General Soil Conservation District Operators Have Gotten Grass Seeding Underway in Foard County

Local farmers, who are cooperating with the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District, have gotten grass seeding underway in Foard County during the past few weeks. Two different types of seeding have been applied: seeding cropland for permanent pasture, and seeding cropland to grass for temporary pasture.

to use as a temporary pasture. Mr. Statser planted this with his own equipment in 40-inch rows. M. N. Kenner planted 16 acres of Blue Panic on his farm 6 miles northwest of Crowell. He used a district-owned two-row planter which planted it in 40-inch rows. Mr. Kenner has this field fenced so that he can use it as a temporary pasture.

Jessie Grimm used the same planter as Mr. Kenner when he planted 6 acres of temporary pasture with Blue Panic on his farm 1 mile south of Thalia.

Guy Morgan seeded 20 acres of Blue Panic with a district-owned grass drill on his farm 7 miles northwest of Crowell. Mr. Morgan seeded the grass in 40-inch rows by using only three of the outlets on the drill.

Henry and Lee Black seeded 50 acres of temporary pasture to Blue Panic on their farm 1 mile east of Foard City. They used another of the district-owned grass drills and seeded their grass in 38-inch rows.

Buford Randolph seeded 6 acres of Blue Panic for a temporary pasture on his farm 5 miles southwest of Crowell. He used a district-owned drill and put his grass in 38-inch rows.

T. J. Ferguson seeded 3 acres of temporary pasture to Blue Panic on his farm 4 miles east of Foard City. He also used the district-owned grass drill with 38-inch row spacing.

All of these cooperators have either had experience with Blue Panic before, or they have observed the grazing that it affords on another farm nearby, and have realized the amount of grazing it can produce. Blue Panic is well adapted to this part of the state and furnishes abundant grazing under favorable conditions. It is a perennial grass and once a stand is established it will produce good for several years.

TORNADOES STRIKE FOARD COUNTY SATURDAY AFTERNOON, MAY FIRST

At least two tornadoes ripped across Foard County early Saturday afternoon, crossing the Crowell-Vernon highway about four and six miles east of Crowell, completely destroying barns and out-

buildings on some farms and causing great damage to farm houses. The first twister struck across the highway about six miles east of Crowell at 1 o'clock and demolished the pickup of Sam

Hulme, about 55, of Vernon, and carried it across the fence into a field. Mr. Hulme escaped injury with the exception of two cracked ribs. He was taken to Vernon and treated and released from the Vernon Clinic.

Nine First-Division Ratings Awarded to Members of Crowell High School Band at Stephenville Last Saturday

The Crowell High School Band, directed by E. L. Rickard, made an excellent showing at the Regional 2 Interscholastic League Band Music Festival held at Stephenville last Saturday. There were 19 high schools and over 1200 students participating in this contest.

The various solos, ensembles, and other band events were rated downward from division one through five. None of Crowell's contestants rated below division three and nine were placed in the first division. The Band was rated first for marching last fall. It was rated in second division in concert and third in sight reading. This is the best showing any Crowell band has ever made at the Regional meet.

All out houses and a windmill at the home of Mrs. Valeria Owens in the northeast part of the county were blown away and a porch was torn off the home. An old house on land owned by Mrs. Ed Rettig, southeast of Crowell, was destroyed and large mesquites uprooted. The strong wind cut a path across the mesquite grove on the A. D. Campbell farm on the highway and did damage at the Archie Campbell home place. In addition to telephone and R. E. A. lines being torn down, large trees were destroyed.

Heavy Rains During Storm

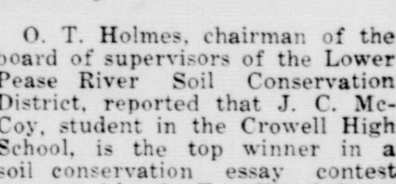
Heavy rains visited all parts of the county Saturday with the exception of the Vivian community in the extreme western part. In Crowell 1.85 inches was recorded by the Government gauge. One inch of moisture also fell last Thursday. Three inches was recorded in the Margaret community.

Hail accompanied the rain Saturday with some damage to the wheat crop reported.

Following the storms and heavy rain Saturday, a cold front blew in that night and the temperature got down into the 30's. The cold spell was a record breaker for this section at this time of year, and the cool weather continued until Wednesday afternoon.

MOTHER'S DAY ESTABLISHED ONLY IN 1913

Today most people think of Mother's Day as one of the most important holidays of the year. Yet, just a few years ago, there was no such holiday.

Credit for the idea of a day honoring mothers is given to Miss Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia. After seven years of campaigning for the idea, Miss Jarvis finally succeeded in persuading Congress to pass a resolution setting aside the second Sunday in May as a national holiday.

Miss Jarvis first got the idea when her mother died in 1906.

