## Mrs. G. M. Bush Succumbed in Vernon Friday

### Funeral Services Held at Methodist Church Sunday

Funeral services for Mrs. G. M. Bush, mother of Mrs. J. W. Bruce of Crowell, were held at the Crowell Methodist Church Sunday morning at 9 o'clock conducted by the pastor, Rev. Carl Hudson, assisted by Judge Leslie Thomas. A special musical number for the services was a solo, "Near the Cross," sung by Mrs. James Browning, with Mrs. Paul Shirley as organ accompanist.

Mrs. Bush, 89, passed away in a Vernon rest home Friday, July 17, following a long illness.

Immediately following the services here, the body was taken to Nocona and laid to rest beside the grave of her husband who died in 1913. Graveside services were conducted there at 2 o'clock. Womack Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Her bearers were grandsons of the deceased. They were Bill Bruce of Houston, G. M. Bush Jr. of Lyons, Kansas, Ralph Wofford of Dallas, Jack B. and Scottie May, both of Little Rock, Ark., and Wayne Hales of Oklahoma City. Mrs. Scottie Salina Bush was born in Dexter, Cooke County, Texas, on March 21, 1870, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Davis. She was converted and joined the Methodist Church as a child and had remained a faithful and loyal member during her long life.

She was married to G. M. Bush and reared her family in Nocona. For a few years following her husband's death in 1913, she continued to make her home in Nocona, but about 35 years ago she came to Crowell to make her home with her daughter, Mrs. J. W. Bruce, and Crowell had been her home since that time. A son, Ray F. Bush of Amarillo, preceded his mother in death in 1953.

Mrs. Bush's father, J. L. Davis, was with Capt. Sul Ross in the battle of Pease River at the mouth of Mule Creek nine miles northeast of Crowell when Cynthia Ann Parker was captured from the Comanche Indians on Dec. 18, 1840.

Survivors include two sons, John A. Bush of Oklahoma City and Granville M. Bush of Kansas City, Mo.; four daughters, Mrs. Donna Wofford of Oklahoma City, Mrs. Hoyle May of Little Rock, Ark., Mrs. Lawrence E. Crayne of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Bruce of Crowell; sixteen grandchildren, thirty-seven great grandchildren, and a host of other relatives and friends.

## Rotary Braves Remain Undefeated in Second Half of Little League Play

Rotary's Braves, victorious in their two games of last week, were undefeated in second-half play as of last Sunday, July 19, and continued to lead the local Little League, now three games deep in the second half of the schedule. Trailing by only one game—one loss to Rotary—were the Yankees of Farmers Elevator, a well balanced club that continues to look like a serious threat to Rotary's championship hopes. Foard County Mill, with one win, occupies third place, with winless V. F. W. occupying the bottom rung of the ladder.

On Tuesday night, July 14, in the twilight game, Rotary's Braves scalped the Cardinals of Foard County Mill to the tune of a 23-13 score. Barry Berg hit a single, a double and two home runs to lead the Brave hitters, and Mike Gamble, Argumedo Villereal and Otis Johnson each smacked out two hits each. Jimmy Black hit a double and three singles for a perfect night at bat for Foard County Mill, as Jackie Brown, with two hits, and John Schilling, with one, completed the hitting for the Cardinals. Mike Gamble and Jon Berg did the damage for Rotary, with Jackie Brown, John Schilling, Danny Walling and Jimmy Black each "giving it a go" for the Cardinals.

In the nightcap of July 14, Farmers Elevator Yankees soundly spanked the VFW Vets as Dan Mike Bird pitched smooth, shutout ball for three innings, allowing only one hit, a scratch single by Bob Bird, while his mates scored 15 runs. The Vets scored four times in the fourth and fifth frames, but so did the Yankees as they maintained their 15-run advantage. Dan Mike Bird hit four-for-five for the Elevator crew; Lynn Myers hit two-for-three, and Larry Henry shook the fence with a single, then hit two consecutive home runs over the fence. Ken

Ferguson also hit two-for-two for a perfect night at bat. Hitting for VFW was confined to singles by Freddy Wehba, Ricky Traweck and Jackie James, and a single and a double by Bob Mike Bird. Ricky Traweck came through with the fielding gem of the night with a sensational grab of a pop fly out in the very edge of the crowd.

