than 95 per cent of the meat products analyzed in state laboratories last year were hamburger. State law makes no distinction between hamburger and ground beef.

The 30 per cent maximum fat content of hamburger is a standard set by the Bureau of Animal Industry, and except for one or two exceptions is adhered to by all states. A similar maximum has been established for moisture content.

Twenty-six meat inspectors work under the jurisdiction of the Texas Health Department's bureau of food and drugs. More than one errant meat dealer can testify to their diligence.

Our recipe this week is:

**Meat and Vegetable Casserole**  
1 lb. ground meat, 1 green pepper, 1 onion, 1 garlic pod (if desired), 3 tablespoons fat, 2 eggs, 2 cups canned corn, 2 cups canned tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste, 1 cup bread crumbs. Melt fat in skillet, add chopped onion, pepper and garlic and cook until tender. Add seasoned ground meat combined with the eggs. Cook until the mixture loses its red color. Butter a casserole, and sprinkle with bread crumbs, then put in half of meat mixture, a layer of corn, and one of tomatoes. Repeat, and sprinkle top with bread crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 to 45 minutes.

## Governor Issues Proclamation for Heart Campaign

In a state-wide appeal for all Texans to support the current Texas Heart Fund, honorary chairman Governor Allan Shivers pointed out that diseases affecting the heart and circulatory system caused 743,000 deaths in a single year and have disabled millions of Americans, many of them Texans. In a specially prepared proclamation, Governor Shivers said, "These diseases are recognized as the most important medical problem affecting the life and health of citizens in this community and throughout the nation."

"The month of February is sponsored each year by the American Heart Association and its affiliates to focus public attention on the medical, social and economic aspects of this leading health problem, and to secure the fullest cooperation of the people, science, government, health agencies and social agencies, in devising means to combat this menace," the governor said.

In a radio broadcast beamed throughout the state, Governor Shivers said, "There are many forms of heart ailments and practically any one of them can strike at anyone in Texas, regardless of age and any other consideration. These different forms of heart diseases are responsible for more deaths than any other cause. The heart is so complicated, so delicate an organ that the medical profession freely admits there is a great deal about the heart they do not know. Now this is decidedly not the fault of the medical profession. Rather, it is the fault of everyone of us, because it has been only in recent years that people began to realize that it was imperative that funds be made available for research, for study, for the development of treatments and medication, and for the purpose of educating the public concerning the importance of properly caring for the heart."

"A program such as this—a program of education both for the medical profession and the layman—costs money. That is the purpose of the campaign to which I proudly lend my name."

The goal of the Texas Heart Association is \$408,000, which will be raised by volunteer workers from every walk of life. Edgar M. Brown, executive director of the Texas Heart Association, said that schools, churches, scientific bodies, civic associations, business establishments, social and fraternal organizations and the Texas people generally have been asked by Governor Shivers to cooperate wholeheartedly in the activities of American Heart Month.

**Austin Highlights**

The Legislature has now reached the stage where numerous and often lengthy committee hearings are the order of the day. The Constitution requires that every bill must be referred to a suitable committee immediately after it is read the first time in each branch of the Legislature. Of course, many bills are non-contested and therefore the committee hearings are usually brief, and the bill is then reported favorably with the recommendation that it be printed and placed on the calendar for consideration and final vote by the full membership of the house in which it then reposes.

However, a committee hearing is usually held on most of the important bills, particularly if they fall into the contested class, such as taxation, oil and gas regulations, etc. A date is set for a public hearing, and frequently hundreds of people come to Austin to participate in these committee hearings. On one night during the past week more than 1,000 school teachers were here to attend a Senate committee hearing on a bill to increase

**Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL**

One step in the direction of solving the state's difficult highway problem was taken when the Legislature passed a resolution asking the federal government to abandon its two-cent per gallon gasoline tax.

States now levying an income tax have agreed to give up that revenue source if the federal government will stop taxing gasoline. Texas has no state income tax, so Texas has everything to gain and nothing to lose.

The resolution was introduced in the House of Representatives by Will Lee Smith of Beaumont and in the Senate by Senator Johnnie B. Rogers of Austin.

A campaign to bring about retirement of the federal government from the field of motor fuel taxation was initiated by Governor Allan Shivers and the National Conference of Governors.

Farm and highway user groups are supporting the campaign.

The resolution urges the governor to send suitable representatives from Texas to Washington to appear before congressional committees and urge repeal.

If the federal government abandons its two-cent tax, the state teachers' salaries \$600.00 per year on a state-wide basis. The following night a committee hearing was held on the optometry regulation bill which lasted well past midnight for a total duration of more than five hours. The night following that there was a five hour hearing on an insurance bill.

These hearings afford a reasonably good opportunity for all of the arguments for and against a bill to be developed. A member of the Legislature does not necessarily swallow everything that is said but the hearings do provide a better overall picture of the questions involved than can be secured in any other manner.

It is regrettable that our State is so large that many who desire to appear and be heard can not do so because of the time and distance involved in coming to the State Capitol. Three of the twelve counties in the district which I represent are larger than the State of Rhode Island. This clearly illustrates the difference in the process of passing laws in Texas and in a small state like Rhode Island or Delaware.

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the legislative sessions. If approved, the amendment would become effective January 1, 1955.

The proposal, introduced in the House by Representative Murphy of Houston, now goes to the Senate. It provides that after the first 120 days, the pay of lawmakers would drop to \$5 per day, the present rate.

In the House is a bill by Representative Robert Patten of Jasper, who advocates the creation of a public utilities commission.

According to the terms of the bill, the governor would appoint members of the three-man commission for six-year terms.

The commission would be empowered to set telephone, gas and electricity rates, except those of consumers' co-operatives or those owned by cities.

Patten said the commission is "necessary to assure just and reasonable rates for services and utilities products and thus protect the legitimate interests of the consumer and of the utility and assure adequate and non-discriminatory services."

Authority for fixing utility rates now rests with the cities, and it is felt by proponents of Patten's bill that a state commission would tend to bring about more uniformity in the pricing of utility services.

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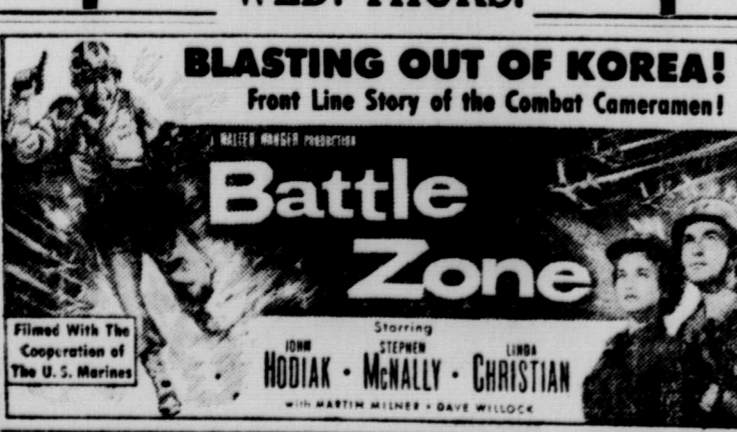
