New Electric Score Board at Wildcat Stadium to Be Ready for Home Games

Already installed with only the conduit for the control system awaiting completion is a new electric scoreboard which will accommodate the fans who watch the gridiron spectacles at Wildcat Stadium this fall.

This new scoreboard, modern in every respect, is a heavy aluminum alloy cabinet 18 feet in length and 8 feet high. Numerals are 24 inches with 3-inch colored lens. The timing set-up is the modern flash-type which clicks

off seconds instead of the obsolete clock-type unit. Located at the southeast corner of the football field, it replaced the old scoreboard at the same site.

A note of interest might be the nominal cost with which the school has acquired the new board. Since the time of the purchase of the new scoring unit by the local school board, the demand for this model has increased and so has the price. The cost of the board and the installation will run about \$1,600. School employees have been in charge of installation and as a result, the labor has been at a minimum cost to the school. A great deal of the cost for the scoreboard has been provided for by advertisers whose firm names shall appear on the board. Those firms include Hughston Insurance Agency, Farmers Co-Op. Captain Hallmark dealt primarily with the safety hazards of automobile driving and he further stressed methods being advocated by the Department of Public Safety, which will, in effect, reduce traffic fatalities and accidents.

The Setliff Machine Shop has recently installed a 14,000-pound Federal Stamping Machine. The new mechanism, tremendous in size, has a stamping capacity of some 80 tons which can manufacture a variety of mechanical items with the proper dies.

Agent Says to Soak Lawn for Maximum Watering Results

We all know our gardens need water these hot, searing summer days. But do we know how to water our gardens? Joe Burkett, County Agent, passes this information along to us. He says most garden and yard soils here in Texas need about an inch of water per week. If this is not supplied by rain, we should supply it by irrigation. One good, thorough soaking every five to seven days is much better than several light waterings at more frequent intervals. Watering should be done in late afternoon or very early morning. Be sure to apply water slowly for deep penetration. Mulches of organic material will help in this penetration and will also help mold moisture in the soil. By following this advice, watering your garden, lawn, shrubs will be easier and your results better.

Elaborate Preparations Being Made for Emergency March of Dimes Drive

With polio incidence mounting throughout the nation and March of Dimes funds exhausted, the citizens of Foard County are rallying in support of the Emergency March of Dimes, Mike Bird, campaign director, declared today.

Volunteer workers, taking time out of their normal vacation period, have addressed hundreds of letters of solicitation outlining the grim financial crisis faced by the polio fighting organization, Mr. Bird said. The crisis arises from a combination of the greatest patient aid load in history and the tremendously costly new program of polio prevention, he said. A group of high school typing students under the direction of Henry Black has been doing the addressing of the letters.

In addition, coin canisters are being distributed throughout the county. This canister carries a picture of a little girl in an iron lung, symbolizing the thousands of polio patients whose lives depend on March of Dimes help. At the time the picture was taken, Mr. Bird said, the child relied on the huge tank respirator for every breath she drew. Today, thanks to care made possible by the March of Dimes, she can romp and play with other children.

"We know that when the people of Foard County are informed of the desperate need of polio patients all over the country and are given the opportunity to help, they will do so," Mr. Bird said.

The Emergency March of Dimes will be conducted August 16-31.

YOUR SENATOR REPORTS

Red China and the UN: The Senate spoke with one voice against the entrance of Red China into the United Nations.

We voted unanimously to write into the foreign aid bill the opposition of Congress to the seating in the United Nations of the Communist China regime as the representative of China.

The amendment we adopted also requests President Eisenhower, in the event of Red Chinese admission to the United Nations, to inform Congress "of the implications of this action upon the foreign policy of the United States... together with any recommendations which he may have with respect to the matter."

I know, from the many letters I have received on the subject, that this will meet with the approval of the people of Texas.

"Catch-All" Money Bill: One of the final actions of the Senate Appropriations Committee during this session was to send to the floor of the Senate a \$2,015,771,000 supplemental appropriation bill. The bill is a sort of "catch-all" for funds which must be made available before Congress adjourns.