Light showers preceded the games of Friday, July 17, stopping just at game time, and eventually the largest crowd of the season saw a VFW rally fall short as they were defeated by Rotary 10-7, and then in the 8 o'clock game—Farmers Elevator knocked out Foard County Mill 15-2.

In the 6 o'clock game, Barry Berg, for the first time this season, had control troubles, and although he only allowed one hit in the entire contest, he was touched for seven runs and was relieved by Mike Gamble in the fifth inning. Freddy Wehba's single was the only hit off Berg, while Jon Berg and Otis Johnson—with two hits each—and Albert Santos, with three hits, did most of the damage to VFW's hopes of victory. This game ended on an exciting note as the bases were loaded, two men were out, and Bob Mike Bird stood at bat as the potential untying run. Mike Gamble, however, struck him out, and the Braves were still undefeated.

In the 8 p. m. contest, Foard County Mill's never-say-die Cardinals went into the sixth inning trailing 10-0, and with only one hit—a single by Randy Smith in the fifth—to show for their efforts on offense. John Schilling led off with a home run over the left-center field fence, and Randy Adkins chipped in with a single to score Bobby Gobin, thus saving a shutout. Lynn Myers and Larry Henry hit home runs for the Yankees, and Ken Ferguson hit safely twice.

## Foard County Wildcat Brought in on Berry Land

A wildcat venture by R. E. and R. C. Huntley has been completed as a producer in Foard County and a swabbing test indicated an initial production of 144 barrels per day. A 12-hour pumping test was conducted Thursday.

The well, on M. K. Berry land, is located approximately 2.5 miles west of Rayland on Farm Road 98. It is located in Section 25, block 8 of Foard County survey.

R. C. Huntley said Thursday morning that initial drilling operations were begun on June 4 and drilling was completed on June 21. A pump was placed on the well Wednesday.

Total depth of the well is 4,412 feet, and the well was plugged back to 4,080 feet. It was perforated at 4,020-30 feet and 4,034-46 feet. According to Shell Oil Co. geologists, the formation is Ore Canyon.

Crude oil rights have been granted to Texaco Inc.

