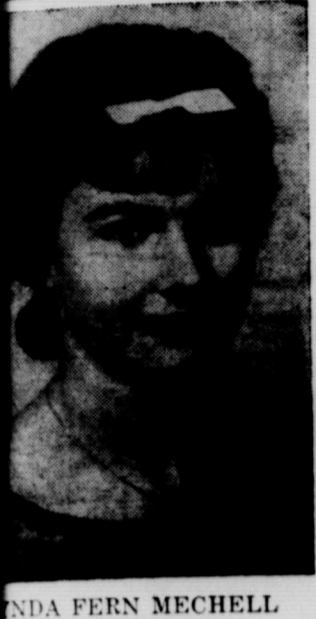

Lynda Mechell Winner of \$500 Scholarship

Lynda Fern Mechell, Foard County 4-H girl, has been selected winner of the \$500 Helen Swift scholarship given annually by the Home Demonstration Association.

In 1963 scholarship winners in the program are Sarah McCullough, Comanche County girl, recipient of the \$500 W. Barry Scholarship, and the Laws, Travis County 4-H girl, winner of the \$500 Bon-Bon award.

Lynda, 17, was a State Fair of Honor Award winner in 1961 and won a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago that year as a result of having the most outstanding state 4-H girl in the field of home economics. Lynda also earned a trip to the State Junior Leadership camp at Bastrop State Park last year.

Lynda was a scholarship winner in the Gold Star 4-H Club in her county in 1961, and following year won the first award on her record book District Achievement event, so has won numerous awards including home improvement, beautification of home grounds, and other result demonstrations.

Lynda is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Mechell and the daughter of Mrs. Tom Veal. A mid-term graduate of High School, she plans to go to college.

Lynda has given Lynda ample opportunity to excel in leadership and she is now a member of Junior Leaders 4-H Club. She has been a song leader for her club, a recreational delegate and report vice president of her club. She has participated in many community, school and district events. She has been president, reporter and for her Future Homemakers of America Chapter, and held the position of Junior Leader of the Club, has served on the newspaper and school yearbook staffs, and has been a member of the school band for five years.

County's 72nd Birthday Will Be on April 27th

When April 27 arrives, Crowell and Foard County will be observing their seventy-second birthday, for it was on that day in 1891 that the part of Hardeman County south of Pease River with strips of land secured from Knox and Cottle Counties, was officially organized.

The earliest settlers in this section were the maternal grandparents of C. H. Reynolds, who resides in Crowell. It was toward a wilderness in the remote year of 1878 that Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Snyder, their seven sons and two daughters, traced the roads stamped out by nature's engineers, the buffalo and deer, and led them to their destination at the confluence of Pease River and Mule Creek. There was no evidence of civilization except an R2 lineman dugout. Locations in those days were judged and selected by their proximity to water, wood and grass, hence the great prairie spaces were passed over by the earliest settlers.

In 1880, Mr. and Mrs. John Wesley, D. E. Lower and Fred Ditman arrived in this vast unsettled territory. They had started their exploring trip from Weatherford and pushing westward found the last trace of civilization at Seymour. Leaving Seymour, they came to what is now Wilbarger County, but there found no signs of civilization except cattle and they appeared to be without herder or owner. The pioneer set his course for a place by its natural landmarks, rivers, hills, and belts of timber, rather than non-existent counties, cities, railroads and highways. Westward this party continued until they reached the geographical center of what was already designated to be Hardeman County, but it had not yet become organized and self governing. The land on which they stopped is owned now by Milburn Carroll.

Here the first post office in Hardeman County was established and was named Pease City. Mr. Lower was the first postmaster, but soon resigned and the position was given to Mrs. Wesley, who was the assistant postmaster. Pease City served a radius which covered the area now included in Hardeman, Cottle, Motley, Foard, and parts of Childress and Knox Counties. The lonesome remains of Pease City can be seen in Mr. Carroll's pasture about 5 miles north of Crowell.

The next family to arrive was that of W. T. Dunn. The land on which Mr. Dunn settled in 1881 is still owned by members of the Dunn family. He was the first county treasurer of Hardeman County when it was organized in 1884. Mr. Wesley became the first county clerk.

Otis Gafford has filed for trustee-at-large on the county board, and all qualified voters will also cast ballots in this election.

The terms of Alton Abston and Jim Moore expire on the Thalia School Board, and Otto Bachman is the only candidate to file in this election. The other members of the Thalia board are Robert Hammonds, Merle Moore and Farris Gatewood.