The measure provides extra money requested by President Eisenhower to carry out the programs of scores of agencies in the current fiscal year. It was \$162,000,000 less than the total requested.

Military Construction: The supplemental appropriations bill, as reported by the committee, included substantial sums for military construction. Among specific recommendations were the following:

The committee voted \$796,000,000 in new funds for Air Force construction at home and abroad. It authorized a total of \$907,000,000. The difference between the two figures will come from money carried over from past years.

For naval base construction, the committee approved \$114,000,000 in new funds and a total authorization of \$209,000,000. For Army construction, the sum of \$205,000,000 in new money was approved. Also included was \$175,000,000 for 11,000 military housing units.

Important to Texas: So far as Texas is concerned, the supplemental appropriations bill also was important for one item it did not contain. I refer to the request of the Federal Power Commission for

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before World War II and will be carried out under the lease-purchase program recently written into law.

The General Services Administration and the Post Office Department are now compiling a list of priority Federal construction for submission to the Budget Bureau and to the House and Senate Public Works Committees. As this is written, the priority list is expected to reach Capitol Hill before the end of the session.

A large number of proposed buildings in Texas are included among the Federal building projects listed as eligible for construction. I am hopeful that a fair share of them will be placed on the priority list.

Public Buildings Program: The Federal Government is about to launch a public buildings program to extend over the next three years. It will be the first since Texas Army Maneuvers: It has been announced that the 47th Infantry Division and the First Armored Division will hold special maneuvers in Texas this fall. The ultimate aim is to develop an atomic age army.

The maneuvers will be conducted with a view of shaping practically the entire Army into a radically different structure. There will be smaller divisions but more of them, each independent of the other. A new mobility will be achieved through the use of helicopters and converti-planes. The converti-plane is a plane which rises like a helicopter but flies close to the speed of ordinary aircraft.

So Texas once again will be in the position of making extraordinary contributions to the national security.

Home Demonstration Notes

MRS. MARY D. BROWN

Last Monday night, August 2, we started our clothing class. Those present were Mrs. J. T. Hughston, Mrs. Viola Bingerstaff, Mrs. Bob Abston, Mrs. Glen Fox, Mrs. Gerald Knox, Mrs. A. B. Calvin, Mrs. S. H. Ross and Miss Marilyn Hays. They voted to meet twice a week, on Monday and Friday nights, at 7:30 o'clock in my office for 5 meetings.

Quite a few of you have asked me about starting another clothing group this fall. If enough of you are interested perhaps we can work out some arrangements then.

Our recipe this week is for—Nut Sponge Cake

1 1/2 lb. shelled nuts (peanuts, walnuts, black walnuts, Brazil nuts, almonds, hazelnuts or pecans), 6 tablespoons all-purpose flour, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 10 eggs, 1 and 1/4 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Pre-heat oven at 375 degrees F. Line bottom of a 10-inch tube pan with waxed paper. Grease the paper. Grind the nuts in a food grinder, using medium blade. Sift flour and cream of tartar together and mix with the ground nuts. Separate the eggs. Beat the yolks, add the sugar gradually. This requires about 15 minutes with electric mixer. Add vanilla flavoring. The yolk mixture should be light in color, thick and very smooth. Beat egg whites until they hold a precise peak. Sprinkle flour-nut mixture over beaten egg yolk, pile beaten egg whites over this and gently mix or fold all ingredients together, but only enough to disperse all patches of egg white. Pour batter into pan, leveling the top with a rubber spatula. Bake 50 minutes in 375 degrees F. oven or until cake tester comes out dry when tested in center of cake. Invert cake on wire rack. Cool about 1 to 2 hours. Nuts must be weighed. A cup measurement will not work.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amend- ing Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payment of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than forty-two million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year; providing for enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspec- tion; providing for the necessary elec- tion, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regu- lations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to, (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and con- tinuously for one (1) year immedi- ately preceding such application; (2) Needy blind persons who are

actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and con- tinuously for one (1) year immedi- ately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not contin- uously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government of the United States such assistance for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer in set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance assist- ed shall never exceed the amount so ex- pended out of Federal funds; and pro- vided further, that the total amount of such assistance out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year.