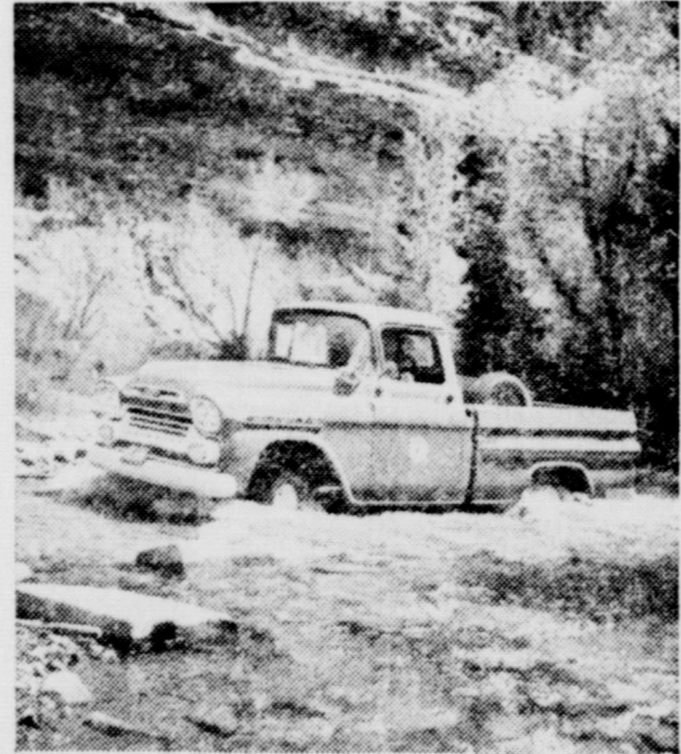

**News From the Congress**  
 by Frank Ikard, 13th Dis.  
 The Administration has requested that Congress remove the ceiling on the interest that can be paid on government securities. The present ceiling on long term government bonds is 4 1/2 per cent. For any government securities which are issued for less than five years there is at this time no ceiling on the interest that can be paid. It has been suggested that unless the ceiling is removed on the issues running for a period of more than five years, that a greater portion of the debt will be forced into short term securities. If this should occur, then the government would be competing in its refinancing with the short term money that would normally go into the commercial channels for building and financing business and personal activities.  
 This undoubtedly would be highly inflationary and would force individual interest rates up considerably. While it would seem that the situation that now exists has to a great degree been created by the so-called "tight" money policy that has been in vogue for the last few years, there seems to be no responsible alternative at the present time other than to provide some means whereby the interest ceiling on the long term government issues can be removed. Doing this should not necessarily mean that the over-all interest paid by the government should increase, and it certainly would be less inflationary than forcing the government into short term financing.  
 A great furor has been caused by Paul Butler's recent statements concerning the activities of the Congress. It would seem that if Mr. Butler wanted to make Congressional policy, he should get himself elected to either the House or the Senate. If he were successful in this, he would better understand the responsibilities of the Congress and perhaps would learn that the first responsibility of a member of Congress is to do what he feels is best for the country rather than serve his political party.

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

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—Texas' 56th Legislature fizzled to the end of its third session and 180th day with its main job—providing money to run state government—still undone.

Gov. Price Daniel called a 4th session to begin just hours after the last one ended.

House members repeatedly voted down tax bills presented by joint conference committees of senators and representatives. Senate voted favorably each time.

First House rejection was by a vote of 81 to 64. This was on a bill to tax tobacco, natural gas production, corporation franchises, utilities, motor vehicles, liquor, wine, boats, motors, airplanes, radios, TVs, phonographs, cameras and liquor by the drink in private clubs.

Speaker Waggoner Carr named a new House conference group composed of members who had voted against the bill. They met with the same Senate conferees that had worked twice before.

Only change in the new report was that the private club tax was cut out and the radio and TV tax slightly increased.

House rejected it again, this time 83 to 66.

More conferences and more votes followed in the final frantic hours. All futile; None made any apparent progress toward compromising the basic bone of contention, whether to tax gas pipelines. House favors this "severance beneficiary" tax by a narrow margin. Senate is flatly against.

Along with his new call, Governor Daniel issued a sober warning. Unless a tax bill is passed and effective (requiring a two-thirds favorable vote) by Aug. 15, there won't be time or money to get Sept. 1 checks to 225,000 old age pensioners.

**CARR FOES BACK DOWN** — During the tense, short-tempered days in the wind-up of the last session, Speaker Waggoner Carr was, for a time, the target for pent-up frustrations and pressure. Carr had worked to get the House to accept the Senate-passed tax bill. When the House turned the bill down, Carr said that "obstructionists" had defeated it.

This was a red flag to members already sensitive to public criticism of a "do-nothing" Legislature. For several days they simmered. They accused Carr of trying to thwart the will of a House majority, talked of voting him out of the speakership.

In a dramatic showdown, Carr stepped down from the rostrum and challenged his critics to remove him if they thought it would make things any better.

Nobody accepted his dare. A few minutes later, on motion of Rep. Joe Burkett, the man Carr defeated for the speakership, Carr was escorted back to the speaker's chair.

And the wearying legislative battle began again.

**STUDENT FEE BILL OKAYED** — A bill to require state college students to pay an activity fee passed both houses by very narrow margin.

Measure would allow the colleges to charge students up to \$30 a semester to support health services, book rentals, cultural and athletic events, campus publications, parking, etc.

Any college may exempt from the fee up to 10 per cent of its enrollment in cases where the charge would cause "undue financial hardship."

