The annual drive for funds for the American Red Cross will get underway here Saturday, April 9, with a business-to-business and house-to-house appeal for funds. A kick-off breakfast for the volunteer workers will be held at the Down Town Bible Class room Saturday morning beginning at 7:30. Following the breakfast, the workers will disperse over the town and county seeking donations for this worthy cause.

110 CARS OF CATTLE SHIPPED

Shipments of cattle from the W. T. Waggoner Estate south of Thalia in Foard County and south of Vernon in Wilbarger County were completed from the Santa Fe yards in Crowell Tuesday. The shipment Tuesday consisted of 34 cars of yearling heifers with a direct routing to Kansas City, Mo., gateway to the northeastern feed pens from this area. Kansas City is also the main marketing center for all cattle in Texas and Oklahoma. In Kansas City, cattle are transferred to other railroads to take them to their final destination.

Before the unloading of cattle at the stock pens south of Crowell began, members of the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department sprinkled the grounds thoroughly in order to keep down the dust. This was greatly appreciated by the large crew of men employed in unloading the cattle from the trucks and then re-loading them into the railroad cars.

Seven cars of 2-year-old steers were loaded out last Friday and on Saturday sixty-six cars of yearling steers were shipped. Ten cars of cattle belonging to a local buyer were shipped from the Santa Fe yards here Wednesday.

Pattern for Prettier Lips

Lipstick colors should work for you in two ways — accenting your natural coloring and accessorizing your clothes. To get this double flattery, you need a basic lipstick wardrobe of at least three shades—clear red, light pink, and coral.

Lip tips: a brush draws the prettiest lip lines. Blot lips dry, then run brush over lipstick and outline top lip from the corner to the center on each side. (Prop little finger on chin to steady hand). Draw lower lip in one stroke. Fill in outline with a brush or lipstick tube. Blot and powder lips, add a second coat of color and blot again.

To accent your lip line or give a better line to lips that are not well-defined, outline lips in a dark shade and fill in with a lighter tone.

To even lips which don't match, color the thinner lip with a light shade, the full lip with a darker lipstick—they will appear even. To widen a mouth which is too thin, outline the lips a fraction of an inch beyond natural lip line. To thin lips which are too full, apply lipstick just inside the lip lines.

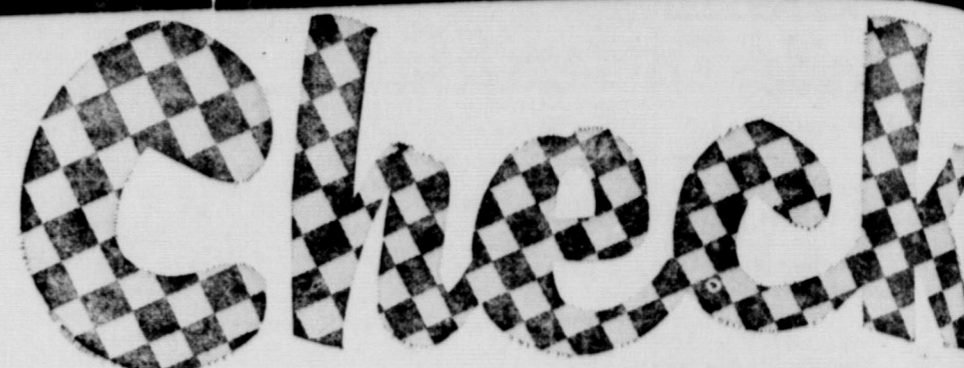

News From the Congress

by Frank Ikard, 13th Dis.

The House continues to be involved in the civil rights debate which has now been going on for almost two weeks. The House Bill under consideration would do the following things: first, make it a felony to cross a state line to avoid prosecution for wilfully damaging or destroying a church, synagogue, or public building; second, it would require preservation of records in a Federal election for a reasonable time to permit investigation of complaints that any citizen might have been involving his denial of the right to vote; third, it would make it an offense to obstruct or impede the carrying out of a lawful court order by force or violence; fourth, it would extend the Civil Rights Commission for two years. There have been offered to this basic bill many amendments, many of which attempt to assure the right of a citizen to vote. It is absolutely impossible at this time to know what final form the measure will be in when it is voted on by the House. It does appear, however, that if some of the amendments that have been offered are adopted, the "cure" may be "worse than the disease." That is that in attempting to assure voting rights, it may mean providing for destroying of our traditional secret ballot and also making it possible for controlled elections. As we have indicated, there is no possible way to tell what provisions the final version of the civil rights bill will contain. It is evident, however, as the debate continues, that the only real solution to this problem must come from the local level rather than from the Federal government.

There is more and more skepticism about the effectiveness of our foreign economic aid program. Recent disclosures show that in many instances it has been badly administered and has been extremely wasteful. The chances are good that this program will be materially reduced by this session of Congress.

