A COFFEE-DRINKER discussing the weather this week said he didn't mind summer coming, "but I didn't expect it to come all in one day."

But that is what seems to have happened, after the long stretch of cool, rainy late-spring days we have been having. Most of the weather discussion this week has been on the heat, but it seems to us the humidity has been the real trouble-maker

On the average summer day in Baird, evaporative cooling is plenty adequate. But this week it has just made the moisturecontent in the air worse.

If it weren't for the weather, though, what would West Texans have to complain about?

A STORY IN TODAY'S Star reminds us that it is almost reunion time for the Callahan County Pioneers Assn.

Our only complaint about this annual event is that Baird does not have facilities ample for hosting such a program, so that the reunion could at least occasionally be held in varied parts of the county.

When we first came to this part of the world, we were quite surprised at the number of people who show up for the Callahan meeting each year. Until we got first-hand knowledge, we had always figured such a meeting might attract 150 or 200 people -- and we were amazed the first time we saw about 3,-000 on hand.

Until last Wednesday afternoon, it appeared that the dispute was finally going to be settled. It should have been settled months ago, without ever having come to court.

As we understand it, a compromise was originally worked out which was acceptable to oth Callahan and Taylor counties -- but that Coleman County officials refused to go along and instead filed suit.

Apparently the same impasse a new one. still holds true, with Callahan and Taylor ready to comproapparently willing to compromise -- but only if all its claims are accepted by the other two, which would not be a compromise at all.

The whole situation reminds About Nothing.

Surely the most sensible solution would be for Coleman County to yield to the wishes of Callahan and Taylor counties and accept a compromise agree-