Herbert Fish has filed for reelection representing Precinct No. 4 on the county board. Other members of this board are Mr. Gafford, W. A. Dunn, J. C. Wisdom and C. N. Barker.

201 Foard Farms Signed for Feed Grain Program

As of the closing date, March 22, 1963, farmers in Foard County had signed up 201 farms to participate in the 1963 feed grain program. Ray Hysinger, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Study Committee, reports. The "intention to participate" forms show 5,037 acres to be diverted from the production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. The diversion is from base acreages (1959-60 average plantings) of 10,430 acres.

For farms signed up, estimated total payments for diverting acreage amount to \$51,767.00, not including price-support payments to be made this fall.

The 1961 and 1962 feed grain programs have brought about a reversal of a 10-year buildup in feed grain surpluses. By October 1 of this year, estimated total feed grain stocks of 61 million tons will be down about 28 percent from the record 84.7 million tons on October 1, 1961. Continued participation around levels of the past two years should bring feed grain stocks near desirable reserve levels by October 1, 1964.

Crowell Firemen Extinguish Blaze in Vivian Community

On Friday evening of last week, the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department was called to put out a fire which had been set by lightning in a sorghum alnum field on the Evans Estate in the Vivian community. Because of the quick action of the fifteen firemen who responded with the tank truck and the Jeep carrier, the fire was extinguished in about 20 minutes. An area of approximately thirty acres was burned.

H. E. Thomsons Announce Plans to Enlarge Care Home

Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Thomson attended the Texas Nursing Home Association meeting last week in Austin. The keynote speaker was Crawford C. Martin, Secretary of State. He is known for his many years of outstanding service to the nursing homes of Texas and to the entire field of the aged.

A tremendous boom in nursing home construction is underway in Texas during the first two months this year. The State Health Department has reviewed 54 sets of plans covering new construction, and during 1962, a total of 333 plans were reviewed. Currently, there are 709 nursing and custodial care homes licensed, providing a total of 22,644 beds.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomson are planning on enlarging their care home to 34 beds. Their plans were passed on while they were in Austin. The blueprints are being made, and the Thomsons hope to be in the building process in the near future.

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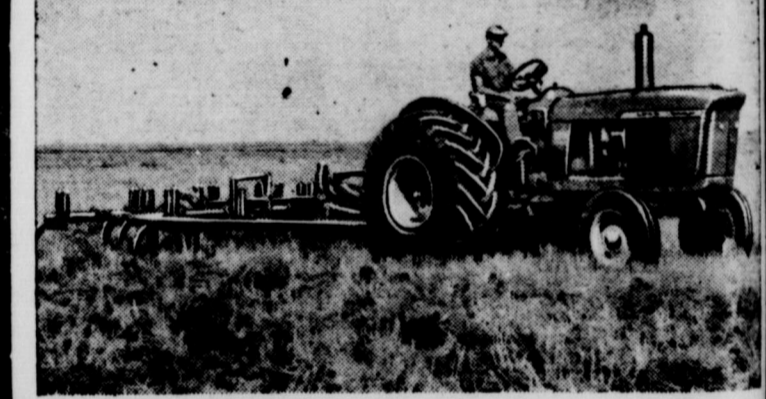

School Trustee Election Will Be Held Saturday

County's 72nd Birthday Will Be on April 27th

When April 27 arrives, Crowell and Foard County will be observing their seventy-second birthday, for it was on that day in 1891 that the part of Hardeman County south of Pease River with strips of land secured from Knox and Cottle Counties, was officially organized.

The earliest settlers in this section were the maternal grandparents of C. H. Reynolds, who resides in Crowell. It was toward a wilderness in the remote year of 1878 that Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Snyder, their seven sons and two daughters, traced the roads stamped out by nature's engineers, the buffalo and deer, and led them to their destination at the confluence of Pease River and Mule Creek. There was no evidence of civilization except an R2 line man dugout. Locations in those days were judged and selected by their proximity to water, wood and grass, hence the great prairie spaces were passed over by the earliest settlers.

In 1880, Mr. and Mrs. John Wesley, D. E. Lower and Fred Ditman arrived in this vast unsettled territory. They had started their exploring trip from Weatherford and pushing westward found the last trace of civilization at Seymour. Leaving Seymour, they came to what is now Wilbarger County, but there found no signs of civilization except cattle and they appeared to be without herder or owner. The pioneer set his course for a place by its natural landmarks, rivers, hills, and belts of timber, rather than non-existent counties, cities, railroads and highways. Westward this party continued until they reached the geographical center of what was already designated to be Hardeman County, but it had not yet become organized and self governing. The land on which they stopped is owned now by Milburn Carroll.

