SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof; creating the State Building Fund; providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund; providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature; providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon by the people of this State, and the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b, and reading as follows:

"Section 51-b. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may by law provide for some other State official to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate as such State official he shall be so confirmed as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner that other State officials are confirmed.

"(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, and each year thereafter, the Comptroller of Public Accounts shall certify to the State Treasurer the amount of money necessary to pay Confederate pensions for the ensuing calendar year as provided by the constitution and laws of this State. Thereupon each year the State Treasurer shall transfer from the Confederate Pension Fund to the State Building Fund all money except that needed to pay the Confederate pensions as certified by the Comptroller. This provision is self-enacting. The State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the uses and purposes set forth in subdivision (c) hereof.

"(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may be hereafter provided by law, the Commission may acquire necessary personal and personal property, salvage and dispose of property unsuitable for State purposes, modify, remodel, build and equip buildings for State purposes, and negotiate and make contracts necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes herein mentioned.

"The first major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be known and designated as a memorial to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be devoted to the use and occupancy of the Supreme Court building and other State agencies as may be provided by law. The second major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be a State office building and shall be used by whatever State agencies as may be provided by law.

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) percent of the moneys available to it in any one year, for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America. Said memorials may be upon battlefields or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1965.

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be permitted by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Republic in the Texas War for Independence. Said memorials may be erected upon battlefields, in cemeteries, or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State, and the authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1965.

"(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article VI (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purposes of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

"(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the

State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those amendments shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

"FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund as may be provided by law, and also permitting such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Those opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

"AGAINST the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment or amendments so required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an Amendment to Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for service on grand and petit juries shall be denied or withheld by reason of sex; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation thereon.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit juries; provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or withheld by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the term 'men' is used in reference to grand or petit juries, such term shall include persons of the female as well as the male sex."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines, such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment by marking out one of said clauses on the ballot and leaving the one expressing his vote, on the proposed Amendment, by placing an "X" in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote; this latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated Section 51g; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government for the purpose of obtaining for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government for the purpose of obtaining for or against the Constitutional Amendment. The Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government for the purpose of obtaining for or against the Constitutional Amendment. The Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government for the purpose of obtaining for or against the Constitutional Amendment. The Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines, such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

### News from the Congress

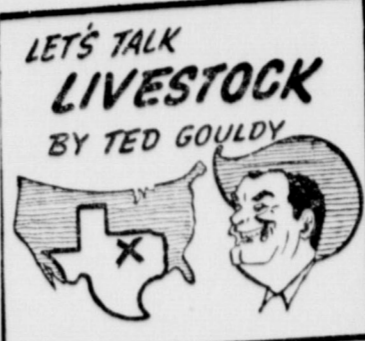
It now is almost a certainty that Congress will not adjourn before sometime around the middle of August. I expect to be home just as soon as possible after Congress does adjourn. Two of the subcommittees on which I serve will hold hearings between now and the first of the year which will be necessary for me to attend. One of these committees deals with military operations, and the other with alleged labor racketeering. Other than the time that is necessary to spend with these two committees, I expect to be in the district most of the time until the first of the year when the new Congress convenes. I expect to visit every community in the district during the recess.

I am deeply grateful to the people of the 13th District for allowing me the opportunity to serve them as their Congressman for another term and to make it possible for me to be nominated in the primary without an opponent. It is my hope that I may be able to fulfill the obligations and trust that have been placed with me in such a way as to continue to merit the trust and confidence of the people that I represent.

Syngman Rhee, the President of Korea, has been in Washington this week visiting President Eisenhower. Apparently the purpose of his mission here is to speed the rehabilitation of South Korea which currently is somewhat bogged down. It is President Rhee's hope that he may secure aid to industrialize and greatly develop his country. He has very great and sweeping plans for South Korea. While I am sure that Dr. Rhee has done a wonderful job for the Korean people that he represents, I cannot agree with some of the statements that he has made recently about the part that we should play in his relationship with the rest of the world.

This week the House acted on the tax bill, military housing bill, atomic energy bill, and mutual security, which leaves only two major pieces of legislation, the agriculture bill and Social Security, to be finally acted on before adjournment.

Fort Worth—As the season progresses it is becoming more and more evident that the ideas of Corn Belt feeders and the opinions of Southwestern cattle producers as to the prices of stockers and feeders this year are almost poles apart.