As soon as May 10, 1908, and as a result of her work, Philadelphia observed its first Mother's Day.

Persuading Philadelphia to observe the holiday was only the first step in her campaign. She wrote thousands of letters to influential people, interviewed public men and pleaded for the observance of the day.

Another goal was accomplished in 1912 when the governor of Texas observed the day by pardoning a number of prisoners. This practice has been followed ever since and other states have followed suit.

Her dreams were finally realized when in May, 1913, Pennsylvania made Mother's Day a state holiday, and the same month Congress made it a national holiday.

Next Sunday, exactly 42 years after the first observance, the day will be observed all over the world in all churches, schools, and other organizations. It is dedicated "to the memory of the best mother in the world, your mother."

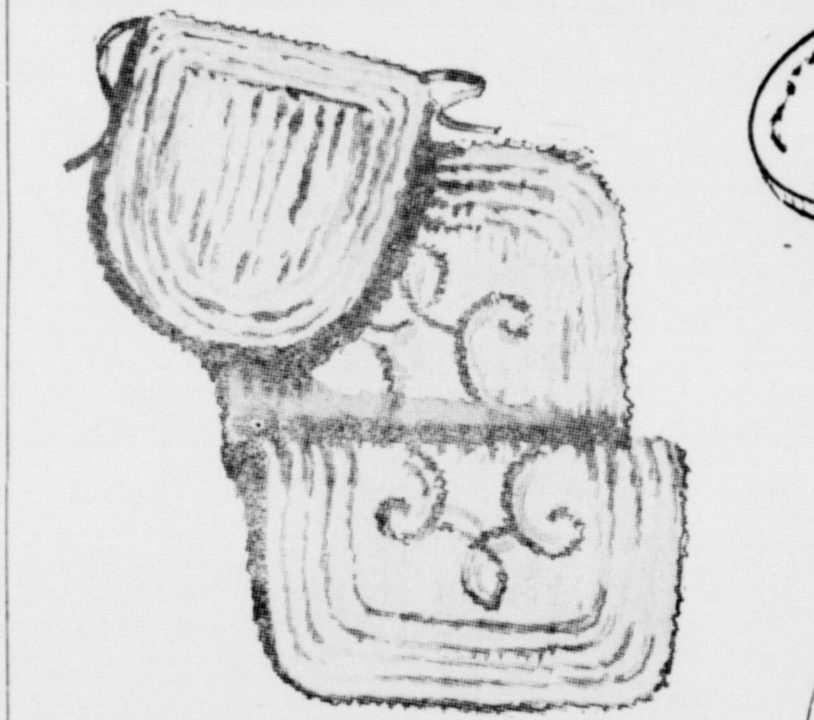

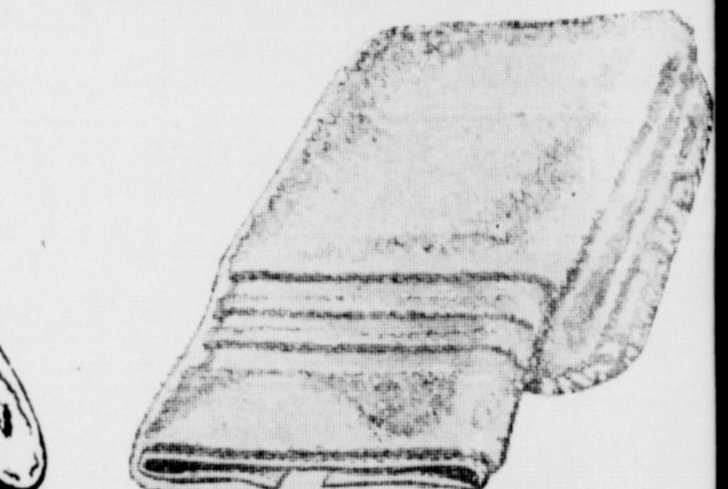

Austin, Tex.—All the questions having been resolved concerning who is going to run for what, the big political season is now under way.

Ralph Yarborough of Austin, who announced that he would be a candidate against Allan Shivers for governor, declared himself against breaking the two-term tradition in the chief executive's office.

Yarborough contends that Shivers actually is seeking a fourth term; the incumbent has served two elective terms in office, plus the unexpired term of the late Beauford Jester.

Machine politics and one-man domination of the state government were also charged by Yarborough as he put his name on the ticket.

Shivers had previously announced for an unprecedented third term for governor. He had stated prior to the announcement that there remain some things that need to be done, such as putting through a water conservation program.

No. 1 Problems
Governors of five Southwestern states attended a White House conference to talk about the drought.

"Agriculture and livestock are our No. 1 problems," Shivers said at the conference, and "a permanent solution for them must be found. Past efforts over many years have not been more than temporary expedients."
