PUBLIC NOTICE

CABLE TELEVISION TRANSMISSION ORDINANCE
An Ordinance Granting a Permit to Callahan TV Cable Service, Inc., Its Successors and Assigns, for the Sole Purpose of Receiving, Amplifying and Distributing Television Signals and Television to the Inhabitants of the City of Baird, Callahan County, Texas, and providing for Three Readings.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS:

Section 1:
That from and after the passage hereof, there is hereby granted to Callahan TV Cable Service, Inc., its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the GRANTEE, the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate, for the life of this franchise, in the streets, roads, alleys and public places of the City of Baird, a Television Distribution system, consisting of poles and cables, and a tower or towers, space permitting, otherwise they to be placed on private property, in accordance with normal property arrangements, all of which, with all necessary, or desirable appurtenances, including underground conduit, the underground conduit to be subject to an Ordinance dated April 28, 1955, recorded in Volume "F", page 262 of the Ordinance Records of the City of Baird, and no underground conduit shall be made until said Ordinance has been fully complied with, all of which is for the sole purpose of supplying television signals to the said City of Baird. Said

distribution system shall, in no way, be used for any purpose other than supplying television signals to the City of Baird.

Section 2:
That said Grantee, its agents and employees may enter it and upon said streets, alleys and public places at any time for the purpose of making excavations, installing, removing repairing and maintaining such poles, wires, cables and all structures necessary or convenient in supplying such television signal service. Any and all excavations shall be repaired and obstructions removed as quickly as it is reasonably possible under the circumstances, and the Ordinance referred to in Section 1 hereof shall, at all times, be adhered to.

Section 3:
For and in consideration of the rights, privileges and franchise herein granted, the Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall pay to the City of Baird, during the term of this franchise a sum of two and one-half per cent (2½%) of the Grantee's gross receipts derived from monthly service charges, to customers within the corporate limits of the City of Baird, Texas. Payment of said sum, in accordance with the foregoing, shall be made on annual fiscal year basis. The above payments shall be in lieu of any other tax, or other imposition, assessment or charge, except ad valorem taxes.

Section 4:
This franchise shall be in force and effect for a period of fifteen (15) years from acceptance hereof, unless Grantee fails to commence service to customers hereunder within a one-year period from date of final reading of this ordinance, in which event this franchise is null and void.

Section 5:
That the Grantee shall, within thirty days from the passage and approval of this Ordinance, file with the City Secretary of the City of Baird a written acceptance of this Ordinance, and at the same time, pay to the said City Secretary, a sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of publication of this Ordinance.

Section 6:
Grantee shall set its rates to its customers in the City of Baird, but the rates shall be subject to the approval of the City Council. The initial rates for installation and service by Grantee are as set out in the schedule attached to this Ordinance and are hereby approved by the Commission. Any proposed change to increase such rates shall be submitted by Grantee in writing to the City Secretary not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the effective date of the proposed increase, after which period such change shall be effective unless the City Commission shall disapprove the proposed change prior to its effective date.

Six Flags Over Texas Open 7 Days A Week

Beginning Monday, May 30, Six Flags Over Texas will be open seven days a week, from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. This schedule will be in effect throughout the summer months until Labor Day, September 5.

The popular 115 acre tourist attraction in Arlington has been operating on weekends only since opening this year on April 15.

Attendance figures to date are 162,468, as compared to 175,077 last year at the same time. However, Six Flag officials consider the current figures gratifying inasmuch as torrential rains this Spring affected approximately 75 per cent of the Park's total operating days.

Reporting on Monday will be another 500 college and high school students who have been added to the Six Flags staff for the summer months. This brings the total complement of the Park's famed corps of lively young hosts and hostesses to 1,500.

Cattle Raisers Assn. Quarterly Meeting To Be June 17-18

The Board of Directors of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association will hold its quarterly meeting at the Trade Winds Motor Hotel in Wichita Falls, June 17-18.

An executive committee luncheon at noon June 17, will kick the meeting off to a start. That afternoon, the Animal Health Committee will meet for an important discussion on the brucellosis program in Texas. The committee is headed by Dolph Briscoe Jr., of Uvalde.

Two men prominent in the brucellosis program have been invited to appear before the committee, said Joe S. Fletcher, secretary - general manager of the Association. The two men are Dr. A. M. Pickard, a veterinarian from Raymondsville, and Dr. E. A. Schlif, who heads brucellosis work for the USDA. The Honorable Graham Purcell, Congressman from District 13, Wichita Falls, will appear before the directors at a morning meeting June 18, to discuss the report of the National Commission of Food Marketing.

Also up for discussion by the directors are new laws or changes in laws presently on statute books which affect agriculture.

The House Interim Committee of Agriculture is presently holding hearings across the state to study problems along the same lines.