Theories of slaughter buyers as to what grass cattle and slaughter calves should bring and the opinions of the people who own the cattle and calves, are equally far apart.

The immediate result of these differences of opinion is smaller than seasonal numbers of cattle and calves moving to market during July and on the opening session for August. The long range results appear to be that the numbers of cattle and calves marketed late in the year and early next year will be larger than usual if the present trend in the Southwest continues.

Many areas in the Midwest and in the Central and South Atlantic States into which large numbers of Southwestern stockers and feeders go each year are currently in varying degrees of drought. This serves to dull their desire to buy stockers and feeders since the grain and forage crops are in jeopardy.

Currently there are 20 to 40 counties of Texas in more or less critical drought conditions, and many of the sections that a year ago were in hard shape are this year doing very well despite some suffering from high temperatures.

One old-timer sized it up this way: "Looks like the folks with cattle to sell think they will be higher, and those with cattle to buy look for them to be lower. That's what makes trade, these differences of opinion and the eventual arrival at prices."

Brings to mind a favorite expression of an old-time grain market speculator. He said: "The market is never wrong. Some times people trying to figure the market are wrong."

**Cattle Open Stronger**  
Cattle and calves sold in an active trade at fully steady to stronger prices at Fort Worth Monday. Numerous spots were 25 to 50 cents above last week's close. The salesmen were asking substantially higher prices on most kinds

and buyers were inclined to resist but apparently needed supplies badly enough to make concessions.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings drew \$18 to \$21.25 while common and medium diam grassers sold from \$10 to \$17. Stocker and feeder steers and steer yearlings sold mostly from \$12 to \$17, with some choice feeders to \$18.50.

Fat calves drew \$15 to \$18.50, when good and choice and some light yearling kinds sold to \$19 and better. Common and medium sorts sold from \$10 to \$14, and culls from \$8 to \$10.

Stocker steer calves of the better kinds sold from \$15 to \$19 and plain sorts sold from \$12 to \$14. Heifer calves ranged around \$2 under steers.

Fat cows drew \$9 to \$12, and canners and cutters cashed at \$6 to \$9.50. Bulls drew \$8 to \$12.50, a few to \$13.

In the gubernatorial race, Governor Allan Shivers and Judge Ralph Yarborough have reformed their lines and are in a showdown battle for the state's top job.

Shivers said that his supporters were too confident and had not turned out at the polls in the expected numbers. He encouraged them to exercise their right to vote in the coming election.

Yarborough said that he would have won the first primary except for Texas Republicans who neglected their own primary to vote against him.

**Three Factors Decide**  
Capable of determining the August election were 400,000 Texans, eligible to vote, who stayed away from the polls July 24.

A smaller factor was the 35,000 who cast their votes for Davis and Holmes.

Also to be considered were the Republicans who voted in their own party primaries in July, but who are free to cast their ballots in the Democratic second primary.

Most of these votes, it was generally conceded, would go for Shivers.

**Scott in Court Runoff**  
Austin Attorney Alfred Scott will be in the runoff with Judge Few Brewster, for Place 1 on the Supreme Court.

This race will gain more than a little attention.

**Fires Hit Area**  
Hardly had the embers of the political fires cooled when forest fires broke out both east and west of Austin.

Thousands of acres of woodlands, and three homes, now lie scorched, burned and bared as the result of fires around Volente (Dodd City) on Lake Travis west of Austin.

On the opposite side of the capital city, the eastern portion of Bastrop State Park lost 7,000 acres of pine and live oak as the result of an eight-day brush and timber fire . . . squelched finally by sudden showers.

**Drouth Aid Arrives**  
Just as the hot sun has made easily flammable the forest in the area, so has the temperature and lack of rain taken its toll of the ranchlands.

Governor Shivers and Agricultural Commissioner John White have combined their efforts to obtain drouth relief in the form

of a federal and state-backed hay program.

Ranchers in 23 Central and West Texas counties will be eligible.

Allocations for the aid, amounting to \$600,000, were provided largely by the federal government with a \$500,000 helping hand. The state will counter with the balance.

Titled "Operation Haylift," the program is the third since 1952 for state ranchers who now are weathering the worst drouth in their history. The program will be almost identical to the other two and will allow ranchers to benefit from reduced transportation charges on hay.

Nine other state counties also are being considered for recommendation to the U. S. Agriculture Department.

