

## **NO VACATION FROM VOTING**

"Summer soldiers" and "sunshine patriots" threaten to dictate the election results June 4 by their conspicious absence from the polls.

A poor voter turnout could mean that a very small minority of Texas citizens choose the candidates who will be governing all the citizens.

The June primary falls in vacation season and lots of voters may take a vacation from their duty as citizens as well as from their work.

Several factors have prompted the prediction that the voter turnout could be the smallest in Texas history, with possibly as few as five percent of Texas citizens going to the polls.

First of all, it is a non-Presidential election year, and this always decreases voter interest. Second, there is not a contest for the Governor's race, and this has traditionally diminished interest in the second primary.

However, going to the polls merely for the sake of voting is not enough. Each voter should thoughtfully consider the candidates and the issues and cast an informed vote.

With one major state race, that of Attorney General, at stake and the election of a Representative for the 63rd District, Callahan County residents cannot afford to take a vacation from voting without paying a price in loss of freedom for which no installment plan can be devised.

For want of votes from county citizens who don't care enough to go to the polls June 4, a very small minority could elect two of its most important office holders.

Voters in Baird who care but may require transportation to the polls are urged to call UL 4-1256. It is important to get as many Callahan County voters to exercise their right to vote as is possible.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

CABLE TELEVISION TRANSMISSION ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Granting a Permit to Callahan TV Cable Service, Inc., Its Successors and Assigns, for the Sole Purspose of Receiving, Amplifying and Distributing Television Signals and Television to the Inhabitants of the City of Baird, Callahan County, Texas, and providing for Three Readings.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS: Section 1:

That from and after the pas-sage hereof, there is hereby granted to Callahan TV Cable Service, Inc., it successors and assigns, hereinafter called the GRANTEE, the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate, for the life of this franchise, in the streets, roads, alleys and public places of the City of Baird, a Television Distribution system, consisting of poles and cables, and a tower or towers, space permitting, otherwise they to be placed on private property, in accordance with normal property arrangements, all of which, with all necessary, or desirable appurtenances, including underground conduit, the under-ground conduit to be subject to an Ordinance dated April 28, 1955, recorded in Volume "F", page 262 of the Ordinance Records of the City of Baird, and no underground conduit shall be made until said Ordinance has been fully complied with, all of which is for the sole purpose of supplying television signals to the said City of Baird. Said

distribution system shall, in no way, be used for any purpose other than supplying television signals to the City of Baird. Section 2:

That said Grantee, its agents and employees may enter it and upon said streets, alleys and public places at any time for the purpose of making excavations, installing, removing repairing and maintaining such poles, wires, cables and all structures necessary or convenient in supplying such television signal service. Any and all excavations shall be repaired and obstructions removed as quickly as it is reasonably possible under the circumstances. and the Ordinance referred to in Section 1 hereof shall, at all times, be adhered to. Section 3:

For and in consideration of the rights, privileges and franchise herein granted, the Grantee, its successors and assigns shall pay to the City of Baird, during the term of this franchise a sum of two and one-half per cent (21/2%) of the Grantee's gross receipts derived from monthly service charges, to customers within the corporate limits of the City of Baird, Texas. Payment of said sum, in accordance with the foregoing. shall be made on annual fiscal year basis. The above payments shall be in lieu of any other tax, or other imposition, assessment or charge, except ad va-Section 4:

This franchise shall be in force and effect for a period of fifteen (15) years from acceptance hereof, unless Grantee fails to commence service to customers hereunder within a one-year period from date of final reading of this ordinance, in which event this franchise is null and void.

Section 5: That the Grantee shall, within thirty days from the passage and approval of this Ordinance, file with the City Secretary of the City of Baird a written acceptance of this Ordinance, and at the same time, pay to the said City Secretary, a sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of publication of this Or-

Section 6: Grantee shall set its rates to its customers in the City of Baird, but the rates shall be subject to the approval of the City Council. The initial rates for installation and service by Grantee are as set out in the schedule attached to this Ordinance and are hereby approved by the Commission. Any proposed change to increase such rates shall be submitted by Grantee in writing to the City Secretary not less than fortyfive (45) days prior to the effective date of the proposed increase, after which period such change shall be effective unless the City Commission shall disapprove the proposed change prior to its effective date.
