Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. To Hold Meeting September 1

Joe D. Philpott, Director of Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., which will serve Runnels, Concho, McCulloch, Callahan and Coleman Counties, has announced that a meeting will be held in the Commissioners Court room at the courthouse in Baird, September 1, at 7:30 p. m. for the purpose of selection of a Policy Advisory Committee to counsel and advise the Directors of the corporation on problems of their county.

Any person interested in the program is invited to attend the meeting, at which time not less than eight and not more than sixteen members of a Policy Advisory Committee will be elected.

Each Policy Advisory Committee shall have not less than 30 percent of its members elected thereto who are members of a minority group and/or representatives of low income families.

Those qualifying for membership on the committee shall be a resident of such county and must otherwise be qualified as follows:

(1) A person whose family income is \$3,000.00 per year or less; or

(2) A person who is a member of a minority group; or

(3) A person who is a recognized leader with his respective community who has displayed prior concern with economic, social and educational problems; or

(4) A person who is engaged in one of the following activities: Public education, public health service, welfare agencies, labor organizations, employment agencies, legal professions, law enforcement agencies, religious institutions, financial institutions, civic and service organizations, business people, city, county and government units, and from existing organizations concerned with social and economic development.

It is the aim to organize the committees as quickly as possible and commence surveys as to the areas of poverty needing assistance and to formulate plans for helping our distressed areas.

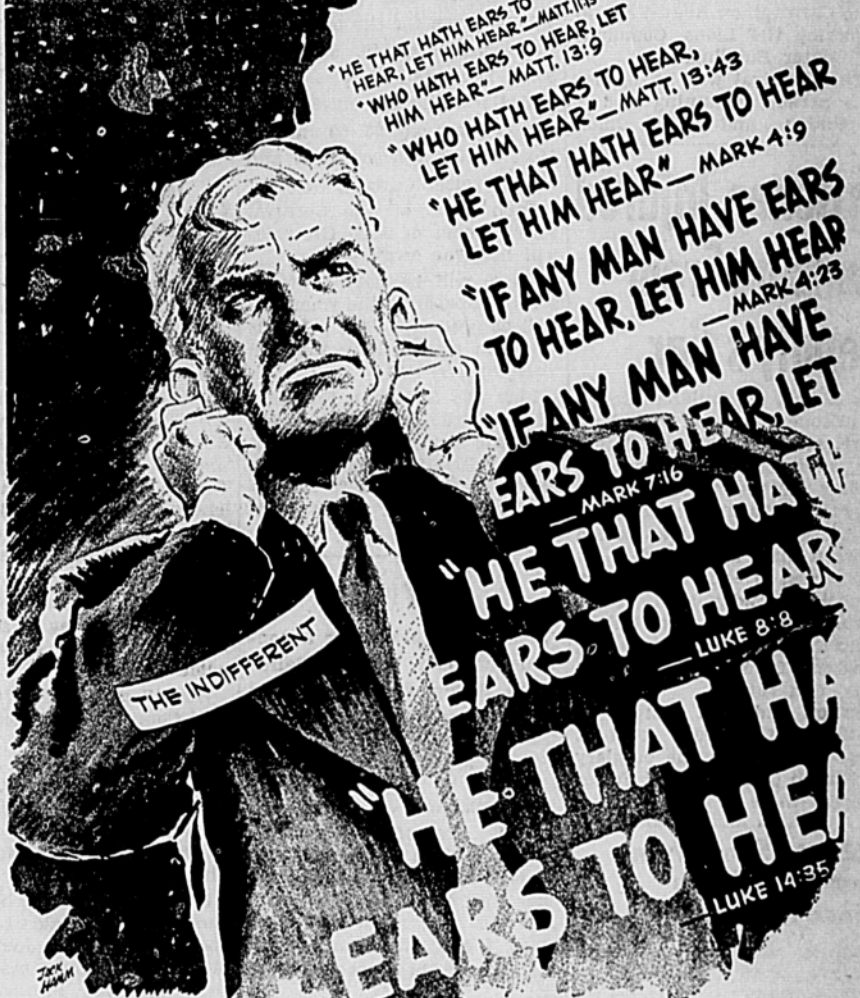

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, relating to the terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the

purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, are validated, so long as the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority, said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 12, reading as follows:

"Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of

Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, either or both of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, construction, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certificated airlines and whose facility or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with and consent of the governing body or bodies of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxing voters of the county which chooses to elect the Directors to represent that county, such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon a petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxing voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxing voters in each county voting

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

"AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

AUSTIN — Department of Public Safety estimates that 41 persons will die in traffic accidents on Texas highways during the upcoming three-day Labor Day weekend.