Counties now receiving aid are Bastrop, Bell, Bexar, Blanco, Bosque, Brown, Burnet, Comal, Comanche, Coryell, Erath, Hamilton, Hays, Kendall, Lampasas, Lee, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills, San Saba, Travis, and Williamson.

Governor Shivers, commenting on the program, said he felt it would ease the present situation, but that, "This drouth could get so bad we might have to call a special session to provide funds."

**Judge Re-rules**  
Operation of the Commercial Security Insurance Company of Houston, already once halted and continued, has been stopped again by District Judge J. Harris Gardner.

Gardner, who issued a previous order restraining the firm from business and a later one allowing it to continue, issued the latest ruling on grounds that the company had gone into business on borrowed capital, thus violating state law.

State action charging fraudulent organization against the \$250,000 fire and casualty firm was initiated July 15 by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd. He said he had asked the temporary restraining order at the request

J. D. Wheeler, liquidator for the insurance board, has been named by the court as receiver to supervise all affairs of the company, Ben B. High, company president, said shareholders would receive no loss if the receivership is handled properly.

**Business Perks Up**  
Good news to Texas businessmen that the state's recession-plagued business situation will soon perk up has been issued by the University of Texas Business Research Bureau.

An upswing in business should be noted after a few weeks of stabilization as the present recession has hit its bottom, the bureau reported.

A survey of 2,865 retailers over the state showed June sales equaling those for May but four per cent down from last June. For the first half of 1954, sales were seven per cent below 1953 showings.

Section 9. There shall be a Clerk for the District Court of each county who shall be elected by the qualified voters for State and county officers, and who shall hold his office for four years, subject to removal by information or by indictment of a grand jury, and conviction of a petit jury. In case of vacancy, the Judge of the District Court shall have the power to appoint a Clerk, who shall hold until the office can be filled by election.

Section 10. There shall be established in each county in this State a County Court, which shall be a court of record; and there shall be elected in each county by the qualified voters, in the manner provided in this Article, a District Attorney, the respective duties of District Attorneys and County Attorneys shall in such counties be regulated by the Legislature. The Legislature may provide for the election of District Attorneys in such districts, as may be deemed necessary, and make provision for the compensation of District Attorneys and County Attorneys. District Attorneys shall hold office for a term of four years, and until their successors are qualified.

Section 11. That Section 23 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 23. There shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county a Sheriff, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor is qualified; and he shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and he shall be elected in the manner provided in this Article, and he shall hold office for four years, and until his successor is qualified."

Section 12. That Section 14 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 14. Except as provided in Section 16 of this Article, there shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, who shall hold his office for four years and until his successor is qualified; and he shall be elected and qualified, and he shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes, as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Section 8. That Section 16 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 16. The Sheriff of each county, in addition to his other duties, shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes in that county, in counties having 10,000 or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected as provided in Section 14 of this Article, and he shall hold office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Section 44. The Legislature shall prescribe the duties and provide for the election by qualified voters of each county in this State, of a County Treasurer and a County Surveyor, who shall have an office at the county seat, and until their successors are qualified; and

## Home Demonstration Notes

MRS. MARY D. BROWN

Those of you who didn't go to camp with us missed a good time. It does us all good to get away from our homes and families occasionally. I do hope the pictures I took will be good and I'll bring them to the September club meetings so that you can all enjoy them.

Mrs. Tom Callaway, Mrs. W. O. Fish and Mrs. Walter Thomson will represent Foard County at the Texas Home Demonstration Association meeting in Dallas Aug. 11, 12 and 13. They will be our delegates, but I do wish some of you could go as visitors. You would enjoy it and you would have a better and wider understanding of club work. Sometimes we get so engrossed in our "cooking" and "sewing" that we forget that club work is much broader than that.

Our recipe this week is—  
**Lemon Barbecue Sauce**  
1 clove garlic, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup salad or olive oil, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 2 tablespoons grated onion, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.

Mash garlic with salt in bowl, stir in remaining ingredients. Chill 24 hours.

Oven Method for Barbecuing Chicken: Select young broiler-fryer chickens weighing about 1 1/2 pounds dressed. Cut in half, place skin up in roasting or broiling pan and pour sauce over them one-half to one inch deep. Bake uncovered in a slow oven (325 degrees) F. about 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Test leg joints for doneness. If they come apart easily, when twisted, the chicken is done. For rich crustiness, place cooked chickens skin side up, baste and turn up heat to 500 degrees F. or place under broiler heat for 2 or 3 minutes. Serve extra barbecue sauce over the chicken.

