 The wind tunnel test model of a transport built to 1/20th scale required nearly nine months and 2,000 parts—but it duplicated accurately structural details, torsional rigidity and weight of the full-size aircraft. One problem encountered at the test was the fractional thickness of skin that would be required if aluminum were used. By using magnesium, skin thickness was increased one-third. But even with magnesium some of the skin is only .005 inches thick (or thin). It was necessary to use the new chemical milling process to reduce commercial magnesium to the required thickness. Tiny stringers, spars, bulkheads and formers had to be placed in the wing to duplicate the wing sections of its larger counterpart. White gloves were worn by the

model builders and tweezers were used to put the parts in place since perspiration and skin oils would damage the small parts. A remotely controlled vibration exciter was mounted inside the fuselage to induce vibration during wind tunnel "flights." The tunnel flutter tests will eliminate many hours of in-flight testing of the actual aircraft. Texas had 11 different capitals before settling on Austin in 1840.

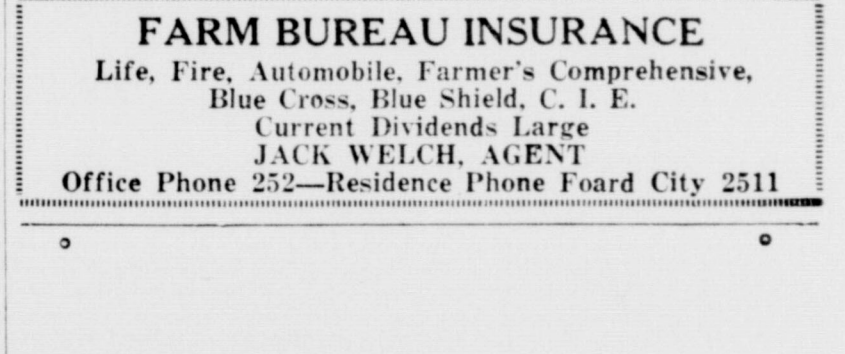

Traffic Laws Are on Your Side--You Should Know and Obey Them
 "Traffic laws are on your side—you should know and obey them!" J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, made this statement this week as he urged the public to support the traffic laws program currently being conducted by TSA and the National Safety Council as a part of the nationwide Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents campaign.
 "You can't afford to be careless or thoughtless in traffic," Musick said. "Your life depends on your behind-the-wheel behavior."
 The safety expert urged the citizens of Texas to obey traffic laws to the letter. He said that some drivers knowingly play dangerous angles and short cuts—they jump red lights at intersections, never really stop at stop signs and overdrive the speed limit. He said that these drivers too often end up paying a high price for their lawlessness—a serious injury and sometimes death.
 "If every driver would realize that the traffic laws are on his side, he wouldn't think of disregarding them," Musick said. "When you drive faster than the speed limit, make wrong turns, go through red lights or stop signs or pass improperly, you run these risks—towing costs, medical bills, lost wages, damage suits, lawyers' fees and loss of your driver's license."
 "Add to these the suffering and anguish even a minor traffic accident causes and you have a real case for safe driving."
 He emphasized that every Texan should make it his personal project to get behind traffic officials and help make 1958 the decisive year for traffic safety.

Fishing, for the sport of it, is fine. However, in addition to the fun of fishing, most of us like to bring home a good string of edible fish.

If you really want fish to eat, right now is the time to take an off-shore excursion and bring back a tub full of red snapper. It is the real pan fish of the Gulf of Mexico.

However, fishing for red snapper is more work than sport. The first half dozen give you a thrill. Thereafter it becomes a chore, especially if you are on a good boat over a hot spot. It is nothing unusual to catch a hundred pounds or more of red snapper, if your strength holds out that long.

Red snapper fishing is one of the favorites of the party boat. These boats operate out of most of the coastal cities of Texas. They take excursions out to the snapper banks in the Gulf. Most of the banks are at least 35 miles out. Some are more than one hundred miles into the Gulf.

Actually there is but one secret in getting all the snapper fishing you want, and that is getting with a good party boat operator. If he has good equipment, which is more than just having a good boat, you are pretty sure to get all the fish you want, providing the weather is right. And a good operator won't take you out unless the weather is right.

A good party boat has to be one large enough to withstand about the roughest water that can be thrown at you in the Gulf of Mexico. Generally one of these boats won't get caught in bad weather, but sometimes they do.

Most important of all, the boat must have a good captain. He must know the Gulf and how to read the electronic instruments that tell when he is sitting over a reef.

Red snapper inhabit coral reefs on the bottom of the Gulf. These reefs have been built up through millions of years, and afford a fine breeding and hiding place for snapper, as well as groupers and some of the other large fish of the briny deep.

There are a few of these reefs at around 10 to 12 fathoms. (A fathom is approximately six feet.) Most of them are at 25 or 30 fathoms, some at from 30 to 50 fathoms.

You fish for red snapper with heavy equipment, such as a large Ocean City reel on a heavy rod with about 300 yards of good line
