

#### GOOD BUY

It goes without saying that farm machinery has caused a quiet but thorough agricultural revolution over the last few decades. Once it took 85 per cent of our working force just to produce our food and fiber-today the figure is about 15 per cent. Mechanization-the application of all manner of machines to tasks that were once done slowly and laboriously by muscle-power-is largely responsible. And, as an added dividend, the machine has eliminated endless drudgery and brought far higher living standards to the farm family.

Moreover-and despite widely-held misconceptions to the contrary-the cost of those machines to the farmer who buys them has risen very moderately in the light of the changes that have taken place in other costs and prices.

As of a recent date, for instance, farm wages were 232.5 per cent higher than in 1939. The value of farm products was 217.4 per cent higher. The price of all commodities in general-the many things the farmer and the rest of us buy-was a trifle more than 137 per cent higher. But farm machinery cost only 70 per cent more than in 1939-and the machinery of today is better and faster than that of the past.

That fact brings up some other interesting comparisons. The farm machinery maker gets 70 per cent more for what he sells. At the same time, wages in tractor factories have gone up almost twice as much-138.6 per cent. And in the comparable period, the Federal income taxes paid by a group of leading farm machinery companies showed a sky-high jump of more than 2,000 per cent.

The machine is the key to modern farming. And, on top of that, it's one of the best buys open to the farmer.


#### WHERE YOU SPEND \$1648

Do you know what happened to \$1648 of your money last year? If your family is an average one, with four members, that much of its income went for taxes, Federal, state and local, according to Commerce Department figures. And things are getting worse instead of better. The total tax take of government in 1951 was \$63,600,000,000. This year the combined total will be around \$80,000,000,000.

Taxes now account for at least 30 per cent of the whole national income-which means that one-third of our working time is spent to support government, not ourselves and our families. A very large part of the cost of everything we buy-from so small an item as a loaf of bread to so large a one as a new car-is represented by taxes. It's literally true that you can't walk a block without kicking in to the tax collector-at the least, you'll cause some wear on your shoes and when you have to replace them taxes will enter in to what you must pay for the new pair!

The theory that taxes needn't worry most of us, for the reason that the bill can be paid by the rich, was blown sky-high long ago. The rich are taxed to the point of confiscation now, and if we took a cool 100 per cent of their Under the direction Missionaries earnings it wouldn't carry government for more than a few weeks out of the year. Those who are exempt from the payment of a polltax, and who reside in a city of ten thousand inhabitants or more, must secure a certificate from the Tax Collector of their County of residence before the first day of February of the year when such taxpayer shall become entitled to said exemption.

This exemption is good for one year. A new exemption must be secured for each year. Certificates of exemption are issued without cost to the person entitled to receive the same.

#### Those who reside in cities of ess than ten thousand inhabtants are not required to secure this certificate of exemption before voting. These may make proof of their exemption at the time of voting to the presiding udge of the election where they are qualified to reside to vote.