Bill was hard-fought. Opponents declared it would make "free public education" available only to the rich. Backers said the colleges had to have more money. It was estimated the bill could bring in as much as an extra \$1,000,000 a year.

**BEACH BILL PASSED** — Both houses passed and sent to the governor a bill guaranteeing public access to state-owned beaches. It took a conference committee to work out the differences between House and Senate ideas on the bill.

As finally passed, the bill says the public shall have the right to come and go from public beaches. No one, it says, shall erect a fence or barrier to prevent this.

Beaches that cannot be reached by public road or ferry are exempt.

**WAIT, YOUNG LOVERS** — Governor Daniel's expected signature on a newly passed bill will put a damper on the elopement plans of Texas teen-agers.

It will require boys under 21 and girls under 18 to wait three days after obtaining a license to get married. Also, to get the license, the youngsters must be accompanied by parents or guardians.

Some lawmakers said it would mean more running across the state line to marry. However, Oklahoma recently passed a similar law.

**NEED MONEY FIRST** — Amid the legislative tax deadlock, the Commission on Higher Education decided to stop studying new money-spending programs until there's money to spend.

Commission's job is to determine needs of the state's colleges and universities and make recommendations to the Legislature. Expanded programs and new degrees are being sought by many schools. But when the Commission met, there was no money in sight even to open the schools next fall, let alone expand them.

Commission resolved to "approve no programs which entail additional expenditures until such time as monies are provided for the programs and offerings already in existence."

**OIL QUOTA KEPT DOWN** — Texas oil allowable will be held down to nine producing days again for August.

Railroad Commission ordered the same production as for July—2,700,164 barrels a day on a nine-day schedule.

Major oil purchasing companies and independent producers were virtually agreed that production must be kept low to reduce excessive stocks.

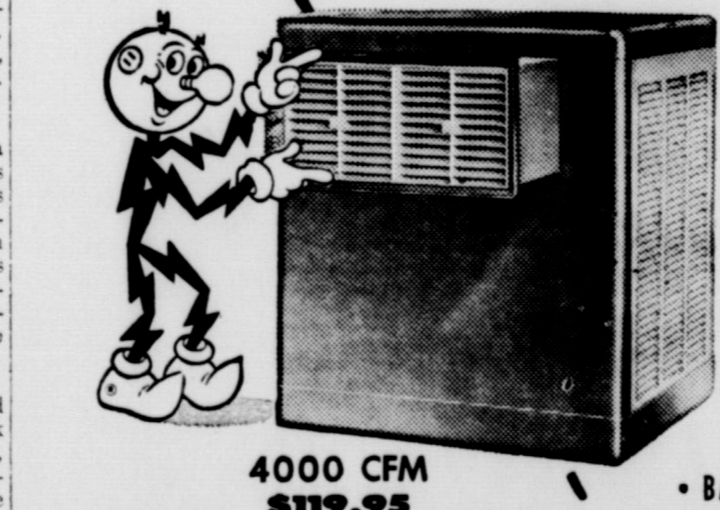

About Your HEALTH



"School days, school days, good 'ol' golden rule days!" Here they come again, and if you're a wise parent you'll get ready ahead of time.

There is lots to do—buy clothes, fit shoes—and if your child is entering the first grade, chances are you need a birth certificate copy.

School districts in Texas require that entering students be six years old before September 1. Otherwise they must wait until the following year.

The best means of proving your child's age and birth date is to have a certified copy of his birth certificate.

It is important that parents take care of this chore as early as possible. During August and September, the Division of Vital Statistics is swamped with literally thousands of requests each week for birth certificate copies.

If you want to be sure your child has his birth certificate when school starts, request it now. Rough estimates place the number of upcoming first graders at about 250,000. That makes for a lot of birth certificate copies.

In addition to birth certificates, it would be wise to check with your school district regarding any vaccinations that may be required. It would be a good idea—if you have not already done so—to get your child started on his series of three Salk polio shots before school starts.

