News from the Congress by Congressman Frank Ikard Currently, the matter of government subsidies has been thrust into public attention by the arguments that have been going on in farm price support legislation. There has been a great deal of misunderstanding about what subsidy is. Some contend that tariffs are subsidies. The different forms that government support and aid take to various segments of our economy raises a question actually of what do we mean by subsidy. A House committee has been studying this as a result of the wide demand for figures comparing subsidies received by agriculture, industry, business, and labor. In a report recently issued, this committee found that in the fiscal years 1949-1953, inclusive, subsidies have totaled \$79,000,000 for agriculture, \$5,873,000,000 for business, and \$1,435,000,000 for labor. I think these findings might be surprising to some who are under the impression that the farmers are the only ones who have any sort of subsidy.

This office has just received some information from the experiment station at Woodward, Okla., which we think is of interest to the farmers of this part of the state. Last winter an experiment was started in which rolled guar beans were fed, as a protein supplement to steers being wintered on grass. In this experiment three groups of steers were maintained at all times and were rotated in the separate pastures so that grazing animals would be kept as equalized as possible. The first pasture of steers were fed 2 pounds of 41 per cent cotton seed pellets per day as a protein supplement. The second pasture of steers were fed 2 lbs. of 41 per cent soybean pellets per day as a protein supplement. The third pasture of steers were fed 3.5 pounds of rolled guar beans per day as a supplement. The guar beans analysis showed they contained 25 per cent protein. The experiment ran for 158 days from Nov., 1953, to April 20, 1954.

The officials of the experiment station state that the steers which were fed the guar beans made more gain and showed more bloom all through the winter than did either of the other groups of steers. They also state that the steers were a little reluctant to eat the guar beans at first but 1/3 of a pound per steer of 41 per cent cottonseed meal was sprinkled on the beans for the first two weeks, after that just the beans were fed and the steers ate them readily. The experiment is not finished as yet; it has two more years to run, and no definite results can be announced thus far, but
