## George Myers of Truscott Died in Hospital Thursday

### Funeral Services Held at Christian Church Friday

Funeral services for George Myers, 85, of Truscott were held in the First Christian Church in Truscott Friday afternoon, March 28, at 8 o'clock conducted by Rev. E. W. (Jack) Davis, pastor of the church, who was assisted by Rev. E. W. (Jack) Davis, pastor of the Truscott Baptist Church, and Rev. Guy McLain, pastor of Truscott Methodist Church.

Mr. Myers died in the Foard Hospital Thursday morning following a serious illness of several months. He had been in declining health for many years.

Burial was in the Truscott Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral Home of Crowell.

George Washington Myers was born April 2, 1875, at Blum, Hill County, Texas. He moved to Knox County in November, 1899. He was a farmer and owned his own land but had been retired for many years. A member of the First Christian Church, he was a highly respected citizen of the community and had many friends.

August, 1899, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Emma Duggan, who preceded him in death. On April 24, 1907, he was married to Mrs. Luma N. King, who died August 27, 1927. "February sales in Foard County were \$53,931 and sales for the first two months of 1958 totaled \$69,781, which is 59.6 per cent of our 1958 goal of \$117,000.00," Chairman Self said.

Sales in Texas during February were \$16,051,086 and sales for the first two months of 1958 totaled \$32,660,448, which is 18.6 per cent of the State's 1958 goal of \$175,000,000.

"The slogan for the 1958 Savings Bonds program is 'Share-in-America.' Every American who buys a Savings Bond is providing for his own future, adding to the strength of his country, both militarily and economically, and is putting real meaning in the slogan, 'Share-in-America,' Chairman Self concluded.

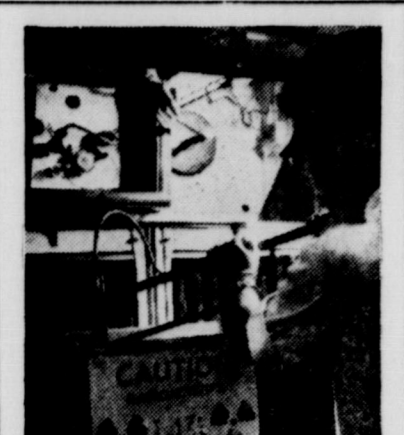

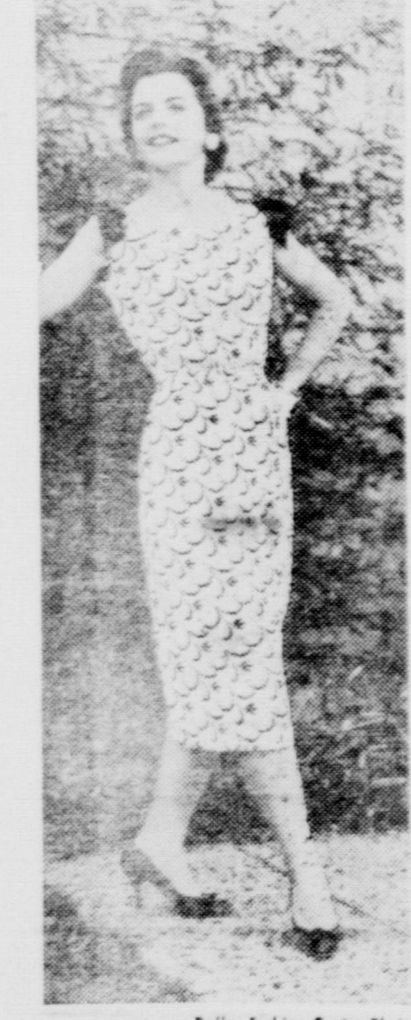

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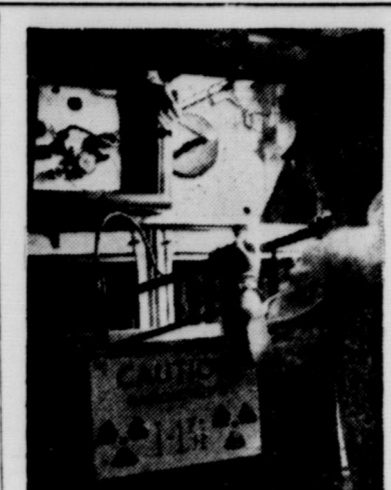

The First Easter Parade

"1. In the end of the sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulchre.

"2. And, behold, there was a great earthquake: for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it.

"3. His countenance was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow.

"4. And for fear of him the keepers did shake, and became as dead men.

"5. And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified.

"6. He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay.

"7. And go quickly, and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you unto Galilee; there shall ye see him: lo, I have told you."

"8. And they departed quickly from the sepulchre with fear and great joy; and did run to bring his disciples word." — Matthew 28:1-8.

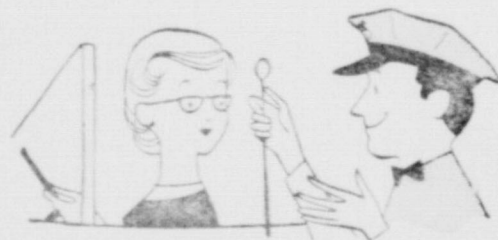

Eighteen cars of 18-inch pipe have been unloaded in Crowell within the last few days by the Stamford & Western Gas Co. to be used in extending their natural gas line from Chillicothe to Stamford.

