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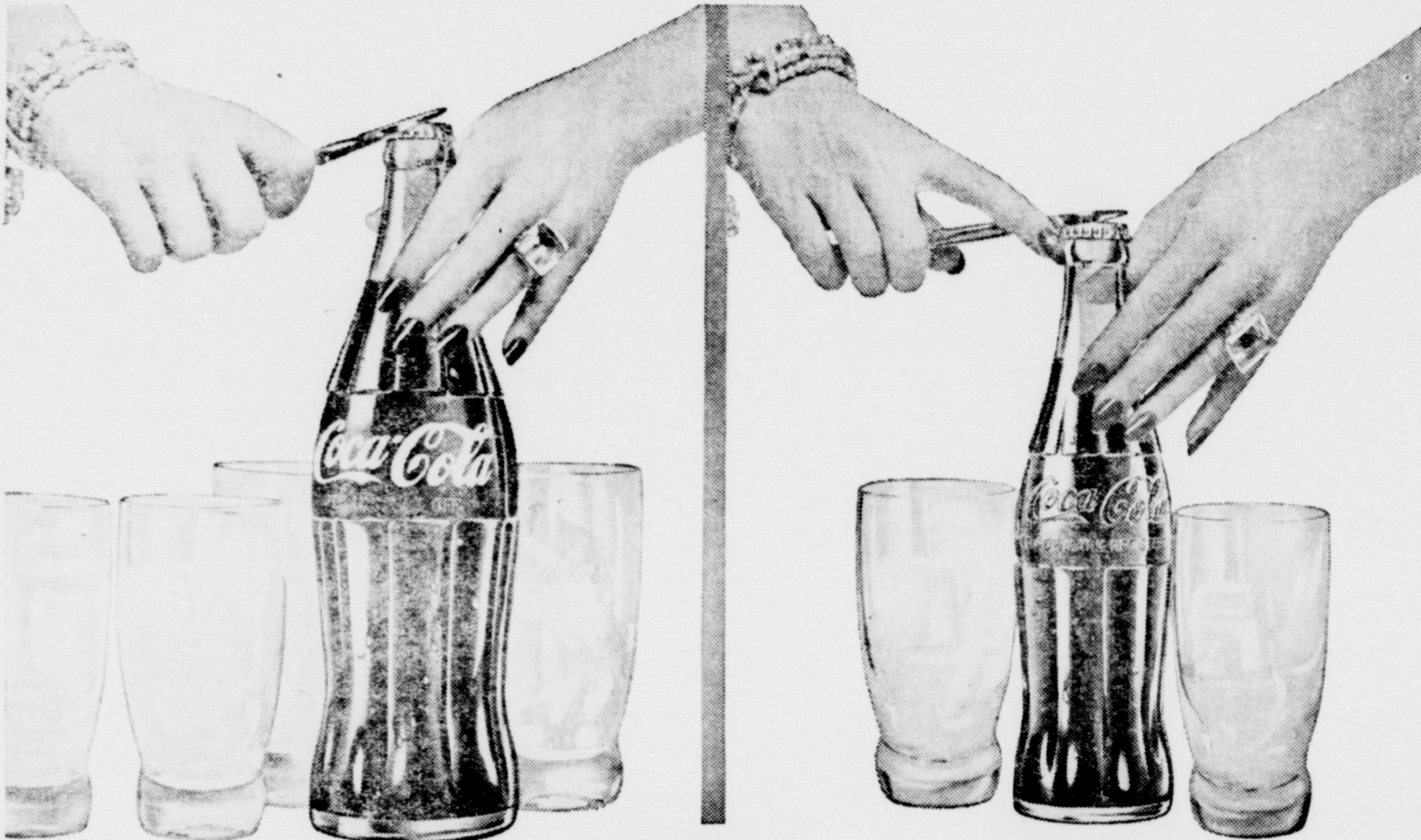

