City Offices and Fire Department Moved to New City Hall

MERL KINCAID SPEAKS TO BOOKKEEPING CLASS

Merl Kincaid made his annual visit to the bookkeeping class Tuesday of last week. The subject of his talk was "The History of Banking." He told how the Phoenicians and Greeks developed banking along the Tigris and Euphrates rivers in order to have a systematic way of trading, bringing an outline of banking up to modern times.

Mr. Kincaid also stated that new equipment had been added to our local bank. The senior who works in the bank this year will have a much easier job because of this new piece of equipment which records checks in less than one-fourth of the time that was previously taken.

After the talk new ball point pens that are to be used as Christmas gifts from the Crowell State Bank were given to each student. The bookkeeping class wishes to express its appreciation for the time and effort spent by Mr. Kincaid to explain some of the methods of banking that may later be beneficial to us.