The first royalty check for Foard County oil was received this week by J. P. Matthews for crude oil sold from the Roxana Farm-Medgish Matthews No. 1, two miles north of Thalia. The check was for \$4.85.

Texas Employment Commission, AFL-CIO is stoking the fire from outside.

TEC's member representing labor, R. F. Newman, blasted the fire into orbit by accusing the other two members, Chairman Perry Brown and Maurice Acers, of dealing him out of policy decisions. Brown represents the public and Acers the employers.

Argument focused initially on policy toward employes within TEC itself. Newman contended morale of TEC's 2,000 employes was shot. They live in fear, he said, of knife-in-the-back retaliations, salary cuts and demotions when their decisions offend trade groups, corporation lawyers or volunteer legal counselors.

Acers retaliated in a letter to trade organizations and employers charging Newman and "representatives of organized groups" with using the recession to gain their own ends.

That brought AFL-CIO leaders into the fray. State President Jerry Holleman fired back that Acers was flagrantly wasting state funds for propaganda purposes. Acers was also accused of denying just claims for unemployment compensation and forcing workers to go to court for rightful benefits.

Acers had a reply for that, too. Merely another attempt by AFL-CIO to influence commission policies, he said.

TEC supervises collection of unemployment taxes from employers and payment of benefits to unemployed workers.

**NO HELP FROM IKE** — More tears than oil flow these days in Texas petroleum circles. President Eisenhower's token tightening of the voluntary oil import quota plan just won't help, oilmen say.

They had pled for an import crackdown to relieve the slump in demand for domestic oil. What they got was "much too little and much too late," said J. J. O'Brien of San Antonio, president of Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association.

Governor Daniel called the action from Washington wholly inadequate. Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray didn't see how the effort could be effective.

Eisenhower's plan called for a minute curtailment of voluntary imports of crude oil but left products untouched and import door wide open to newcomers.

Texas fields were on a nine-day production pattern throughout March with an eight-day pattern ordered for April.

**TWO PLUS TWO** — In most educational circles, prime interest has shifted from "Why Johnny Can't Read" to "Why Johnny Can't Calculate the Orbit of a Satellite."

But even before Sputnik, the State Board of Education set up a special 20-member commission to study the effectiveness of mathematics teaching in Texas public schools.

School administrators, teachers and board members making up the commission began their one-year study at a meeting in Austin. Broad aims are to discover whether requirements are adequate, courses sound and teaching methods effective.

**NO BREAK YET** — Payments to the jobless hit a record high of \$1,568,958 in one week, according to the Texas Employment Commission's latest report.

Number of persons filing compensation claims inched up from 89,309 the previous week to 92,435.

TEC's mid-February report showed some 75,000 persons covered by unemployment insurance out of work. At that time it was hoped that approach of spring would bring the usual pick-up in jobs.

Instead, unemployment has increased more than 20 per cent.

**NO MORE SPECIALS** — He sees no need of a special legislative session now, says Gov. Price Daniel, because the state government is already pushing an anti-recession program.

Governor Daniel's statement was in reply to a demand by the president of the Texas AFL-CIO for an 8-point program to combat unemployment. Jerry Holleman challenged the governor to back up his philosophy of "states rights" by meeting "states responsibilities." His "points" included revision of unemployment compensation laws, speeding up spending programs for buildings, highways, water projects, etc.

Daniel retorted that Holleman's demands took no note of work already moving apace. Texas, he said, "did not wait for a recession to exercise its responsibility of providing highway, water conservation, attraction of industry, increased salary and building construction programs."

"This is one reason the situation in Texas is much better than in most other states."

"I have every confidence," said the governor, "that the prophets of gloom and doom will not talk us out of a continuation of our unparalleled progress."

**WATER BOARD COMMENDED** — Governor Daniel fired back a specific reply to the AFL-CIO's urging to "push the water conservation program."

Water conservation has been one of Daniel's "most pushed" projects since gubernatorial campaigning days.

Daniel said, in effect, the new Water Development Board had moved in a cloud of dust to get organized, set up rules, establish procedures, begin hearings and give preliminary approval to two projects—all within 90 days after taking oath of office.

Two projects, if finally approved, would lend \$5,000,000 to the Sabine River Authority for a new lake and \$350,000 to the Williamson County Water District No. 1 for a water diversion project.

## Social Security Report Due April 15

If you are a social security beneficiary and are, or under, age 72, here is an important notice for you from the social security office:

If you earned over \$1200 in employment or self-employment in 1957, you must file an annual report of your earnings with the Social Security Administration. Your report is due by April 15, and it is not the same as your income tax return. Failure to make the report on time can cause loss of benefits.

Remember, if you are under age 72 and drew old-age or survivors benefits under social security in 1957, and you earned over \$1200 in the year, you must

make your annual report to social security by April 15.

Persons desiring information or assistance in social security matters are invited to meet with the representative who will be in Crowell on April 8 at the court house.