Here the first post office in Hardeman County was established and was named Pease City. Mr. Lower was the first postmaster, but soon resigned and the position was given to Mrs. Wesley, who was the assistant postmaster. Pease City served a radius which covered the area now included in Hardeman, Cottle, Motley, Foard, and parts of Childress and Knox Counties. The lone remains of Pease City can be seen in Mr. Carroll's pasture about 5 miles north of Crowell.

The next family to arrive was that of W. T. Dunn. The land on which Mr. Dunn settled in 1881 is still owned by members of the Dunn family. He was the first county treasurer of Hardeman County when it was organized in 1884. Mr. Wesley became the first county clerk.

After that time, settlers pushed through both dust and mud in increased numbers. By 1884, there were probably fifty people in Hardeman County, and from then, its history unfolds and discloses the riches of indigenous life.

Mayor and Three Aldermen Elected for City Tuesday

Henry Black was elected to a second term as Mayor of Crowell, Recie Womaek was re-elected as alderman and J. T. Hughton and Robert Kincaid were elected as new aldermen in the city election held Tuesday.

A small turn-out of only 53 voters cast ballots and each of the four candidates received the 53 votes.

201 Foard Farms Signed for Feed Grain Program

As of the closing date, March 22, 1963, farmers in Foard County had signed up 201 farms to participate in the 1963 feed grain program. Ray Hysinger, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, reports. The "intention to participate" forms show 5,037 acres to be diverted from the production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. The diversion is from base acreages (1959-60 average plantings) of 10,430 acres.

For farms signed up, estimated total payments for diverting acreage amount to \$51,767.00, not including price-support payments to be made this fall.

The 1961 and 1962 feed grain programs have brought about a reversal of a 10-year buildup in feed grain surpluses. By October 1 of this year, estimated total feed grain stocks of 61 million tons will be down about 28 percent from the record 84.7 million tons on October 1, 1961. Continued participation around levels of the past two years should bring feed grain stocks near desirable reserve levels by October 1, 1964.

Crowell Firemen Extinguish Blaze in Vivian Community

On Friday evening of last week, the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department was called to put out a fire which had been set by lighting in a sorghum alum field on the Evans Estate in the Vivian community. Because of the quick action of the fifteen firemen who responded with the tank truck and the Jeep carrier, the fire was extinguished in about 20 minutes. An area of approximately thirty acres was burned.

Interment will be in the Quanah Cemetery.