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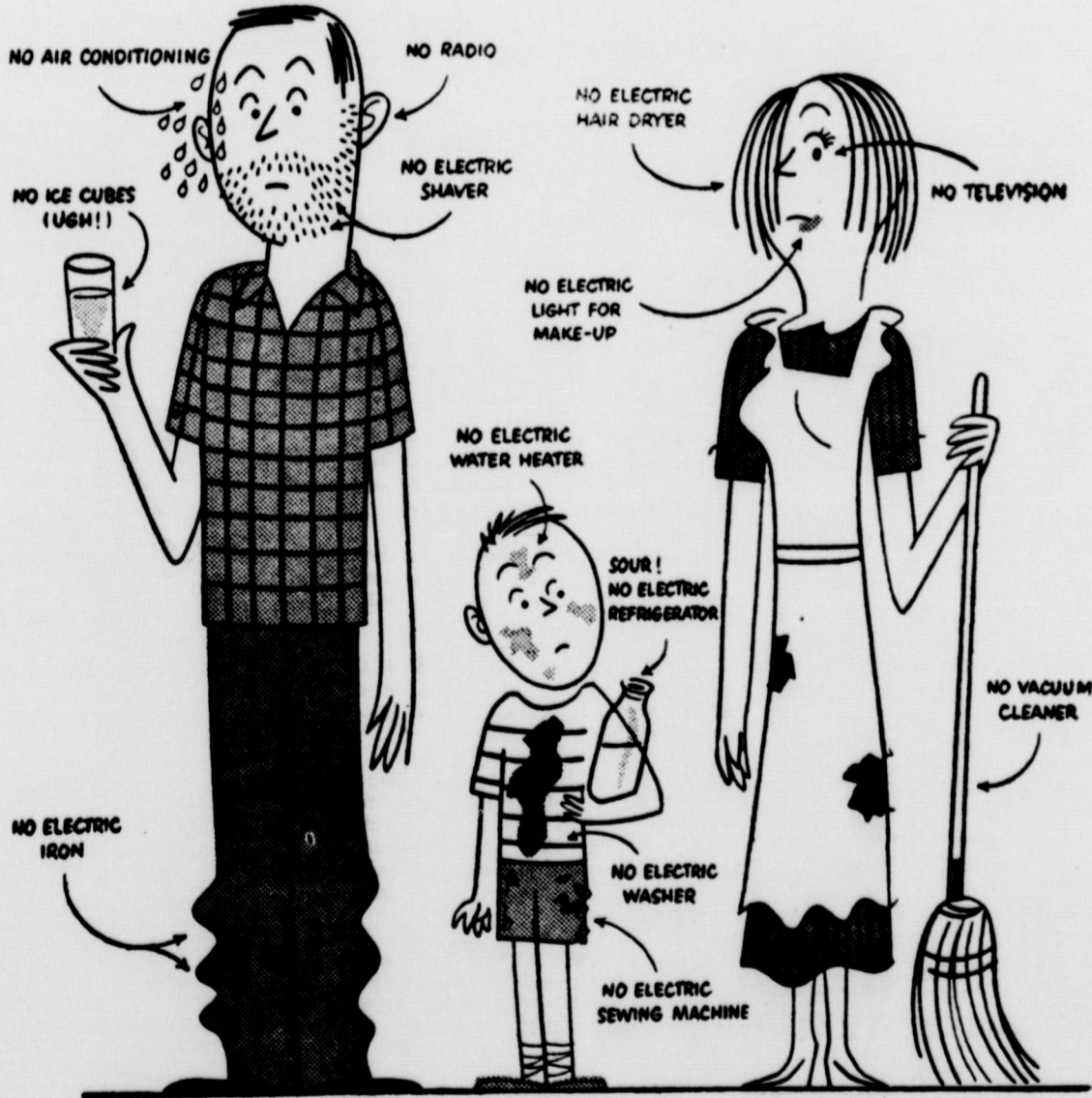


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TELEVISION NEWS

The other day someone asked the writer what was the most common fault in the layman "tuning" his TV set. I answered that I believed most people are just pretty good at tuning 'em in, but that there was one prevalent inclination of almost everyone: keeping the brightness control turned up too high. I noticed it first when "color filters" were so popular in this area. Using the color filter made it necessary to turn the brightness control up higher, and—pretty soon—some of those sets had to have new picture tubes. It definitely shortens the life of your picture tube when the brightness control is run too high. It also "washes out" your pictures and makes you lose some of the "ink" and contrast you are actually entitled to. The proper place for the brightness control is the lowest spot at which everything can be seen. Next time you fire up your TV, back up the brightness control until it's too dark... then turn it 'til it's just barely light enough. There's the spot to leave it. Running your set with it higher than that will wash out your picture... and it'll shorten the life of your picture tube!

