## Emergency Wind Erosion Control Practices Announced by ASC Office

Farmers in Foard County are hereby advised by the Foard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee that the following practices may now be carried out under the wind erosion control program:

Seeding grain sorghums, sweet sorghums, sudan grass, millet, barley, oats, or rye to establish a cover for the control of wind erosion; Volunteer crops and crops planted prior to July 10, 1954.

will not qualify. Sorghums, millet or small grains of average purity and germination should be planted at the following seeding rates per acre:

Grain sorghums in rows, 5 to 6 pounds, drilled or broadcast 15 to 18 pounds.  
Sweet sorghum in rows, 5 to 6 pounds, drilled or broadcast 15 to 18 pounds.  
Sudan grass in rows, 5 to 6 pounds, drilled or broadcast 15 to 18 pounds.  
Millet drilled or broadcast 10 to 12 pounds.  
Barley, oats or rye drilled or broadcast 48 to 60 pounds.

The committee warns that a crop will not qualify if harvested for any purpose. The crop must be left on the land until the land is plowed in preparation for seeding a crop in the spring or summer of 1955.

The maximum Federal cost-share is \$1.00 per acre for sorghums in rows; and \$1.25 per acre for crops drilled or broadcast.

Farmers desiring to carry out this practice should contact the local ASC office as soon as possible.

Most high school teams of the State had their first game of the season last Friday night, but the Wildcats had an open date. This was brought about by

Lockett High School coming into District 9-A.

There have been 209 optional season reserve tickets sold thus far this year. This is 11 more than was sold last season. This is the last week they can be purchased. They are sold at L. A. Andrews' office in the court house and sell for \$1.00 each. Tickets for the Quannah game will go on sale next Monday morning. Reserve seat tickets for adults sell for \$1.00 and general admission tickets sell for 75c. Quannah has ordered 300 of the reserve tickets for its game here next week.

The Bullfighters looked pretty good last Friday night when they held the strong class AA Spur Bulldogs to a 16 to 7 score. Arvin Ellithorp, 175-pound fullback, scored all of Matador's scores. James Taylor, 185-pound tackle, is their outstanding lineman.

Note: This was written by Vera Kindt who spent last year in Japan with her father who is a lieutenant with the American forces in Japan.

HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Having just arrived from a 13 month stay in Japan, many have been asking me to tell about my experiences there. I'll do my best, but I can never recall all of that pleasant country.

We lived in an American house with American furniture and ate American food; however, we acquired quite a liking for "sukiyaki, chowhound, bean cake, and seaweed crackers." Octopus and raw fish were available for the more daring.

While there we attended an

American high school in Yokohama. There were ten different nationalities who went there, including Nisei, Hawaiian, Puerto Rican, British, French, Chinese, and Filipino. The high school kids spoke an international language composed of a few words from each one. This is very confusing until you have been there at least a month and catch on to what their chatter is all about. Once when talking to a new student, I said "chotto matte" (wait a minute). Since she didn't understand what I meant, she walked several minutes before I could recall the American words for it. A rather embarrassing situation when you come right down to it!

As for the Japanese people, we got along wonderfully well. They are very peace loving, and it is hard to believe that around ten years ago we were at war with them. They are very patient and easy to get along with. Most of them know quite a bit of English; therefore, it wasn't necessary for us to learn Japanese. They do not believe in showing their emotions, so it is very hard to tell when they are happy or when they are sad. If you admire something in their home, it is a likely guess that they will give it to you. If you give them a present, they will give you one of higher value.

The only American money we were allowed to use was pennies. We had to use yen (360 yen to \$1.00) when dealing with Japanese and M. P. C. (Military Payment Certificate) when shopping in the commissary, PX or other military establishments.

Tokyo looks a great deal like our larger cities except for the fact that nearly all the signs are written in Japanese or Chinese. However, the smaller towns do not compare. Most of their houses are made of wood (never painted because of religious beliefs) with straw roofs. They have sliding doors with tatami (rice straw mats) on the highly polished floors. Furniture usually consists of a round table in the middle of the room.

Most of the Japanese are Buddhist or Shinto. They worship many different idols and animals. Some worship Mount Fuji. Those who have been converted to Christianity are more willing to "give their all" for their faith than many of us Americans. This is a sad but true fact.

As for clothing, they have almost completely adopted American styles. At New Year's time, they all receive new kimonos and wear them for about a two week period. After that, they wear them only at festivals. Although they often wear American shoes, they still seem to prefer zoris and getas. They now wear their hair like their favorite movie star rather than in fancy styles of olden days.

All good things must come to an end, and our tour was over much too soon to suit us. It was a wonderful year, and one that I can never forget, full of experiences with never a dull moment.

Faculty, bear with us. This arrogant attitude of "the senior" will soon disappear. By the date of graduation, we will be wishing for some of the confidence we were blessed with at the first of the year.

We haven't made any particularly special plans for the coming year. Of course, we want this to be the biggest, best senior year ever!
