

New Plant

A pyrrhotite treatment plant is being built in the Copper Cliff, Ontario, area by International Nickel. It will treat 1,000 tons per day of pyrrhotite concentrates in the first unit of an operation which will ultimately yield about 1,000,000 tons yearly of highgrade iron ore as a by-product of nickel recovery. Using a process developed by the company's research staff, the iron ore recovered will be higher in grade than any now produced in quantity in North America.
