Callahan Due Wildcat; Gets Discovery

Callahan County had a wildcat location and a small Ellenburger discovery Saturday.

J. J. Lynn, Abilene, staked No. 1 R. D. Williams as a 3,200-foot test 1 1/2 miles northwest of Putnam.

Location is 1320 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 301, Block 5, SP Survey.

Magnolia Petroleum Co. No. 1 Dyer Trust, Section 22, ETRR Survey, seven miles north of Baird, and one mile northwest of the Red Horse Field, has been completed for 78.48 barrels of 41.3 gravity oil in the Ellenburger.

The well is producing on pump from 40 perforations at 4,561-71 feet. Total depth was 4,579.

Magnolia No. 8 Elma Jackson, Section 115, BBB&C Survey, Red Horse Field project, has been completed as a new producer in the Moran Sand with a daily flow of 89.32 barrels of 42 gravity oil.

Production was through 13-64 choke with 800 pounds on casing and 200 pounds on tubing from 20 perforations at 2,704-09 feet. Total depth was 2,711 feet and casing was run to bottom. Gas-oil ratio was 696-1.

J. J. Rogers & L. B. Thomas, Waco, will drill No. 1 Harry Harris as a 1,990-foot project on the west side of the Denton Field eight miles southwest of Clyde.

Location is 630 feet from the south and 150 feet from the east lines of Section 19, BBB&C Survey.

School Board Delays Vote On Oplin District

Members of the Callahan County School board heard numerous propositions Tuesday as to the disposition of the dormant Oplin School district.

County School Superintendent L. C. Cash said the board heard the various pleas from the interested parties, but adjourned without taking any action.

He said that no school had been in operation in the Oplin district for the past two years. As a result, state school law classifies the district as a dormant school district and requires the County School Board consolidate it with an adjoining district or districts.

The board will go into consideration of the various propositions at the later date, Cash said.

Fred Cook of Putnam, president of the board, will call a meeting before the summer is over to make final disposition of the matter.

On May 23, Oplin held an election for consolidation of the school district with the Lawn School District. The issue failed 49 to 54.

Pilot applicants must have normal 20-20 vision, while aircraft observer candidates need only have 20-50 vision correctable with glasses to the normal 20-20.

Young men applying now for observer training can expect assignment within six weeks after they successfully complete the qualifying tests.

LEADERSHIP: President Eisenhower took the steps this week for which many of us have waited.

He called a halt to repeated Republican old guard efforts to go back to the Harding-Coolidge-Hoover days. He requested Republican leaders to drop the Appropriation Committee's foreign policy amendment — urged rewriting of the Simpson Bill to conform more nearly to his own feeling that the Reciprocal Trade Act should be extended as is — and pressed forward his own world trade views.

President Eisenhower's aggressive action may save these measures. Most Democrats support the President on them.

COTTON EXPORTS: News from the world's cotton markets is that exports of American cotton are running more than 50 per cent below the 1952 level.

This may be a temporary sales slump. But some observers fear it is the beginning of a long-term change in the pattern of marketing. Texans, remembering that the depression had its roots back in the 'twenties when our export markets started slipping away, will watch this situation carefully.

Note: Wheat exports also are falling substantially.

OIL IMPORTS: Oil also is of tremendous importance to Texas. Imports of foreign oil into this country are viewed with continuing concern.

The Administration appears to stand on middle ground. Secretary of the Interior McKay has said the industry must solve the problem through the exercise of "industrial statesmanship."

General Ernest O. Thompson of the Texas Railway Commission has taken a somewhat similar position. He thinks the industry should voluntarily restrict imports. The alternative, he warns, is likely to be some type of Government control. We don't want that.

The Republican Policy Committee met a few days ago and decided on a list of "must" legislation before the Congress adjourns. They are shooting at adjournment on August 1, but it is more of a "hope" than a definite commitment.

The "must" legislation is as follows:

1. Legislation on submerged lands in the outer Continental Shelf.
2. Simplification of custom laws.
3. Appropriations Bills.
4. Extension of the Reciprocal Trades Act.
5. A wheat gift or loan to Pakistan.
6. Legislation to admit 240,000 refugees and European Nationals.
7. Tax legislation.
8. Foreign Aid Bill.
9. Government Reorganization plans.