Another smart idea that will pay off is adjusting your child's schedule to approximate that of school time including bedtime, meals and especially waking time.



Our Weekly Sermon

Faith at Harvard

Twenty-one per cent of Roman Catholic students at Harvard University, 25 per cent of Jewish students and 39 per cent of Protestant students have abandoned the faith they once professed.

A recent 82-question survey by the Harvard Crimson, college newspaper, revealed that only 31 per cent of Protestants and only 74 per cent of Catholics believed in life after death.

Eighteen per cent said they believed in the God revealed in the Bible, while 24 per cent believed in "a God about whom nothing can be affirmed."

Harvard was founded as a Christian institution for the major purpose of training students for the Christian ministry.

What a pity that so few of the present students have faith in God!

Is there life after death? The teaching of both Old and New Testaments answers yes, especially John, chapter 3.

Is Jesus Christ divine, as more than half the students deny? God said on the occasion of Christ's baptism, "This is my beloved Son" (Matthew 3:17).

One-fourth of the students believe we can know nothing about God. But the Bible was written that we might know God.

"I have not spoken of myself; but the Father which sent me, he gave me a commandment, what I should say, and what I should speak."

Whatsoever I speak, therefore, even as the Father said unto me, so I speak" (John 12:49, 50).

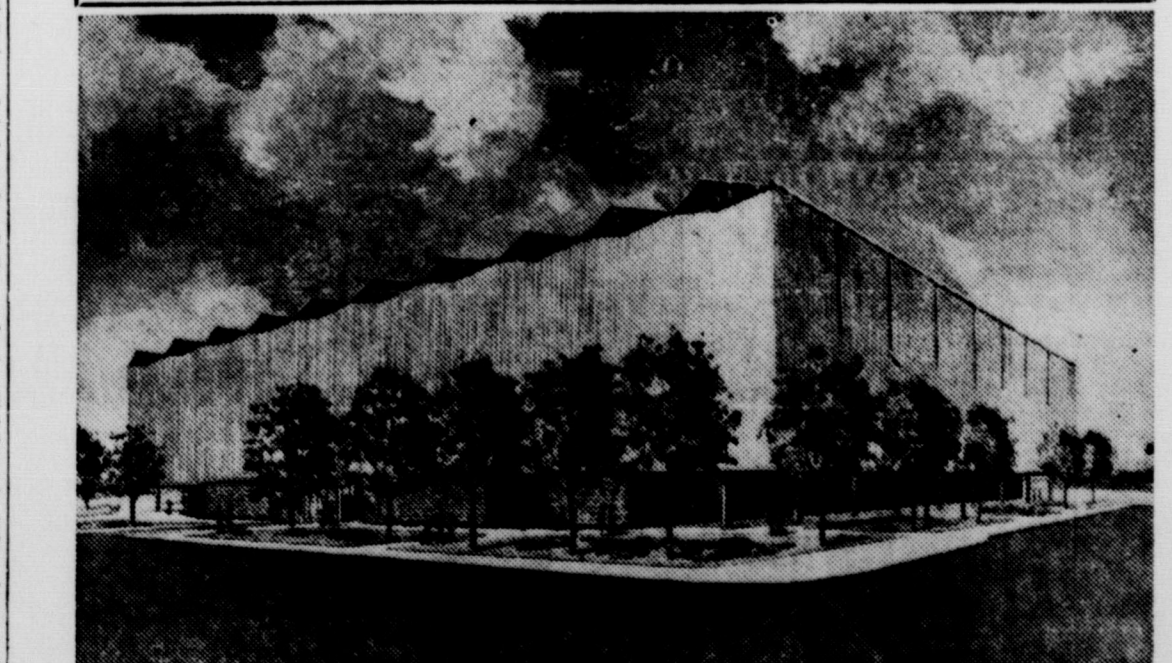
A person may believe what he wishes, even if it flatly denies the Word of God, but God's Word will never pass away; it will remain supreme to the end.