Should the Legislature enact enab- ling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

The Legislature shall enact appro- priate laws to make lists of the recipi- ents of aid hereunder available for inspection.

The foregoing Constitutional amend- ment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"For the Amendment to the Con- stitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; pro- vided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be not more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legis- lature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind per- sons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Fed- eral government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to resi- dence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of

payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twen- ty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assis- tance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated Section 51g; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agree- ments and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; pre- scribing the form of the ballot; pro- viding for the proclamation and pub- lication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section to the following Section 51g, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Fed- eral Government to obtain for prop- erty employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all bal- lots shall have printed thereon the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment to the Con- stitution of the State of Texas author- izing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for

proprietary employees of its political subdivisions.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out the said clauses on the ballot, leaving one expressing his vote on the Amendment. In counties or other divisions using voting machines, above provisions for voting against this Constitutional Amend- ment, each voter shall vote on such amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

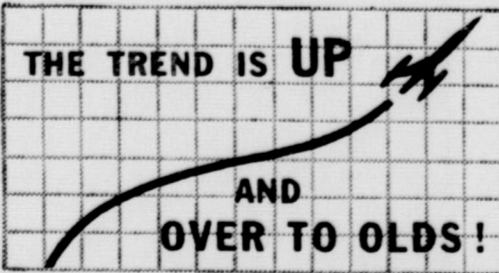

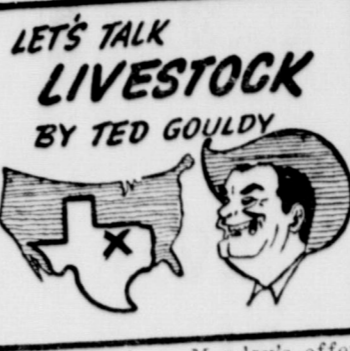

day runs of the past month, but prices were stronger in spite of the bigger numbers.

Giving impetus to the trade was the continued improvement of the stocker and feeder trade. Apparently stocker and feeder buyers are abandoning their earlier position that prices would be lower this season and are taking hold at present levels in much greater volume.

Lending strength to this theory was the improved movement of the plainer kinds of stockers at Fort Worth Monday. Many of the lighter weights of calves also were getting good action, and dealers here commented that many of the calves selling in the \$14 to \$16.50 bracket Monday were comparable to kinds a year ago that sold at \$10 to \$12.

Major packers were making their buying power felt as they were more aggressive buyers than usual for a Monday trade and this resulted in more active trade and fully steady to stronger prices on slaughter varieties of cattle and calves. The increased contention of the major packers forced the shipper and independent butcher trade to move faster in order to get their needs.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings at Fort Worth Monday drew \$18 to \$22. C. F. Mook & Son, Oklahoma, had four loads of 1,046-pound steers at \$22 and Clyde McClung, Johnson County, Texas, had two loads of steers at \$22 that averaged 1,022 and two loads of heifers at 774 pounds at \$22.

Fat cows sold from \$9 to \$12, a few heiferish kinds higher, a load of horned cows from Furd Halsell & Son, Tarrant County, averaged 1,216 pounds at \$11.50. Canners and cutters sold \$8 to \$9.50. Bulls drew \$8 to \$12.50, some individuals up to \$13.

Fat calves of good and choice kinds cashed at \$14.50 to \$16 and common and medium but sorts sold around \$11 to \$12 with culls from \$8 to \$10. Stocker steer calves cashed \$15 to \$19 when good and choice and the \$19 price represented some choice feeding calves.

Those from J. B. McCord of Crockett County, the 26 head average 485 pounds at \$19. Steer yearlings sold from \$11 down, and numerous loads of smaller lots of the plain to medium stocker kinds sold from \$14.50. Stocker cows drew \$12.