From all indications, it does not appear likely that amendments to the Taft-Hartley Act will be brought up. Neither does it appear that the Social Security laws will be revised in this Session.

In my opinion, there is certainly a need for an overhauling of Social Security. There are many inequalities in the present system. The Ways and Means Committee which handles these matters has set up a Subcommittee to give a thorough study to it and for them to do the proper job, it will take several months. I hope that the Old Age Insurance laws, and Social Security generally, can be greatly improved.

I have previously discussed my opposition to the Bill admitting 240,000 so-called refugees from Europe into this country. I shall do everything I possibly can to defeat such action.

With reference to the Foreign Aid Bill, I have proposed to the Secretary of State and to the Foreign Affairs Committee of the Congress, to postpone action until sometime in the fall. There is enough money left over from prior years to carry on the Co-operative Defense Preparation in Western Europe and other place for several months. Due to the fact that there are many uncertainties around the world at the present time, I think we should wait until some of them clear up considerably before we throw more good money after some bad. For instance, the situation in France is very shaky at this time, and it is extremely doubtful they are going to join the so-called European Defense Community. The British are in trouble in Egypt; the French in trouble in Indo-China; the en-

Church World Service Begins Milk Shipment

NEW YORK — Nearly 12,500,000 pounds of powdered milk—U. S. Government surplus stocks allocated to Church World Service for distribution in emergency areas of distress in Europe and Asia—will go aboard on its American church-sponsored mission of relief during the next two or three months.

A first ten-car shipment of 300,000 pounds will start for distress areas immediately. It will come from Government warehouses in Minnesota and Wisconsin and will be shipped through the ocean-bottom ports of Milwaukee and New Orleans. This was announced by Dr.

Wynn C. Fairfield, Executive Director, at CWS headquarters at 120 East 23rd Street, New York City.

Destinations of the first shipment include the drastic emergency areas of Berlin, Yugoslavia and Austria, the famine areas of Indian and Pakistan and food-depleted Korea.

In shipments to follow in almost day-by-day sequence, additional areas which will receive supplies include Greece, Italy, Trieste, France, Belgium, the Palestinian refugee centers in the Near East, Okinawa, and the Honk Kong zone in China.

In announcing the allocation of this vast amount of food and the beginning of its shipment for distribution abroad, Dr. Wynn C. Fairfield said:

"This opening of the government surplus stores of food to the volunteer relief programs supported by the American Christians through Church World Service is of immeasurable value in terms of allaying distress among the hunger-ridden millions overseas.

"Some idea of the enormity of the welcome task it places upon our church people as regards its distribution may be gained from the fact that, in pounds, this allocation is greater than the total in relief supplies which they sent abroad through Church World Service in all of 1952.

"While this huge food supply has been given without charge by the American government, it remains the task of the churches to finance its movement to the

areas of need and its distribution to the many hundreds of thousands who will benefit physically by it and to whom it will be a tangible symbol of the friendship and compassion of the people of our country.

"Church World Service will require upwards of \$300,000 in additional cash for 1953 in order to care for freight, shipping and distribution costs incidental to the realization of this great relief opportunity.

"We have, however, accepted this huge allocation immediately confident that our constituent membership will gladly support this tremendous endeavor. Early responses from denominational agencies sustain this confidence."

The total allocation of milk

powder, Dr. Fairfield said, would supply each of 3,500,000 persons with a pint of liquid milk daily for a month.

Church World Service, a Central Department of the National Council of the Church of Christ in the U.S.A., is the interdenominational agency which represents and carries out world-wide relief, rehabilitation and reconstruction on behalf of the thirty-five major Protestant and Eastern Orthodox denominations in the United States.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Snow Peak Pudding

1 package chocolate pudding powder 2 cups water
 2 eggs, separated 1/2 cup sugar
 2 cups Pet Evaporated Milk 1/4 cup shredded coconut

Put pudding powder into a saucepan. Stir in gradually a mixture of well-beaten egg yolks, milk and water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Pour into a shallow serving dish holding about 6 cups. Cover and chill. At serving time, beat egg whites until fluffy. Add sugar slowly, beating until stiff. Drop by heaping tablespoons on top of pudding, allowing one spoonful for each serving. Top meringue with equal parts of coconut. Makes 6 servings.
