The Dragons have had hard luck in the district race thus far this season. After winning over Munby by a 51 to 0 score, they dropped to Iowa Park by six points and to Holliday by one point. Paducah had the edge in statistics on the Eagles. They defeated Henrietta 19 to 6 last Friday night. There is nothing that would please them more than to beat the Wildcats in this contest.

James Albert White was born Jan. 11, 1869, at Whitesboro, Grayson County, Texas. Whitesboro was named for his grandfather. The family moved to Montague County when he was a small boy where he grew to manhood. In 1890 he was married to Miss Lola Durah Overstreet. To this couple five children were born, three sons and two daughters, all of whom survive.

Mr. White came to Foard County with his family in 1907 and settled in the Black community and in 1918 they moved to their present farm home north of Crowell. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Crowell and was faithful to his church as long as his health permitted. He was a highly esteemed citizen and had many friends.

Con McAdams, 65, pioneer Hardeman County farmer and rancher and brother of Leslie McAdams of Crowell, died in a Quannah hospital about 11 p. m. Thursday of last week.

He was stricken with a heart attack at his ranch home eight miles southwest of Quannah and had been hospitalized about an hour when death came. He had been afflicted several years, but had felt well Friday, having ridden over his ranch during the afternoon.

His wife is a cousin of Rude and Decker Magee of Crowell. Funeral services for Mr. McAdams were conducted at 10 a. m. Saturday in Knowles Funeral Home Chapel in Quannah and burial was in the Paducah Cemetery. Services were conducted by Rev. Horace Brooks, pastor of the Quannah Methodist Church.

Walter Con McAdams was born Aug. 1, 1893, in Martha, Okla., son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. McAdams, pioneer Hardeman and Foard pioneers, and had lived most of his life in Hardeman County. He married the former Miss Nina Summers of Quannah in 1917. Surviving are his wife; three brothers, Leslie McAdams of Crowell, A. M. McAdams of Albuquerque, N. M., and G. D. McAdams of Bakersfield, Calif.; and three sisters, Mrs. Coma Hollingsworth of Kerville, Mrs. Blanche Christi and Miss Zana McAdams, both of Dallas.

All the others were defeated with No. 1 (annual sessions) receiving the least number of votes—43 for and 259 against.

Railroad Delivery of Mail Ends Here

"Doodle Bug" No Longer Carries Mail

Mail service by train to Crowell was discontinued Saturday and all outgoing mail will be carried by star route, Postmaster Alva Spencer has announced.

End of train mail service has been studied for some time by both the Post Office Department and the railroad, the former because of a possible saving and improved service and the latter because the mail contract has meant a loss to the company in recent years.

The railroad is also seeking permission to discontinue its passenger service through Crowell and other towns on the line.

Mr. Spencer said there would be no substantial change in the present mail schedules. Mail will be delivered at 8:00 a. m., from Vernon, followed by a pouch and parcel post from Abilene at 9:00 a. m. Each afternoon at 5:05, mail will arrive by star route from Quannah to Abilene.

EDITORIAL

Why We Do What We Do

There are many things that prompt us to do the things we do. Some we do from a sense of enjoyment, others from a sense of duty; some, because the results will bring satisfaction — perhaps — in a feeling of having done a job well, or in a feeling of having "gotten even" with some one; some result from misunderstanding people that we meet in daily life; others from a lack of initiative—a "don't care" attitude. From a sense of "getting even" with some one or a "don't care" attitude, nothing of value is learned—usually the "table is turned" and we are at the "little end of the deal"—so my advice in this regard is "don't carry a chip on your shoulder. Forget those little things, and life will bring more happiness."

I could go on and on with this, but it boils down to just one point, "If we do what we do because it is right or good to all concerned, we'll never be sorry!"

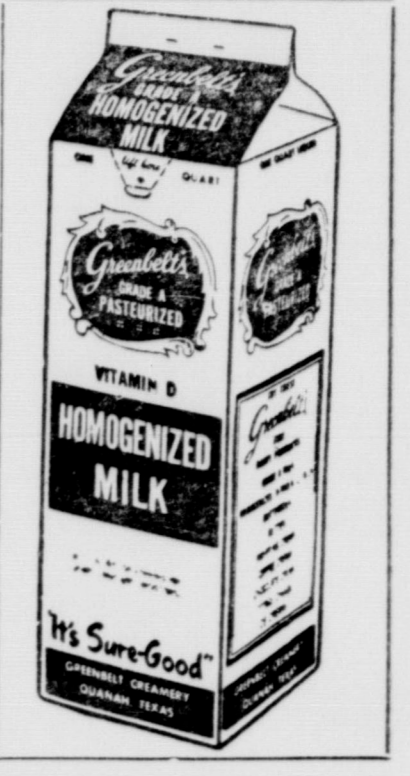

Foard County Man Sees Profit in Great Plains Program

by JAMES H. HERRING

Did you ever invest \$500 and in three years get \$1300 in return for materials and services? The Great Plains Conservation Program will offer you this kind of investment as it did for S. H. Ross on his farm 7 miles northeast of Crowell. By December 21, 1961, Mr. Ross will realize the following benefits from his investment: He will have 14 acres cropland terraced, one farm pond to furnish adequate livestock water, 22 acres of cropland seeded to grass to be used for seed production or grazing, 16 acres of cropland

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planted in a strip crop pattern for wind erosion protection, and 33 acres of rangeland with mesquite root plowed and reseeded with native grass.

The Great Plains Conservation Program offered Mr. Ross federal cost-sharing assistance on all these land-use adjustments and conservation measures from 50 to 80 per cent of the average cost of applying these practices.

To complete Mr. Ross' conservation plan he will rotate his soil depleting crops (such as cotton) with soil improving crops, stubble mulch all high residue producing crops (such as small grain), farm terraces on the contour, defer rangeland during growing season by grazing field crops, stock farm pond with fish to provide a place for relaxation and recreation, and provide food and cover for wildlife such as quail. He can get federal cost-sharing assistance on most of these practices through the Agriculture Conservation Program.

These conservation programs are to be used together in assisting a farmer or rancher in carrying out their plans as rapidly as possible without impairing his normal farming and ranching operations.

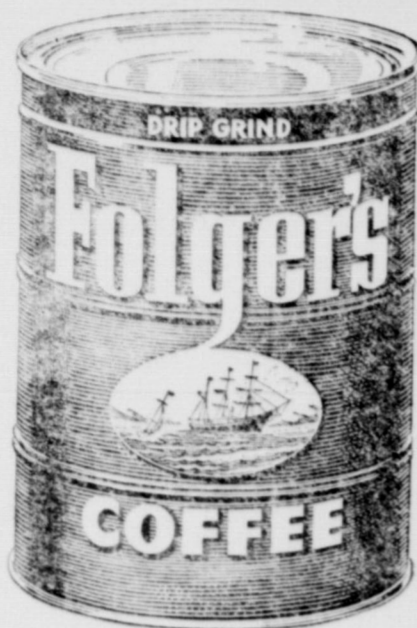
