Twelve Scouts Complete First Aid Course

Last Thursday evening twelve Boy Scouts in Troop 49 completed their Boy Scout first aid course. The Scouts were M. L. Speer, Kenneth Carroll, Barry Barker, Mike Shrode, Ken Ferguson, Steve Kralick, Philip Welch, Rickey Traweck, Jon Lee Black, Dan Mike Bird, Mike Manard and Terry Mason. Assistant Scoutmaster Ray Shirley reported that the boys showed fine skill in the eight practical demonstrations and gave good clear answers on the written work.

Scoutmaster DuWayne Elliott reported that eight more boys in the troop participated in one or more sessions of the first aid training and that he hopes that these boys will complete this work in future Scout meetings. With these eight completing the course, the troop will have a total of twenty Scouts trained in first aid. Mr. Shirley plans to offer the troop a course in civil defense disaster training during the winter months. This will afford Crowell a team of twenty boys and two leaders who have been trained in emergency and disaster relief. Of course, this training will help maintain the Scout Troop on a high level of safety and first aid skills.

Scoutmaster Elliott lists some 10 boys in the troop who will appear before advancement chairman Bill Klepper's board of review Thursday evening to pass advancements in rank achieved during the past three month period. Scoutmaster Elliott also lists some twelve boys who will receive merit badges for their extra Scout work during this three-month period.

The court of honor, at which these advancements and awards will be made, will be held in the sanctuary of the Crowell Methodist Church on Thursday evening, Dec. 17, at 7 p. m. This, again, will be a joint court of honor with a group of Girl Scouts receiving their awards at the same time.

Every Boy Scout, Girl Scout, their parents, and everyone who is interested in these youngsters cordially invited to attend this colorful affair.

Hunters Report Less Quail Than Last Year

Hunters and dogs took to the field Tuesday morning of last week in the pursuit of bobwhite and blue quail with most hunters finding the going rough and only a few bringing in bag limits.

A large number of out-of-town hunters were on hand for the opening again this year. The season extends from Tuesday, Dec. 1, through January 16, 1960. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset. The daily bag limit is 12 birds under general law, with not more than 36 a week in possession.

Charlie Boynton, Game Warden of Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties, said neither he nor Texas Game and Fish Commission biologists could account for the quick decimation of the birds in this locale. Scarcely also are jack rabbits and cotton tails which usually are found in great numbers this time of the year.

Boynton said within the last month he received from three to four calls a night from landowners inquiring about the sudden scarcity of quail. No one can account for it as no dead birds can be found or signs of depredation of wild animals noted.

WILDCATS ADVANCE TO STATE SEMI-FINALS WITH 49-14 WIN OVER LIBERTY-EYLAU SATURDAY NIGHT

The Wildcats set a record for Crowell High School football teams when they defeated the Liberty-Eylau Leopards 49 to 14 last Saturday night at Denton to advance to the semi-final contest in the State play-off games. Crowell has won the regional championship four times: 1934, 1938, 1952 and this year. Teams in this classification did not advance beyond regional in 1934 and 1938, and the 1952 team was eliminated by Van High School in the quarter-final game of 1952.

The Wichita Falls Record-News had this to say about the game with Liberty-Eylau: "The explosive Crowell Wildcats, spearheaded by the broken-field running of Wesley Cummings, bombed Liberty-Eylau, 49 to 14, Saturday night at North Texas' Fouts Field, earning a semi-final berth against powerful Sundown."

"The redoubtable Cummings gained 193 yards rushing, scored two touchdowns running, another on a 63-yard pass from Guy Todd, intercepted a pass, recovered a fumble and tacked on two extra points as Crowell completely outclassed the previously unbeaten Leopards."

"Jim Henry, Crowell's crumpling fullback, scored four touchdowns as he and Cummings accumulated 285 of the Wildcats' 368 yards rushing."

"Liberty-Eylau had averaged 37 points per game entering the quarter-final contest, but a rugged Crowell defense held the Leopards at bay until they scored two last quarter touchdowns against the reserves."

"Crowell countered twice in each of the first three periods and tacked on a final tally in the concluding stanza."

"Fumbles were at the root of both of the Leopards' touchdowns. Bob Harrison got the first score as he climaxed a 46-yard drive with a six-yard plunge through tackle. Crowell bobbled the ensuing kickoff and Liberty then connected its second payoff punch. Right half James Bowerman went over from two yards out with only 28 seconds left to play."