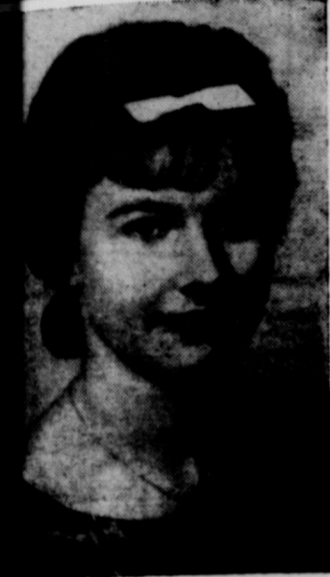

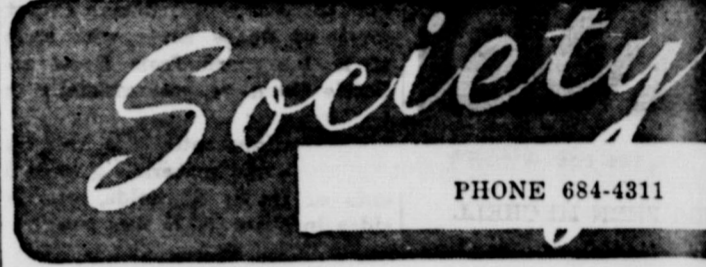

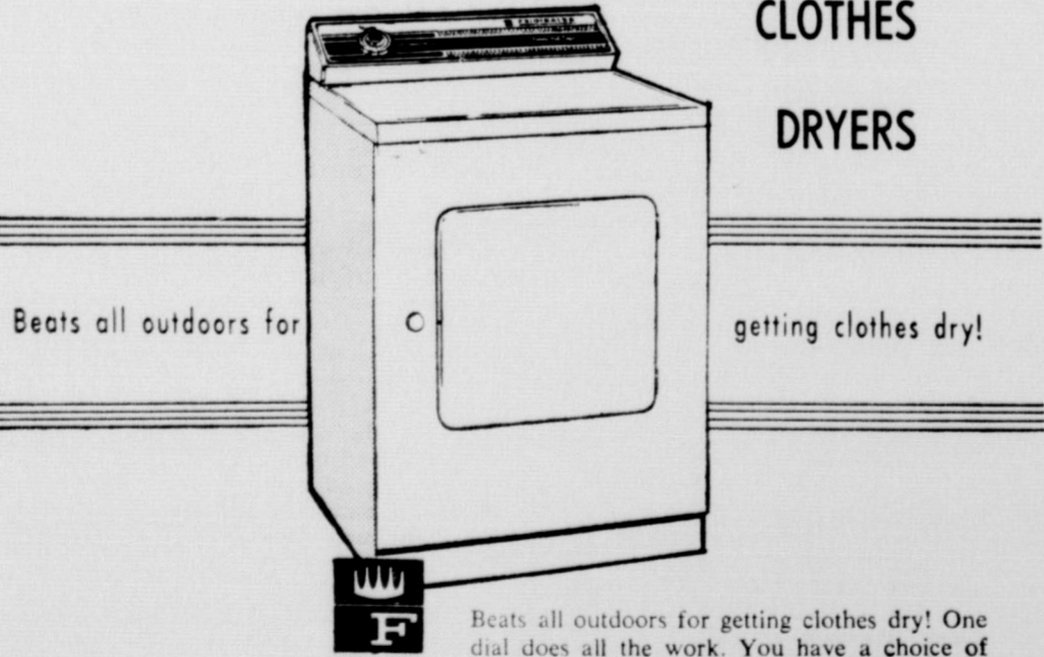

the accumulation of surpluses inevitable unless it is done.

Obviously, we cannot continue to operate an obsolete government program while the grain surplus mounts higher and higher, ruining markets, depressing prices, and plunging the farmers ever deeper into economic trouble.

A second important change provided by the 1964 program deals with the two-price certificate plan. Under this plan, a farmer will receive a higher cash return on that part of his production used domestically and exported, and a lesser amount of that which is used for feed and seed.

This change is important so that the American farmer can retain his high standard of living income at home and still compete on foreign markets. If he couldn't sell his grain abroad, his surpluses, obviously would destroy him domestically.

Thirdly, the 1964 program will provide that acreage diverted from production of wheat will be devoted to conservation practices and not to crops already in surplus supply.

There are other changes planned in the new program, but these, basically, are the important ones.

Crucial Wheat Referendum to Be Voted on in May

Editor's Note: This is first in a series of seven articles written by Jean L. Reeder, county ASC office manager, designed to help farmers decide how to vote in the crucial wheat referendum this spring.

In May of this year Foard County farmers will vote for or against the government's proposed 1964 wheat program.

It won't be an easy decision. Mountainous grain surpluses have continued to pile up under the old program, taking cash out of the pockets of farmers and taxpayers alike. This old surplus bugaboo made it necessary for the secretary to institute a few major changes in the program devised for 1964.

These articles are prepared to acquaint farmers with these changes—the pros and the cons—so that they may intelligently make up their own minds whether or not they want it.

First, the old program had its strong points. But it also had its weaknesses, among which was its inability to curb the ever-mounting surpluses.

The 1964 program, proposed only after exhaustive work by Secretary Freeman, his staff and other experts in the field and approved by Congress last October, seeks to eliminate the weaknesses while retaining those points which have proved themselves over the years.

One of the major weaknesses of the program now in effect is the set national minimum acreage allotment of 55 million acres. When this figure was arrived at back in 1938, the average national per acre yield was 12.4 bushels. The total production was approximately 700 million bushels.

Gradually, however, farmers, using new and advanced farming methods, have been able to increase their per-acre yields.

The result is that today the old 55 million acres produce an average of 25 bushels per acre, or a crop of some 1.4 billion bushels, or twice the production that resulted 25 years ago.

To modernize and make more realistic this outmoded national allotment is the major change envisioned for the 1964 program. Secretary Freeman and Congress want to readjust the ratio of acreage and yield in a sensible way to prevent insofar as possible

Only Two Weeks Left for Getting Inspection Sticker

The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety Monday reminded the 1,300,000 motor vehicle owners who haven't secured their 1963 inspection stickers that they only have two weeks to do so.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. said that as the April 15 deadline for inspections approaches, waiting lines will begin forming at the 5,000 official inspection stations.

"Under the law there can be no extension of the deadline, and motorists who fail to display the new sticker on and after April 16 are subject to arrest," he said.

Authority for the enforcement of the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in law enforcement officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety, any sheriff or deputy sheriff and any city policeman.

Garrison pointed out that in the two remaining weeks of the inspection period, there is sufficient time for the remaining vehicles to be inspected without inconvenience provided the owners act promptly.