While the Congress has not yet considered any of the big money bills, the few that have been acted on in the House so far show that the budgetary requests have been reduced to date in the amount of approximately 161 million dollars.

As more and more of the facts come to light, it becomes apparent that there is a considerable gap existing between this country and Russia in missile development and space exploration. During the coming weeks, we will hear more and more of this—how to forge ahead. This is one of the most critical problems facing us today.

Yet the liberals contend to be friends of the laboring man while, at the same time, turning his pockets wrong side out."—Roseburg, Ore., News-Review.

Compulsory Retirement

Dr. Theodore G. Klumpp, a member of the American Medical Association's Committee on Aging, told the 15th National Conference on Rural Health that society has been illogical and inconsistent in its attitude toward compulsory retirement and a more realistic approach is necessary. In his words, "Whenever society adopts a rule that eliminates the fit with the unfit, destroys the good with the bad, or punishes the innocent with the wicked, it is not a good rule. With the present four-cent-a-gallon tax now providing \$4.5 billion a year for the Federal Aid Highway Programs, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce declares that there should be no increase in the tax. It adds: "There is no immediate short-range crisis in the program. Actually present revenue will let the program go faster in fiscal 1961 than the current year. Problems of long-range financing should await the completion of the studies and the revised estimates on the Interstate System that are to be submitted to Congress in 1961."

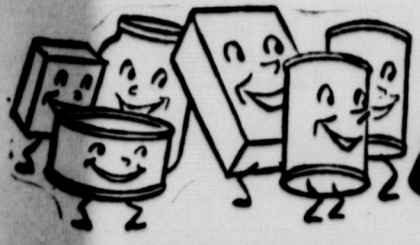

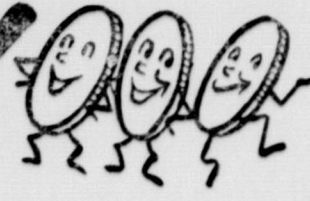

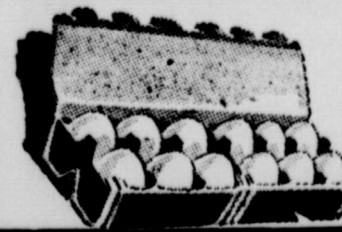

Heart Association Thanks Residents

The Foard County Heart Association wishes to thank those who contributed to the Heart Fund, and also Rev. Carl Hudson and the Boy Scouts, Glen Taylor and the grade school teachers for their cooperation in the recent drive.

\$133.00 was added to the local heart fund, according to Jack Welch, chairman.

The Texas Heart Association is assisting the local school, according to the following report from Mrs. James Welch, science teacher in the local grade school:

"We have had the pleasure of having Orville Tolbert, representative of the Texas Heart Association, visit us on two occasions during the school year. We endeavored to show him as many of the projects completed and planned for the future as time would permit. Mr. Tolbert expressed approval of our newly remodeled science room, and the program of work we are trying to achieve. He was primarily interested in the heart education program, but also, in all phases of science education. He commended the Crowell school highly and advised us to ask the Heart Association for a model of the human torso, and also to ask for a grant to build a workable model of the heart to show circulation of the blood in the human body. This project would be constructed by the eighth grade students and their teacher.

"At present we have a heart model obtained by Dr. Kralিকে through the heart association. He has also obtained specimen to illustrate some of the diseases encountered in the human heart.

"In addition to the regular text information on the various grade levels, we intend to provide additional information through pamphlets, films, charts, and lectures by Dr. Stapp and Kralিকে.

"Mrs. Bounds' 5th grade has already begun the study of the heart and circulation of the blood. They used the heart model to trace circulation through the heart; looked at the blood stains prepared by Mrs. Welch; worked a puzzle provided by the heart association; and studied some pamphlets made available by the heart association. Mrs. Bounds is reviewing them from time to time in preparation for the big day—the test to see how much they have learned.

The seventh and eighth grade students have observed the heart beat of a 3 and 5 day old chicken embryo. They have some eggs incubating and will observe the development of the chicken to its hatching date.

Beginning now, the eighth grade will study the heart of a beef animal, and some smaller animals, they will make some blood stains to study the parts of the blood.

Mrs. Fred Collins will demonstrate how to type blood for transfusions.

Dr. Kralিকে and Dr. Stapp will demonstrate and lecture on the human heart with the heart model. They will also see films and film strips that are arriving from the heart association. These films can be obtained for adult showings by contacting Dr. Kralিকে.

"Pamphlets on heart diseases are also available to anyone interested in acquiring them.

"The heart association believes that through education the problem of heart diseases can be partially solved. They are interested in putting part of the money back in the local education program.

The students are very appreciative of the contributions made by the heart association and also by the local medical profession."