As usual, the entire Crowell first team, composed of Tom Crowell, Taylor Johnson, Bobby Powers, Duane Nichols, Gary Carpenter, Bill Graves and George Moss in the line; and Ivan Cates, Jim Henry, Wesley Cummings and Guy Todd in the backfield looked like State champions. Left guard Joe Barry had to miss this game due to an injury. Coaches Thayne Amnett, Gordon Erwin and L. H. Wall just about emptied the bench, giving the Crowell reserves some experience in the last half. The following Crowell reserves saw some service: Don Welch, Bill Smith, Bryant Thompson, Jim Mack Gafford, Ronnie Bradford, Dale Doyal, Jackie Hickman, Jerry Setliff, Gerald Howard, Vernon Phipps, James Borchardt and Charley Gidney.

The game was very rough with the Leopards edging the Wildcats in this department. Crowell was penalized nine times for 86 yards, and Liberty-Eylau was penalized nine times for 115 yards. Officials from NTSC at Denton did an excellent job of handling the game. The long distance and cold weather combined to hold the attendance down. However, a little over \$1,200 was realized from the gate receipts. The expenses were heavy for both schools and less than \$200 will be added to either athletic fund. The victory gives the Wildcat team an opportunity to participate in the semi-final contest against Sundown at Plainview Saturday afternoon. A large crowd is expected for this important game.

Following the council meeting, the Gold Star banquet was given by West Texas Utilities Co. in honor of the outstanding 4-H Club boy and girl from each county in District 3. Wanda Moore and J. W. Golden Jr. were honored from Foard County.

The principal speaker for the banquet was Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah who spoke on "Youth Leads the Way." Mr. Healy complimented the 4-H program for its overall objectives and emphasized its value in that it encouraged competition. "Competition encourages effort whether you win or not."

"A person who has never met defeat does not know the other side of the problem," he continued. "Defeat often makes stronger character in later years."

He said leadership being taught in 4-H work strengthens the nation because the present 4-H Club leaders will be community, state, and national leaders later. "In your later years of leadership do not overlook your responsibilities to your church—the church leaders too," he advised.

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Quarterhorse Journal Has Story on Life of the Late Jim Minnick

The life story of the late Jim Minnick, pioneer Foard County rancher, close friend of the late Will Rogers, a great lover of horses, nationally known polo player, and the first inspector for the American Quarter Horse Association, written by Garford Wilkinson, is printed in the November issue of Quarter Horse Journal.

Mr. Wilkinson relates incidents in Mr. Minnick's life from the time he was a boy on the Brazos River at the edge of Waggoner's pasture, covering his cowboy days, his love of horses and polo ponies, his acting as a horse show judge, his acquaintance with many prominent men of the nation, his marriage to Miss Della Holthausen of New Jersey, until his death in April, 1947, in Crowell following a three-day old-timers reunion in Crowell.

On March 17, 1926, Will Rogers had the following to say of Mr. Minnick: "He and I came to New York together 20 years ago. He was just starting in raising and selling polo ponies and he rode the pony for me on the stage at Keith's Old Union Square Theatre for a trial show the first time I ever saw a stage, much less was on one."

Mrs. Minnick lives in Crowell. She has six children, one son and five daughters.

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Receives S. C. D. Supervisor Award

Grady Halbert of Foard City has been named outstanding supervisor of the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District for 1959.

The selection was made by a committee of bankers in the district in cooperation with a program sponsored by the Texas Bank and Trust Co. of Dallas.

The committee was made up of Merl Kincaid of Crowell, Roland Walden of Quannah, E. L. Grimes of Quannah, and Arley Bell of Chillicothe.

Halbert, long an advocate of soil conservation, first served as a district supervisor in 1944 by appointment of the state board. He was elected supervisor when the district was formally organized two years later, and has served continuously since that time.

During recent years, he has received recognition as outstanding district and area conservation farmer, has traveled extensively over the nation attending soil conservation meetings and on one occasion testified in a Senate hearing with Secretary of Agriculture Benson present.

Halbert has completed a district soil conservation program on his own farm and ranch near Foard City. He has also completed the application of a Great Plains program.

CROWELL AND SUNDOWN MEET IN SEMI-FINALS AT PLAINVIEW SATURDAY AFTERNOON AT 2:30

The Crowell High School football team will meet the Sundown High School team at Plainview next Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock to determine the North and West Texas representative in the State play-off game next week. Madisonville and Katy will play at Spring Branch near Houston Friday night for the South Texas representative in the State finals.

Reserve seat tickets are available at Ferguson Drug, Shirley-Youree Drug and the DeLuxe Cafe. Student tickets can be purchased at the school house. The reserve tickets sell for \$1.50, same as general admission tickets, at the

gate. Student tickets sell for 50c. Crowell will use the east stands of the stadium.