"We are very well pleased," he said, "with the contribution that the vehicle inspection program has made toward reducing accidents on our streets and highways. We hope that through the continued cooperation of the people of Texas, these accidents can be further reduced."

Two Minutes With the Bible

"The Visiting Preacher"

Paul and Barnabas had seated themselves in the large synagogue in Pisidian Antioch. They were soon recognized as "clergymen," however, for "after reading of the lay and the prophets" they were asked whether either of them might have some word of "exhortation" for those who had gathered.

These details are important, for as Moses, in giving the Law, had declared God's moral standards, the prophets had for centuries challenged the people to obey the law and had warned them of the dire consequences of breaking its commands. Hence, in the synagogues passages were generally read from the law and the prophets and the religious leaders would then "exhort" the people to heed the prophets and obey the law.

Paul and Barnabas, the visiting preachers, therefore, were asked whether either of them had a "word of exhortation for the people." Paul responded to the invitation, but rather than merely exhorting his hearers to keep the law he proclaimed Christ who in love had died for all law breakers, closing with these words:

"Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this Man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins; and by Him all that believe are justified from all things from which ye could not be justified by the Law of Moses" (Acts. 13: 38,39).

How we need this message today! We may forever exhort one another to keep the law, but who of us has not already broken it? Let us thank God, then, that He is a loving Savior as well as a just Judge and that as God the Son He paid for our sins Himself at Calvary so that we might be "justified freely by His grace."

"Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us" (Gal. 3:13). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ

214 Cattle Theft Cases Developed by Association

Field Inspector Boots O'Neal of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association reports that the association, in cooperation with other law enforcement officers, developed 214 cattle theft cases during the fiscal year ending Feb. 28, 1963. These resulted in 283 years in the penitentiary plus one life sentence being assessed. Of these, probated sentences account for 97 years, and suspended sentences 28 years. Thirteen cases were dismissed and there are 150 cattle theft cases pending.

Field inspectors investigated the ownership of 1,535 cattle which appeared to be in improper

hands. Of this number, 1,508 head, or the proceeds of the same, were turned over to the rightful owners. The ownership of 27 head is still pending. The value of the cattle computed at the average price of those which passed through the markets amounts to \$145,779.45.

April Plentiful Suggest Eating "High on the Hog"

April will be a good time to eat "high on the hog," both literally and figuratively.

Texas consumers also may well choose the better cuts of beef, because both pork and beef are on the nine-item April list of plentiful foods, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The list features pork and carrots, as April supplies of each promise to run far above usual trade needs.

Beef rates a spot on the list for the first time in 1 1/2 years.

Prices on both pork and beef are noticeably lower than last winter. Also plentiful are milk, eggs, potatoes, peanuts and all peanut products, including peanut butter, canned freestone peaches and canned ripe olives.

The monthly list is prepared by the Agricultural Marketing Service, a part of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with producers, processors and the food trade. When supplies of any food exceed expected demand, it is eligible for official listing as a plentiful.

Distributors and retail grocers cooperate in the Plentiful Foods Program by providing special promotions, including lower prices on many items.

Extension home economists suggest that consumers will find it to their advantage to serve plentiful foods, as foods in abundance usually provide economy, ready availability and wide choice in quality.

Agent to Attend Referendum Study

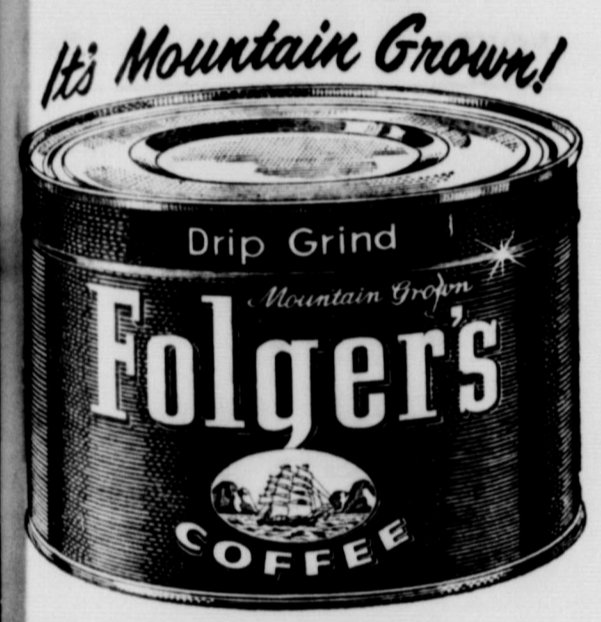