"The current traffic trend indicates that Texas is headed for its third straight record high in terms of fatal accidents," says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director. "At the present time, we are approximately 15 per cent ahead of the same time in 1965, and we are still faced with the four months of the year which generally produce the most deaths."

Garrison points out that: "More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed in all the United States by murder, and the deaths are just as senseless as needless and as tragic, but not nearly as well publicized."

He analyzed the reasons citizens have failed to take positive action in traffic safety: "Physicologists say that one reason... is a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove each driver in our state to stop and consider that he has less than a 50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap."

In an attempt to cut back on the number of accidents and deaths during the Labor Day weekend, the DPS will conduct its "Operation Motorcade." Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the Highway Patrol. To call attention to the problem, each traffic death will be tabulated and the totals will be announced three times daily in Austin.

Texas Highway Department, Texas Safety Association, Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and Texas Motor Transportation Association are joining forces to help the DPS.

ELECTION SYSTEM UPHOLD — Seventh Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo upheld the Texas "closed primary" election system, holding that members of one party cannot vote in the primary of another.

Court reversed the district court ruling that would have permitted to stand 71 votes of Republicans in the second Democratic primary for a Pampa judge.

State Democratic Executive Committee had filed a brief urging the court to uphold the closed primary system.

AG OPINIONS — State higher education student loan funds not immediately needed to meet loan applications can be invested in direct obligations of U. S. Agencies which are not unconditionally guaranteed by the government, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held. Investment is within discretion of Coordinating Board, Texas College and University system.

In other opinions, Carr has concluded that:

A Texas Ranger can execute a writ of commitment for contempt in child custody cases on discretion of judge of court of record.

Money erroneously deposited in State Treasury cannot be withdrawn except in pursuance of specific appropriations by law.

A peace officer must accept cash bond tendered by a defendant in lieu of signature of sureties if he is authorized to take a bail bond.

Harrison County may not legally reimburse county jail prisoners for money and other property belonging to them which was taken from custody of the sheriff by escaping prisoners.

FUTURE PARKS — State Parks and Wildlife Commission next month will officially review proposals to purchase more than 100,000 acres of land by the year 2000.

Preference reportedly would be shown to parks connected with water recreation, those near big city areas, and sites of statewide significance, including historic sites.

Questions And Answers On Medicare Bills

Many persons, age 65 and over still do not fully understand their coverage under the Medicare Program. Listed below are some of the question most often asked about Medicare coverage.

Q. I have already run up a doctor bill of more than \$50 since medicare started with my family doctor. My doctor now suggests that I should see a specialist. Do I also have to have a bill of at least \$50 with the specialist before medicare will start paying toward his bill?

A. No. You pay the \$50 deductible under the medical insurance plan only once a year. As soon as your covered medical expenses go over \$50, your medical will pay 80 percent of the reasonable charges for all additional covered services for the rest of the year. You can put in a claim for medical insurance as soon as you have any bills for covered services, but most people will prefer to wait until their bills go over \$50, because no payment can be made until then. When you put in a claim, you will receive a notice that will show when you met the \$50 deductible, or how much of the deductible you have incurred. You can show this notice to doctors and others from whom you subsequently receive medical treatment that is covered under the medical insurance plan.

Q. What other types of services are covered under the medical insurance plan?

A. Diagnostic X-ray and laboratory tests, electrocardiograms, basal metabolism readings, electroencephalograms, and other diagnostic tests; — X-ray, radium, and radioactive isotope therapy;

— Ambulance services where normal transportation would endanger health;

— surgical dressings and splints, casts, and other devices for reduction of fractures and dislocations;

— rental of medical equipment such as iron lungs, oxygen tanks, and wheel chairs to be used in the patient's home; — prosthetic devices, such as artificial legs, braces, and replacements for all or part of an internal body organ.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

(e) No land may qualify for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section. If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length

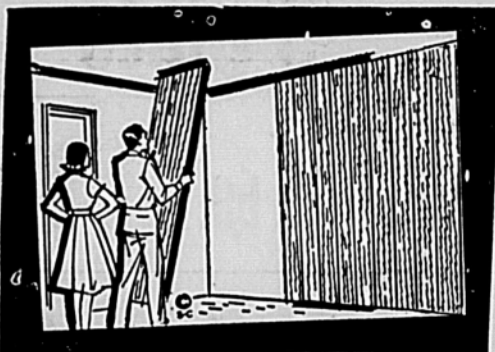