## YOUR SENATOR REPORTS

Lost Time: The schedule of the Senate was thrown off balance by the prolonged discussion of the Revised Atomic Energy Bill. As I write this, it is not clear just when adjournment of this session of Congress will come.

I wholeheartedly approve of the principle of full discussion of any proposed legislation. I have been disturbed by the fact that the extended debate on the Atomic Energy Bill, accompanied by day-and-night sessions of the Senate, delayed our taking up measures of great importance—such as farm legislation, social security, foreign aid, and others.

It is to be hoped that a final rush for adjournment will not result in these serious questions being given inadequate consideration.

Smaller Deficit: The Federal Government operated at a deficit during the 1954 fiscal year, which ended June 30, but the deficit was smaller than it has been during recent years. Expenditures outran receipts during the 12 months by \$3,029,000,000. The deficit for the preceding year amounted to \$9,900,000,000.

Actual expenditures were cut \$6,500,000,000 under the level of the 1953 fiscal year.

Tax cuts approved during the present session of Congress are estimated to total approximately \$7,500,000,000.

Defense Expenditures: Proper economy in the conduct of the Government is greatly to be desired, of course. But some observers feel that the Administration

has cut too deeply into expenditures for defense.

Outlays for national security programs mounted to \$46,200,000,000 last year. That was a reduction of two and a half billion dollars.

According to a statement from the White House, this cut reflects greater economies in operations, re-examination of military plans, reduced stock levels, less Atomic Energy Commission spending, and delay in the delivery of materials for stockpiling.

Only history can show whether the reduced military expenditures in this period of continuous world turmoil were of greatest importance that is of the greatest importance to the economic strength of the United States lies the only hope of maintaining freedom in the world.

We Must Be Ready: A horrifying example of the perils we face in these times was given by the action of the Chinese communists in firing on American aircraft engaged in searching for possible survivors of the Cathay Pacific Airliner shot down by the communists.

We seem continually poised on the brink of disaster.

When the first announcement came on the attack on our aircraft, I made a brief statement in the Senate, pointing out that this is a time above all times for Americans to unite.

"The Chinese communists are shooting at our men," I pointed out. "There can be no partisanship or divided loyalties on such an issue."

"We must await the facts to determine the next step. But meanwhile, we must also resolve to be cool, decisive and ready to act as Americans must always act in the face of danger."

I feel confident that those are the sentiments of the people of Texas.

Texas Drouth: Reports of drouth conditions in many Texas counties continue to be disturbing. We were able to get the President to declare 23 counties as a drouth disaster area, making them eligible

for some assistance in the matter of feed for cattle.

But the program at present authorized is inadequate to meet the serious situation that exists, and, according to the Texas' able Agriculture Commissioner, John C. White, is giving his best efforts to this whole matter. I certainly shall be of any assistance I can.

Personal: I would be ungrateful indeed if I did not say how deeply I appreciate the confidence Texans showed in me on July 24. I want all of you to know that your faith in me will make me work harder than ever to give you, the people of Texas, the kind of representation you deserve to have in the United States Senate.

Lady Bird and I thank you. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts.

## Nearly One Million Hunting and Fishing Licenses to Be Sold

Austin—The License Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission said slightly less than one million hunting and fishing licenses for the fiscal year beginning September 1 are expected to be distributed.

The first consignments will be forwarded to the state's approximately 1700 licensed deputies late this month so that they will be available for prompt issuance

on the local level.

Actual sale of fishing and hunting licenses combined usually more than seven hundred thousand, and, according to the License Clerk.

Resident hunting licenses, under a comparatively new law, sell for \$2.15. This certificate entitles the holder to hunt all kinds of game.

Resident fishing licenses sell for \$1.65 and cover all legitimate fishing routine. No license is required for sports fishing in water.

Exemptions for hunting of persons under 17 years of age and persons hunting small game on their home county or persons hunting big game on their property, or persons under 17 years of age hunting big game must obtain an exempt license for which there is no charge.

Exemptions for fresh fishing for sport cover persons under 17 years of age and sons fishing in their own county providing they do not use artificial bait or live bait.

One fairly new hunting license is a five-day nonresident permit to hunt migratory game which sells for \$5. The regular nonresident hunting license is \$25. There is a five-day nonresident fishing license for \$1.85 and a regular nonresident fishing license for \$5.25.
