





"The current traffic trend indicates that Texas is headed for its third straight record high in terms of fatal accidents," says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director. "At the present time, we are approximately 15 per cent ahead of the same time in 1955, and we are still faced with the four months of the year which generally produce the most deaths."

Garrison points out that: 'More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed in all the United States by murder, and the deaths are just as senseless ,as needless and as tragic, but not nearly as well publicized."

He analyzed the reasons citizens have failed to take positive action in traffic safety: "Physchologists say that one reason . . . is a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove each driver in our state to stop and consider that he has less than a 50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap."

In an attempt to cut back on the number of accidents and deaths during the Labor Day weckend, the DPS will conduct its "Operation Motorcide." Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the Highway Patrol. To call attention to the problem, each traffic death will be tabulated and the totals will be announced three times daily in