Sundown has been picked by some sports writers to cop the State crown. The Roughnecks have a 12-1 record, losing only to Denver City, a regional 2A champion. They boast the highest scoring record of the State with 532 points. Their most impressive scores have been against district champion teams: 36 to 0 over Roscoe, 60 to 24 over Menard, and 20 to 8 against Stinnett.

Sundown has two of the fastest halfbacks in Class A football, Haskell Davis and David McIn-

turiff. Lewis Sessums, 205-pound fullback, is very powerful. Scout Glen (Tiny) Taylor says their quarterback, Robert Foster, is as good as Albany's signal caller. Their line is a little lighter than Crowell's, and has been able to hold the opposition scoreless only twice this season.

The Crowell boys were punished rather severely last week, with all of the players receiving some bruises in the hard-fought contest at Denton. Most of the Wildcats have responded to treatment this week that will enable them at least to start in this very important semi-final game. Left guard

Joe Barry was injured in the Albany game and remains a doubtful starter. Right tackle Duane Nichols will see only limited service. Fullback Jim Henry is the only Crowell back who will be slowed down due to injuries.

Right end George Moss, left tackle Taylor Johnson, and left tackle Gary Carpenter have been under medical care all this week. Each of them should be ready by Saturday. Under the most capable leadership of quarterback Ivan Cates, the Wildcats will be expected to come through again to prolong their undefeated record.

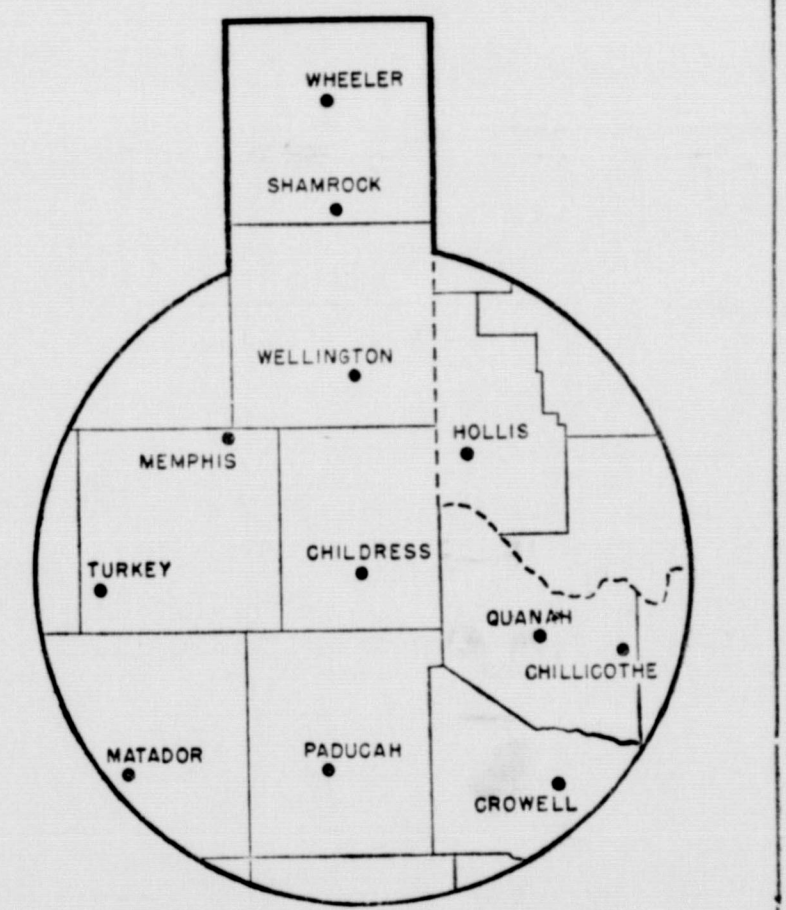

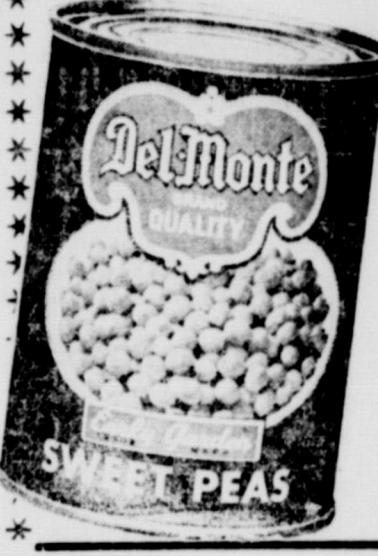