Home Demonstration Notes

MRS. MARY D. BROWN

Soon it will be time to clean and store blankets. A new "soak method" for blanket washing developed by laundry research at Ohio State University gives excellent cleansing results and helps prevent shrinkage.

Agitation is often responsible for blanket shrinkage, according to research workers. The soak method involves no agitation.

Here are the instructions for the soak method:
Shake out all loose dirt and remove unusually soiled spots by rubbing with a soft brush and solution of one-half teaspoon of controlled sudsing detergent in 1 cup of warm water.

The next step depends on the kind of washing machine you use. In a top-loading washer, fill the machine with lukewarm water and add 1 cup of controlled sudsing detergent. Let the washer run until the detergent dissolves. Turn off the washer and put the blanket in for a 15 minute soak. Turn the blanket over a few times by hand.

After the soak, turn the washer to "spin" until water has drained out. It is not necessary to spin the blanket for a long time. Fill the washer with warm rinse water, soak the blanket in the rinse 4 to 5 minutes and then spin. Use a second spin the same way.

If you use a front loading washer, fill it with water to the bottom of the door level before dissolving 1-2 cup controlled sudsing detergent in the water. Add the blanket and continue filling the machine to full level. The soiled water is then spinned off. Now refill the machine for rinse and advance the dial to "drain." The final spin can be shortened to one or two minutes.

Electric blankets can be laundered in the same way if the label says they are washable. Follow the manufacturer's instructions to remove the control from the blanket. To protect the plug, the edges of the blanket are turned over the plug and secured with a few stitches.

Our recipe this week is:

Salmon Bechamel
1 pound can salmon, 3 tablespoons butter or other fat, 1/4 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, dash nutmeg, 2 cups liquid (liquid from canned salmon plus milk to make volume), 2 hard cooked eggs, chopped, 3 cups cooked rice.

Drain the flake salmon, saving liquid. Melt butter and blend in flour and seasonings. Add liquid gradually, and cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Add salmon and eggs; heat. Serve over rice or in a rice ring. Serves 6.

Home Demonstration Notes

Soon it will be time to clean and store blankets. A new "soak method" for blanket washing developed by laundry research at Ohio State University gives excellent cleansing results and helps prevent shrinkage.

Agitation is often responsible for blanket shrinkage, according to research workers. The soak method involves no agitation.

Here are the instructions for the soak method:
Shake out all loose dirt and remove unusually soiled spots by rubbing with a soft brush and solution of one-half teaspoon of controlled sudsing detergent in 1 cup of warm water.

The next step depends on the kind of washing machine you use. In a top-loading washer, fill the machine with lukewarm water and add 1 cup of controlled sudsing detergent. Let the washer run until the detergent dissolves. Turn off the washer and put the blanket in for a 15 minute soak. Turn the blanket over a few times by hand.

After the soak, turn the washer to "spin" until water has drained out. It is not necessary to spin the blanket for a long time. Fill the washer with warm rinse water, soak the blanket in the rinse 4 to 5 minutes and then spin. Use a second spin the same way.

If you use a front loading washer, fill it with water to the bottom of the door level before dissolving 1-2 cup controlled sudsing detergent in the water. Add the blanket and continue filling the machine to full level. The soiled water is then spinned off. Now refill the machine for rinse and advance the dial to "drain." The final spin can be shortened to one or two minutes.

Electric blankets can be laundered in the same way if the label says they are washable. Follow the manufacturer's instructions to remove the control from the blanket. To protect the plug, the edges of the blanket are turned over the plug and secured with a few stitches.

Our recipe this week is:

Salmon Bechamel
1 pound can salmon, 3 tablespoons butter or other fat, 1/4 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, dash nutmeg, 2 cups liquid (liquid from canned salmon plus milk to make volume), 2 hard cooked eggs, chopped, 3 cups cooked rice.

Drain the flake salmon, saving liquid. Melt butter and blend in flour and seasonings. Add liquid gradually, and cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Add salmon and eggs; heat. Serve over rice or in a rice ring. Serves 6.
