All the second place teams were presented with team banners and ribbons. They will also represent the district at the State contest.

## Tom Crowell Receives Summer Scholarship to University of Texas

Only high school students graduating in the spring of 1960 are eligible for this study.

The students will be housed in the University dormitories. This scholarship entitles the participants to free board, room, books and travel.

No college credit will be given, but the program should enable the students to accelerate their college education through advanced standing examinations which may be taken later.

## OIL STRUCK IN HORD WELL

A discovery in Foard County about 6½ miles east of the Raspberry Field has brought a buzz of activity in and around Crowell this week.

The strike was made Saturday on the Chester Hord farm about five miles northwest of Crowell.

In a drillstem test made on the well—Shell Oil Co. Johnson (Hord) No. 1, in northwest corner of section 468, block A, H&TC survey—gas surfaced in 14 minutes with a showing of 1,050 feet of free oil, 160 feet of oil cut mud and 30 feet of mud. Drillers tested from 5,975 to 5,995 feet. Bottom hole pressure was 330 pounds.

Drilling will continue to the contract depth of 6,200 feet. Royalty buyers have been active this week paying \$50.00 and up for non-participating royalty.

Operators believe that the pay found on the Hord farm is from the same formation that was developed in the Raspberry (Caddo) Field. It is believed now that the new discovery may turn out to be an extension of that field by several miles.

The fact that there is little question about the importance of the discovery is evidenced by the stir the well has caused. The news has been well circulated and has attracted a large number of operators to Foard County in an effort to obtain leases.

The Raspberry (Caddo) Field has been listed as a proven field for several years with known potentialities. In oil circles it is pretty generally agreed that it will be a boon to the oil industry in Foard County if it is established that the new pay comes from the same formation.
